I want to limit mygelf here to fust one reference Footnote 29 states: "Marx. "Abstract of Morgan'a Ancient Societw." quoted by Engels oriein of the Family:" Since I knew that Engels quoted oriy a fow paragrephs oI Marx's "Abstract". I became curious and sure erough I found that Engels did no such thine, though Enerele himself geve the impression that he was fivine the essence of juaris Notes.

What Karx's Noter turn out to be are no less than 254 pagee. Noreover, although he thought that Morgan's work was quite importan't and asked Engels to read it, he by no means apreed with Encels that ift was "epochal." Secondly, the Notes are not only on Biorean's work. but also on the latesi worke in anthropoloey by zumaxukursis John Budd Phear (The Arvan Yillafe). Herry Sumner laine (Ietters on the Early History of Institutions), and Jom Lubbock (The origin of Civilization). And as if all that wero not enouein. he had checked on all of worgan'e cefarences to Greek $1 i$ terature as well as comparing what iorgan had done that was new and how it related to other works by anthropclogists. (The bibliopraphy ititelfis five pages of bibllographic notes by faxx.)

Above all, these fotes that farx never pot to develop in full and on which he worked in the last years of his life, can under no circumstances be separated either from the new works on the orient that barx included in his 1857-58 Grundrisse, nor from the very last writines from his pen, the four different drafts of. the letter in answer to Vara Zasulitch on the prospects of revolution in Russia. and its relationship to "the viliage commune". In a word. what we have here, if anything at all was needed on the question, is the oceans that geparate the eenius liarx from "the second-im-command. Engels.
