MORGAN LOANS PROP TO FRENCH STEEL MONOPOLY

Reconstruction Grant I To Be Financed

By LELAND OLDS (Published by Associated Editors) Support of the present reconstruction government of France in an emergency which threatened widespread unemployment and radical labor activity is the real object back of the Morgan \$100,000,000 loan. J. P. Morgan & Co. is going to protect its own enormous investment in the French steel trust. This corporation has received a large part of the money from the French loans which have so seriously inflated the currency.

French Banks to Blame The fall of the franc is not due to foreign speculators with malicious intent as the propaganda of international capital would have us believe but is due to the policy of the French bankers who by loans have vastly increased the amount of currency in circulation. The fall of the franc will be permanently arrested only by halting the loans of private banks, especially those to building contractors for reconstruction purposes, and by preventing a complete stoppage of work as a result.

These conclusions are based on an analysis of the loan by the Alexander Hamilton Institute, one of the leading economic institutions of the country. Under the leadership of Jeremiah Jenks the institute is closely associated with the inside of big business.

40,000,000,000 Paper Francs The institute proceeds to point out that the policy of French banks has increased the number of paper francs standing to over 40,000,000,000 with billions more circulating in the country. In predicting the trend of the franc we must ignore speculation entirely and take into account about currency inflation in France.

The institute points out the connection between heavy loans to building contractors for reconstruction and inflation. It says: "The private banks of France have loaned so heavily to building contractors and investors in French government bonds that their resources are exhausted."

Reconstruction Grant The remedy for the franc is to have these private banks curtail loans to building contractors and to French investors in government bonds. The credit of \$100,000,000 extended by the Morgan syndicate to the Bank of France is virtually a loan to the building contractors. Their heavy borrowing is structuring the devastated areas.

But, the institute points out, it is likely that the French will not be called on to repay the Morgan syndicate at all. Interest on the Morgan New York bankers will sell a French loan to American investors later on and use the proceeds to repay the Morgan syndicate.

French capitalists have been guilty of the most outrageous corruption in connection with the reconstruction contracts. Their vast fortunes in hundreds of millions of francs have done much to produce the inflation which has depressed the value of the franc. Politicians have recently blocked the prosecution of the most rampant cases.

Loans for Munitions These same capitalists have received the major part of the benefits from huge loans to countries as Poland, Czechoslovakia, and Roumania, another major cause of inflation. For the loans have really been spent in France for munitions. And J. P. Morgan has been the major partner with these capitalists thru heavy investments in such corporations as Schneider-Creusot, second great French steel and munitions trust. This is the real background of the Morgan loan.

Gompers Remains Calm

The Daugherty investigation, like the Temper Dome exposure, leaves Brother Gompers cold.

A great calm prevails at American Federation of Labor headquarters; it is the one quiet spot in this capital.

The department of justice under Daugherty and its bureau of investigation (a euphemism for brazen blackmail) under William J. Burns have been the most active enemies of labor.

Department of Justice operatives have been active in every strike of any magnitude; they have played the same role that spies and detectives always came out openly as a strike breaking agency; thousands of its sleuths were detailed to spying upon the unions and framing evidence against their members.

The strike-breaking activities of Daugherty and Burns culminated in a nationwide injunction against the strikers—a wholly illegal proceeding obtained by fraud and misrepresentation. It was a clear instance of the brazenness of the American capitalism of elementary rights guaranteed citizens by the constitution of the republic.

In every frame-up of workers engineered by the employers Burns agents have figured; they are the bloodhounds of American capitalism and one would think that even a conservative labor leader like Gompers would welcome an opportunity to tell what his bones concerning this anti-labor gang and its boss, Daugherty and Burns, representing justice in our domain.

Not so. Vociferously garrulous and insistent that he be allowed to appear and denounce Soviet Russia before the senate investigating committee headed by Borah, he has indulged in no similar outburst relative to the Daugherty-Burns matter.

It may be argued that Brother Gompers knows nothing detrimental to these assiduous agents of the employers, but to admit this is to admit that he is the most monumental dumbbell that ever carried a union card. Brother Gompers is not a dumbbell and in the years that he has held office he has earned the respect of American labor movement; he must have accumulated an instructive dossier concerning the activities—legal and otherwise—of Daugherty, Burns and the various agents of the government.

This is the appointed time, if Brother Gompers so desires, to put considerable of a kibosh on the injunctive activities of employers and their governments. Gompers is a great believer in the force of public opinion and the author of several theses upon that interesting subject, Brother Gompers should know that the American public has turned its thumbs down on oil gladiators like Daugherty and Burns. This is the time to step to them, insert the harpoon into their quivering flesh, give it a few painful twists and call upon the dear public to watch their own backs.

Much good would accrue to labor from such action. The timid tribe of politicians would begin to think twice before glorifying injunctive processes and in the future the vision of a squirming attorney-general and his gumshoe aids would be always before their eyes.

We fear that Brother Gompers is not made of such stern stuff. He is lifted to great heights of denunciatory eloquence only when a work-in-class of a whole nation like Russia win to victory by other means than the use of the union label and "rewarding friends and punishing enemies." It must also be remembered that Brother Gompers entered into a united front with the department of justice against the Communists and it may be that this unity of action extends even farther into the labor movement.

Perhaps the astute Mr. Burns also has been busy compiling a dossier on the activities of labor leaders.

Abusing Our Patience

The political atmosphere is clearing and the likelihood for the organization of a third party opposed to the republican and democratic organizations is becoming more definite. By many attentive observers it is now taken for granted that all political calculations must reckon with the republican and democratic organizations in the coming elections.

Of course, the organization of a third party resulting from a split of serious magnitude in the republican and democratic parties would be a most welcome step in the direction of completely divorcing the working and farming masses from the democratic and republican camps, from the reactionary capitalist outfits. But there is great danger that unless those who have fought against the powerful capital-

ist interests dominating the two old parties take great care, some Wall-Street fakir or quack will jump on the bandwagon, get a place and prominence and, in the name of the new movement of revolt against the big business interests and thus utilize his position to sabotage and betray the very progressive movement which is supposed to be his.

The reported suggestion that Joseph Daniels, secretary of the navy in the Wilson administration, will be a vice-presidential candidate of the third party movement in order to give it a broad enough base to appeal to former democratic, as well as republican followers, is a dangerous case of the above character. Daniels is an agent of the big capitalists; he has proclaimed piety, or perhaps even to be of it.

Even to hint the name of Daniels is to abuse the excessive patience of the manhooded American masses. In pursuance of his plumed policy, Mr. Daniels is secretary of the navy in co-operation with Mr. Payne, then secretary of the interior, made leases on navy oil reserves lands to muggy big oil concerns. It is true Do-heny and Sinclair have to appeal to these concessions. But what difference is there which clique of oil thieves gets away with the supply of oil that belongs to the country?

Daniels, who is now beginning to smother his interests with progressive paint, has offered valuable oil leases for a song to the following corporations: The Boston Pacific Oil company, the Associated Oil company, Union Oil, Buena Vista Oil, Carthage Oil, General Petroleum, Record Oil, United Oil, and the Consolidated Mutual Oil company.

The workers and farmers will not fall for any such tricks. To the farmers and workers it does not matter whether Consolidated Mutual capitalists plunder the government with the aid of Daniels, or the Sinclair interests rob the country with the aid of Denby. Daniels is as guilty of aiding and abetting criminal capitalist ventures as Denby was. Hiding behind a third party label will not save Daniels. Such abuse of the patience of the masses of workers and farmers will only hasten the doom of these capitalist charlatans of the stripe of Daniels.

Supply and Demand

One of the iron laws on which the present system of capitalist exploitation of the workers is founded is the iron law of supply and demand.

When the farmers are broke and are compelled by the big bankers and manufacturers to sell at prices lower than what it has cost them to produce, the economic experts earning their money by writing to the heavens that the law of supply and demand is at work.

When a new wage-slashing campaign is launched by the bosses, the workers are told that there are more workers than needed, that there is a greater supply of workmen than there is a demand, and who will dare tamper with this immutable law of supply and demand? Wages are cut to the bone. Farm products are reduced to the vanishing point. Profits mount. The law of supply and demand is vindicated and saved!

The fact of the matter is that the law of supply and demand is not to blame. The source of the difficulty for the workingman and poor farmer is the capitalist control of the means of production and exchange, the control of the railways, the grain elevators, the transportation and marketing facilities. A small group of powerful financiers and industrialists for private profits.

An illustration of this point is the following condition confronting the farmers. According to the estimate of the Department of Agriculture the farmers have more corn, oats and barley at this time than they had in the corresponding period a year ago. On the other hand there is a greater supply of workmen than year ago at this time. According to the law of supply and demand corn, oats and barley should be lower and wheat should be receiving a higher price. But exactly the opposite condition is true. The wheat in the farmers' hands is worth \$32,400,000 less on March 3, 1924, than it was on the same date in 1923, while the corn has gone up in price.

The law of supply and demand as it works in the United States is subject to the control of the world market of international capitalism. These conditions are wretched and hopeless, because of the very nature of capitalist production and exchange. Consequently, the conditions of our farming population are just as hopeless and wretched. The desperate state of affairs has been pictured by the noted farm expert Mr. Younkin before the Kentucky farmers in these significant words:

"The world's greatest agricultural country is faced by a situation more menacing to the country's future than can be said of any economic problem in any part of the world." Perhaps our capitalist misleaders would have us believe that the law of supply and demand is responsible for six and a half million farmers having gone bankrupt and foreclosure in the great depression?

"Efficient" American Capitalism

By WILLIAM F. DUNNE. OVER-PRODUCTION is alarming Americans. The spokesman of this class are not exactly hysterical but I would not blame them for being so. The statistics submitted by such devoted disciples as James J. Davis, secretary of labor, show the tremendous productive capacity of American industry. The statistics with the phenomenon of the over-production of goods, gives real reason for the more analytical capitalist.

There is even an abundance of work in the iron trade of the world as testified by the daily press of capitalism. Spurred on by the prospect of enormous profits during the war period, the industrial capitalists doubled, tripled and quadrupled the capacity of their plants. There is absolutely no ground for believing that even the European markets were restored there would be an outlet for the full volume of production for which American industry now is organized.

The situation is further aggravated by the fact that in the constant war upon the living standard of the workers, the desire for ever cheaper products has become more and more insistent. The American industry now is organized to produce more than the world can absorb.

Illustrative of this is the case of the fact cited by James J. Davis to prove the limit of a million immigrants to the United States. A negligible portion of the goods produced in the United States are exported. The surplus is sold in the domestic market.

Starting with the soft coal mining industry, the rotary shaft and steel, when capital and labor balance. A Crisis Problem. His industry understands that the problem of the greatest character is that it is too much to expect of every other capitalist nation in the war upon their working class, has destroyed the greatest obstacle to making for stabilization of American capitalism—a working class with a large consuming capacity resulting in a high standard of living.

As the days pass we will hear more and more the whimpers of the apologists of capitalists and James J. Davis. As the ranks of the unemployed grow and industry stagnates—a process already beginning—the note of fear already perceptible will grow louder until it drowns out the triumphant note of the prosperity song that is chanted now by most of the habitability.

Just as we produced in even larger quantities than we consumed, we brought up the level of efficiency now prevailing in the best equipped plants of the iron and steel industry. The latest grade of steel can be produced with less force consumed by two-thirds.

Machinery is displacing with work. The rapidly increasing production of the bituminous coal industry of Chicago, there is now a machine that turns out 100 tons of bricks per hour, worked by one man. If the entire industry is equipped with such machines it is estimated that 8,000 men can be required for which \$5,000 are required now.

Lowering Labor Costs. The larger proportionate increase in the wages of the unskilled workers during and since the war has prompted the employers to have devised and installed machinery for the rough jobs of loading and unloading material, classifying, etc.

One plant in Bridgeport, Connecticut, hot iron cauldrons are handled by a conveyor operated by one man; twenty-five workers were formerly employed on this job. All the work is done by one man and the plant is now being installed in warehouses and on the water front to discharge the unskilled work in an occupation which until lately, was thought to be unskilled.

This distribution in many lines has reached the limit of expansion by the fact that in the district of foodstuffs there is one plant in the United States where four manufacturers or wholesalers or retailers or distributors of goods are required to include 316 persons.

An ideal condition," says the chief secretary of labor, "is when capital and labor balance."
