The only thing I am not including is the Appendix—a first translation of excerpts from the <u>Grundrisse</u> which another Canadian German translated for me but did not make extra copies. I do include, as frontispiece, the single quotation on "absolute novement of becoming" from that maginificent work.

When may I hope to hear from you? When do you think you will get a chance to write your Preface to it? I hope to edit and turn over to typist for professional typing the whole manuscript in mid-June and after July 4th I will start welking the hard sidewalks of NI for publisher. Do you suppose you could have your commentary ready by July 15th?

Did I tell you that, along with the French edition of Marxiem and Freedom, a British edition is now coming off the press in Lordon? They are a bit thicker than the American editions since the French includes, as appendices, first and forement the Shang-wellon deciment, and my place on the "Cultural Revolution" as well as my special introduction to the French edition, while the British edition has, beside all the new appendices, also a new Preface by a magnificent Scotsman, Harry McShane, who has been in every class struggle from 1919 and has just celebrated his 80th birthday.
