### Steel Workers Seek "Healthy Pay Increases"

Murray's Statement Indicates CIO Is Heading Toward General Drive For Big Wage Raises

Philip Murray, President of the CIO and the United Steel Workers of America, on Oct. 26 told a Philadelphia district convention of the steel union that the USWA will demand "healthy wage increases" for its 900,000 members when contracts are reopened

in January. This announcemnt, coupled with the previous opening of the United Automobile Workers drive for wage boosts, indicates that the CIO is building up to a general campaign for higher wages By M. Walker to meet the rising cost of living.

Murray pointed out that pay envelopes worth \$50 or \$60 only three months ago today can buy only \$35 or \$40 worth. He charged that soaring prices are due to "the greed, lust and selfishness of American industry and business" and "cannot be blamed on the measly wage increases afforded labor in 1945 and 1946."

What increases will be demanded when the USWA wage policy committee meets in December was not stated by Murray. He indicated that substantial raises would be sought "American industry is making plenty of money and can well afford to give very healthy wage increases now without increasing the price of com-



### Why "Daily Worker" Kept Silent About Eloise Gordon

Leading newspapers throughout the country last week reported the testimony of Eloise Gordon, Pittsburgh reporter for The Militant, before a hearing of the House Committee

TOO HOT FOR THEM

It didn't dare publish the story. If Communist Party members and sympathizers read how Eloise Gordon—a Trotskyist representing the views of The Militant and the Socialist Workers Party — denounced and exposed the notorious House Un-American Activities Committee, they'd begin to see through the slanders the Stalinist leaders have spread about the Trotskyists.

That was how German and Italian capitalism prepared for the Second World War. The present wave of red-baiting is an ominous indication of Wall Street's readiness to follow the path Mussolini and Hitler lined with skulls as markers for future dictators.

In face of this frightening perspective, a good-hearted, normal person who believes in living on friendly terms with his neighbors cannot help asking, but is it really true? Is Wall Street actually preparing for a Third World

We must learn to look facts in the face. Some people | Canadian section. seek to escape facts through pleasant day dreams about the goodness of human nature among the Wall Street wolves. That kind of day-dreaming is a short cut to suicide.

Consider the budget for military expenditure in the coming year. 18 billion dollars have been ear-marked by Congress. Do you know how much money that is? If you began shoveling 170 dollar bills per minute into a furnace at the time of the Battle of Gettysburg you would still be shoveling today. In fact you would still have another 117 years to go before you succeeded in burning up that sum.

With tha' much money pouring into the war machine in one year, who is dealing the cards, the goddess of Peace? Or the brass-knuckled god of war?

Consider how Washington is stock-piling atomic bombs -manufacturing these atomic bombs on a 24-hour, day and night, basis. Is that an evidence of their faith in peace? Or an evidence of their belief in war?

Consider how militarism has become a permanent part of America today, so that we are saddled with the largest standing peace-time Army in our history, and a Navy greater than the combined navies of the rest of the world. Does that show Wall Street plans peace?

Or does it show how they are beating ploughshares into

The evidence is inescapable. America's 60 families are preparing to take the United States into another world

What is to be done?

Only one solution is possible, and that is to end the capitalist profit system which is the basic cause of imperialist war. ### Korean Workers Resisting In American-Controlled Zone

Headed by the organized labor movement, the masses in the American-controlled section of Korea are fighting back with powerful demonstrations against the oppressive rule of the American Mili-@

tary Government. News of successive waves of evolt by striking workers in the American zone of Korea broke through the iron curtain of censorship last week. The Koreans demand the independence they were promised at Cairo by Roosevelt, in 1944, as well as freedom of trade union activity and an end to the terror regime which is depriving them of elementary democratic rights.

The demand of the Koreans for greater distribution of food to the starving masses was answered by the calling out of troops of the Sixth Infantry Division, after AMG authorities appealed for assistance at several points in the Division area. Bloody struggles followed in many centers.

At Taegu, police casualties included 50 killed and 30 seriously injured. At Kongchen, some 10,-000 Koreans disarmed and kidapped the local police, burning down the post-office and police

#### Class Justice

Wall Street's courts in New York state last week played out their travesty of justice in the conspiracy to deprive three minority parties, including the Socialist Workers Party, of their constitutional rights to a place on the state election ballot.

Even the fiction maintained for several weeks that this was purely a Democratic Party conspiracy was abandoned. The final court of appeals that upheld the flimsy technicalities raised by the corporation lawyers of the Democratic Party was made up of four Democrats and three Republicans. They were unanimous in barring the SWP from the ballot.

Why were the Socialist Workers Party and the two other minority parties barred? The courts made that very clear. These parties did not support the candidates of Wall Street's Democratic or Republican Parties. The Communist (Stalinist) Party was also challenged in the courts. But it supports the major Democratic candidates. The courts demonstratively ruled the Stalinists could remain on the ballot.

So we have one vivid example of the class justice for which the capitalist-dominated courts and capitalist-made laws are designed. Their purpose is to help protect capitalist interests from any workingclass threat, political or otherwise.

There was another case that ran almost simultaneously with the New York ballot-ban case. It involved Senator Theodore G. Bilbo of Missisippi. Bilbo represents the Mississippi property and monied interests.

He was elected to office by a privileged few -less than five per cent of the voting-age population can vote in Mississippi due to the poll tax. He openly called for lynch terror against e Negro people to prevent them from voting in the last election. He conspired to deny Negroes the right to register and vote. He incited gangs of terrorists to keep the Negroes from the polls by violence. NOBODY CAN DISPUTE THESE FACTS.

Yet the U.S. Supreme Court, the highest judicial body in the land, has refused to act on an appeal to prevent Bilbo from taking a seat in the Senate—a seat he had secured by fraud and violence. The Supreme Court didn't try to deny the justice of the appeal. It simply found the necessary legal tecnicality to keep Bilbo in the Senate.

That's how the courts operate. When the rights of working-class organizations are involved, they "interpret" the law against labor's interests. When the crimes of the capitalists and their political agents are involved, they "interpret" the law to favor the ruling class.

These two latest examples of capitalist class justice demonstrate that no small reason for building a powerful independent labor party is to clean out the capitalist courts and institate a system of real justice for the working people.

#### The Next Congress

CIO President Philip Murray and CIO-PAC National Director Jack Kroll last week sent out a letter addressed to every CIO member declaring that the coming elections "will decide America's course and the fate of every American and his family."

They go on to say: "The fact is that if the people are not to be thrust again to depression, if we are to avoid another horrible war, if our unions are to survive, a progressive eightieth Congress must be elected on November 5."

These CIO leaders have not exaggerated the consequences for the American working people if Big Business, through its reactionary control of Congress, continues its political domin-

But we can confidently assert right now, in advance of the elections, that the next Congress will be as reactionary as the last, which all union leaders admit was the "worst" in decades.

We can state further that the very politics

of the union leaders like Murray and Kroll will help aid the further entrenchment of Wall Street reaction in Washington.

Murray and Kroll urge the election of a "progressive Congress." What do they mean by this? They don't mean a Congress no longer dominated by the parties and candidates of Big Business. They bitterly oppose any change in the traditional "two-party system" of rule by American capitalism.

They mean exactly what they meant in 1942 and 1944 when they also spread the alarm about the dangers of a reactionary Congress and had the satisfaction of helping to elect what they called a "progressive Congress." They mean working to get rid of the "progressive" capitalist politicians they supported yesterday and replacing them with new "progressive" capitalist politicians who will stab the workers in the back tomorrow.

The politicians of the Democratic and Republican parties are not controlled by labor. Sure, they're always willing to make promises to labor before elections. But they're agents of parties that are completely controlled by Big Business. And they take orders from their party bosses.

Only seven of the scores of Congressmen backed by CIO-PAC in 1944 opposed Truman's draft-strikers bill. Practically all of these "progressives" went down the line to eliminate price ceilings. And when a few of them do occasionally vote for some progressive measure, it's just "for the record." They never put up a real fight.

Labor will elect a progressive Congress only when it runs its own candidates, backed by labor's own party and pledged to fight for labor's own program against the Big Business parties and politicians. Until then, Congress will remain a monopoly of labor's worst ene-

#### UN And Greece

With pomp and ceremony, with flowery speeches and idealistic phrases, the United Nations General Assembly opened its sessions in New York last week.

Millions of words are pouring out through the press and radio to delude the people that the rulers of all lands are erecting through this United Nations conclave an enduring structure of world peace.

But if we want a true picture of the kind of world that capitalist imperialism is building, we must brush aside the curtain of words the United Nations assembly has draped over reality. Let us take a good look, for instance,

at Greece. British troops armed with American weapons and supplies have been maintaining "peace" in Greece. Already in this "peace" thousands of Greek workers and peasants have been murdered in a savage civil war waged against them by the Greek capitalists and landlords, backed by British armed might.

A climax of this brutal slaughter was reached in a plebiscite to restore the hated monarch whom the Greek people twice drove from their land. A mighty array of American naval and aircraft carrier forces was deployed in Greek harbors to intimidate the Greek people. A "Ja" election was held that would have made Hitler envious. What corruption and fraud could not accomplish, bloody violence completed. Hundreds were slain to ensure the return of a vile tyrant through a "democratic" vote.

This is the reality. This is an example of the true world of the future being built by the imperialists. This is what the beautiful speeches of the United Nations assembly seek to camouflage.

The solution to the problems of peace and security for the people will not come from the United Nations. Only the independent action of the workers and oppressed peoples of the world can solve these problems.

The solution is indicated by the latest example of the growing working-class opposition to imperialism—the huge minority vote cast in the British trade union Congress last week condemning British policy in Greece. Delegates representing 2,444,000 workers, 40 per cent of the Congress, denounced British policies in Greece and other countries.

We can well understand the reports that Bevin and Attlee were "shocked" by this expression of growing opposition to their policies. Only four months ago, at the national conference of the Labor Party, which is based on the unions, resolutions opposing British imperialist policies were snowed under.

American labor should ponder this lesson being taught by their British brothers. And they should emulate their example. Only when the workers of all lands unitedly take into their own hands the issue of peace, the issue of the world's future, will humanity have the chance to march forward again.

How the Communist (Stalinist) Party betrays the political interests of the labor movement is clearly shown by their treacherous role in the New York elections.

The Stalinists made a deal with the reactionary New York Democratic machine, withdrawing their candidates for the main offices of Governor, Lt.-gov+ ernor and Senator.

In return for support to the Wall Street politicians, Mead and Lehman, the Democratic machine agreed to let the Stalinists remain on the ballot. The Stalinists ran Benjamin Davis for Attorney General and Robert Thompson for Comptroller, both minor offices. But Mead, the head of the Democratic ticket and the chief candidate of the Stalinists, has proved to

be the outstanding red-baiter in America during the Mead has joined in the nationwide campaign of red-baiting fostered by the Chamber of Commerce. His latest outburst is typical, On Oct. 24, Mead declared: "I revile and repudiate the support of anyone advocating beliefs or philosophies of government

alien to our own. Both Nazism and Communism are repugnant to the practices of my faith, the dictates of my conscience and the institutions of my country." Linking "Communism" with Nazism and declaring it to be an "alien" philosophy is the typical technique of the professional red-baiter. Mead's statement could have been lifted bodily from any number of speeches by Bilbo, Rankin, or Talmadge, the foulmouthed Democratic representatives of the Negro-

Yet the Stalinists continue to thump the tub for Mead as a bulwark against reaction! Their strongest reflex to Mead's brazen red-baiting has been an editorial twitch or two about Mead violating "the interests" of his "own party."

The Stalinist deal with the rotten Democratic political machine of Wall Street extends farther than is generally recognized. The Stalinists control the American Labor Party. Through their control. they forced the ALP to run an entire slate of capitalist candidates, mostly Democrats.

The Stalinists say that Labor's interests are best advanced by supporting the political party of Bilbo, Rankin, and "Get-Tough-With-The-Soviet-Union" Byrnes.

The Wall Street candidates plugged by the ALP, of course, have been as lavish with campaign promises as a war profiteer with public funds, As usual these promises, after Nov. 5, will end up in the ash can along with the confetti, tin horns and campaign badges. Two of the candidates, however, have already revealed their real views.

Joseph Clark Baldwin, when he lost the Republican primaries, denounced and reviled the ALP and called on the voters not to vote for him. Yet the ALP offered him to the public as a "liberal" and

he will appear on the ballot as an ALP candidate. Spencer C. Young, another candidate of the ALP. led the drive of the Democratic machine to throw three minority parties off the ballot, including the Socialist Workers Party. This drive shows how readily Wall Street resorts to fascist-like practices. Yet Spencer C. Young is one of the candidates whom the Stalinists are peddling to the labor movement on the ALP line as pillars of "progress"!

### Why CIO-PAC's Fund Drive Lags So Badly

Several months ago the CIO Political Action Committee launched a national campaign to raise a million-dollar election fund through voluntary contributions of, 50 cents and \$1 from the more than 5,000,000 CIO members.

On Oct. 14, with the elections about three weeks off, CIO-PAC National Director Jack Kroll revealed that only \$170,000 had so far been contributed to the projected million-dollar fund.

Officials at several recent CIO-PAC state gatherings sadly admitted they are having difficulty getting an enthusiastic response from the workers. This admitted apathy is reflected in the financial

There are some who attribute the lag in the financial drive merely to innate reluctance of the workers to part with a dollar for a good cause. This is a slander. We need only recall how last spring the workers contributed hundreds of thousands of dollars in a short time to aid the hardpressed General Motors strikers.

The American workers have demonstrated that they are ready to make real sacrifices for a cause in which they believe. Their lack of enthusiastic response to the CIO-PAC financial appeal is a measure not of their stinginess but of their dissatisfaction with the PAC's policies.

Contrary to the labor leaders' opinion that the workers never know what's good for them, the workers have repeatedly shown they know what's good for them better than their conservative leaders. Many have learned, for instance, that the only thing labor ever got from supporting candidates of the capitalist Republican and Democratic parties was worse political reaction after elections.

More and more workers have come to feel that contributing a dollar to help elect candidates of either Wall Street party is just tossing money down the drain. When CIO-PAC now tells them again to help finance the election of new "progressive" candidates of the Democratic Party, they think back to November 1944 when they gained that "great progressive victory" - as CIO-PAC leaders then called it-by returning a Democratic majority to Congress. These same CIO-PAC leaders now complain that the last Congress was the most reactionary and anti-labor in decades.

Let the CIO-PAC launch a movement for an independent labor party. Then watch the workers dollars roll in. A labor party will inspire the greatest demonstration of enthusiastic support the American workers have ever shown.

The hearts of millions of American people were touched by the press accounts of the tragic death of Angela Rose De Fabrizio a few weeks



ago. On the morning of her wedding, the pretty, dark-haired young bride dropped dead in a church in Cedarhurst, Long Island—a victim of rheumatic heart disease.

This was a real "human in-

terest" story and the press played it up. Pictures of Angela's bereaved fiance and of her grieving family filled the daily papers all over the country. But there are 30,000 rheumatic fever deaths in the United States every year! Few of these deaths are reported in the daily papers. And the fact that these 30,000 young victims of rheumatic heart

disease could have been saved receives no publicity at all! Rheumatic heart fever is a disease of poverty. Dr. Ernst Boas, an authority on chronic disease, says: "Rheumatic heart disease would largely disappear if decent housing and wages

became the order of the day." A germ or virus causes rheumatic fever, but poor living conditions-damp rooms, overcrowded sieeping quarters, inadequate diet, lack of, sunshine, poor ventilation-are known to be predisposing factors. Many early cases of rheumatic fever go unrecognized because the main symptoms, pain and swelling of the joints are often dismissed as "growing pains." In about 90

per cent of the cases of rheumatic fever, the heart is damaged.

Like tuberculosis, rheumatic heart disease requires long, costly medical care. Also like tuberculosis, this disease strikes most often at the children of workers least able to pay for such services. During the acute stage of rheumatic fever, the young patient should be given hospital care. Continuous medical observation and supervision are recommended for six months to a year after the rheumatic fever attack.

Even fairly well-paid workers find it impossible to give the right kind of medical care to their sick children when rheumatic fever enters the home. Free public health centers for the proper care of rheumatic patients are totally inadequate. The result is that thousands of children with early rheumatic infections develop serious heart conditions and die prema-

It is estimated that nine hundred thousand children and young adults in the United States are suffering from rheumatic heart disease. Between the ages of 10 to 14, rheumatic heart disease is the leading cause of death; between the ages of 15 to 25, it is second only to tuberculosis.


Every year, thirty thousand of the "ill-fed, ill-clothed, ill-housed" children of the poor die from rheumatic heart disease. The early death of Angela Rose De Fabrizio was a heartbreaking thing. But the full record of deaths among young rheumatic fever victims is thirty thous-

The Negro Struggle -

### A Great Step Forward

- By William E. Bohannon -

Today the Negro people are more willing than ever before to fight for their second emancipation. Just as important, they are in a better position to do so.



We know that the road to victory in the struggle against Jim Crow lies through an alliance with the white workers whose main enemy is also Big Business. Not so well known is this fact: We have made tremendous gains toward creating that alliance

The basic organization of the workers is of course the trade union. Negro workers have always been friendly to the trade union movement, but for a long time we were not inside it. This was because: 1. The employers would not hire us in the important industries. 2. Many unions, suffering from the prejudices the bosses planted in their minds, would not permit us to The result of this was numerous tragic de-

feats for the labor movement. When workers struck for better conditions after the First World War, the employers brought many Negroes up from the South as strikebreakers and thus were able to smash the strikes.

But what a different situation today! As a result of the CIO, the great organizing drives of the 30's and the expansion of production during the war, great changes took place. Ask any union leader and he will tell you that Negro workers were the outstanding fighters on the picket lines during the strike wave.

Now there are 2,000,000 Negroes in the organized labor movement-AFL, CIO and independent. And not all of them are in the North by a long shot. According to a recent estimate. there are 450,000 Negroes in Southern AFL unions claiming a membership of 2,000,000.

Think about that for a minute: TWO MIL-LION Negroes in the unions! One out of every seven Negroes is in the labor movement. That is a greater percentage than exists in the white population generally.

I don't say that the situation is ideal in all ize the radio parties. these unions—far from it. In some there exists complete equality between the races; in others, we are still Jim Crowed and segregated; and there are still others in the in-between category.

But the point I want to make here is that the Negro worker, by and large, and despite the difficulties that still remain, has now become a basic part of the labor movement. Nothing can change this fact but the destruction of the labor movement itself.

Being inside the unions, in many cases on a completely equal basis, we are therefore in an excellent position to influence their decisions and to guide them toward the destruction of Jim Crow. For this reason as well as others, we can say with confidence that the second emancipation of the Negro people is not as far off as some people think.

### Mum's The Word In Washington

Don't say it out loud, don't even whisper it. The demand for silence appears to have become one of the chief planks in Washington's foreign policy.



Fears of war are "unwarranted and unjustified," said President Truman in his speech on Oct. 23. The real danger seems to lie in rumors: "If these rumors are not checked they are sure to impede world recovery . . . I am sure that every delegate in this hall will

join me in rejecting talk of war." Mum seems to be the word. Let's not worry about war; let's worry about rumors. The thing to organize is not a struggle against war, but a struggle to reject talk of war.

It's really spitballs they're manufacturing down at Oak Ridge. The rockets you hear so much about are intended for next year's Fourth of July celebration. Germ warfare probably means warfare against germs. Peacetime conscription is designed to educate, build up and broaden the outlook of the youth. And anybody who's got other ideas is the kind of rumormongering skunk who would impede world re-

It doesn't pay to talk about what the government in Washington is up to. Henry Wallace found that out. And now Czechoslovakia is finding it out too.

The State Department has just cut off all financial aid to that country. It has cancelled 40 million dollars of a loan to Czechoslovakia to buy surplus U. S. Army equipment in Europe and has halted negotiations for 50 million dollars of credits from the Export-Import Bank for Czechoslovakian reconstruction.

The reason? According to the State Department there was a "misinterpretation by Czechoslovakia of United States motives in extending charging that Washington is using its financial power in behalf of "economic imperialism." Byrnes called a special press conference to explain the State Department was not going to grant credits to countries that expressed the opinion the U.S. government was trying to enslave them.

In other words, any country that doesn't like Washington's economic policies had better keep quiet'if it knows what is good for it. That goes for clapping your hands too.

"I disapprove of what you say, but I will defend to the death your right to say it," declared Voltaire. "I disapprove of what you say, and you can starve to death until you quit saying it, even if it is the truth." That sums up the position of Byrnes.

Remember the Four Freedoms? One of them was freedom of speech. Truman is all for it as long as you don't use it to discuss the government's preparations for war. Byrnes is all for it too (except in South Carolina) as long as you don't use it to discuss the government's program to dominate the world through dollar diplomacy. #### Housing As A Political Football - By Alvin Royce

It's no accident that every politician is going

out of his way to appeal to the veterans in this election campaign. What GI didn't at some time discuss "cleaning out the old politicians when we get home?"



The veterans have registered in great numbers and are very much interested in politics, but not the politics of the Democrats and Republicans. All these capitalist politicians have of-

fered is endless promises—the politics of words instead of the politics of deeds which the veterans want.

The gubernatorial campaign in New York State is a good example. Republican Governor Dewey and Democratic Mayor O'Dwyer have officially cooperated to sabotage an effective housing program. Both parties have spent the bulk of their campaign pointing out how little their capitalist opponents have accomplished. They have plenty of facts to prove that point. However, neither the Republicans nor the Democrats can say much about homes they themselves have provided.

In spite of these facts, the leaders of the veterans' movement have refused to act. Throughout the spring and summer the Stalinist leadership of the AVC in New York City postponed or blocked every proposal for housing action. Only with the approach of the elections did they suddenly become interested in "fighting" for

They printed an anti-Dewey housing program (taken word for word out of the Democratic election platform) and distributed it in the name of AVC. A program had been proposed and generally accepted to apply consistent pressure on both the Democrats in New York City and the Republicans in Albany; yet all this committee asked the veterans to do was participate in an anti-Dewey picket line for a few hours and then return home. To quiet down opposition, Larry Knoble, Stalinist executive secretary of the AVC in New York, promised there would be action against the Democrats "sometime before the election."

When this Stalinist-led delegation arrived in Albany, they walked into and occupied the Senate Chambers. They promised to sit there till "hell froze over" unless they were shown some housing action. Workers and veterans throughout the country had their eyes on this "veterans' senate." The next morning Dewey received the veterans and gave a flat NO to their demands. Hell hadn't frozen over but the delegation went home, its "mission" completed.

This Stalinist committee now reveals that it will continue the action by supporting the Democrats in the elections. Like the capitalist parties, it is using housing as a political football.

Political action by veterans surely is necessary. today. But if it becomes political action in support of capitalist candidates and plaforms, such at it . . SWP Candidate for Governor of New Jersey NEWARK, N. J., Nov. 1-When the New Jersey CIO Political Action Committee last month endorsed Lewis Hansen, Democratic candidate for Governor, it showed in practice the bankruptcy of the PAC policy of supporting "good" capitalist

not. This certainly is a negative "quality" and indicates the CIO leaders have not been able to find anything pro-labor that Hansen is for. In other words, he hasn't even made definite commitments for CIO-supported

legislation. Besides, words are cheap. Hansen is not the first CIO-endorsed Democrat who "promised" to oppose anti-labor legislation. The 79th Congress had over 80 of such promise-makers who knifed Kohlman of the Socialist Worklabor in the back by voting for Truman's draft-strikers bill.
