WASHINGTON, April 7.—No longer denying the existence of a third party movement, Coolidge political leaders are concentrating their efforts on minimizing the split. They want to rob the independent movement as much as they can of its power for harm to the Coolidge candidacy. The whole question now is how big the independent vote will be and which party it will hurt most. On the face of things, the republicans stand

to suffer more than the democrats, since the new movement of protest centers in states which normally would be republican territory. They are not spending much time now hunting for the reason for the break, the Coolidge leaders are trying to claim it did not come as a result of the oil and other scandals, but because of the failure of Congress to back up the President. Keenest disappointment is expressed over the refusal of

Congress to pass farm relief legislation. Action on it, it is excitedly claimed, would have saved the situation. It is now too late to expect any effective legislation and the Coolidge leaders are no longer depending on it. They have, in effect, dismissed Congress from consideration as an asset and except for the hoped for passage of the tax bill, they look for no aid from the legislators.

Howat Urges Support of the Garment Strikers

KANSAS MINE LEADER URGES LABOR UNITY

Asks Support For The Glass Farmer-Labor Party

If the organized labor movement of Chicago had leaders who were behind the garment strikers as they should be, the strike would already have been won, Alexander Howat, nationally known leader of the Kansas coal miners, told a mass-meeting of four hundred strikers yesterday afternoon at 180 West Washington Street.

The fighting Kansas miner, after telling how the organized workers of Kansas crushed Governor Allen's industrial court law, declared:

"Now is the time when we see the value of independent political action of labor. If we had a strong independent Glass Farmer-Labor Party in Chicago we could bring political as well as industrial pressure to bear and have the full effect of the workers to unchain themselves from the bosses."

"Let us hope the trade unionists of Chicago take advantage of the coming convention of the Farmer-Labor Party in St. Paul on June 17 to form a united party of labor. They will be forced to react upon us."

"As long as the workers submit to the injunction just so long will the injunction be used against them by the bosses. I call on the leaders of organized labor in Chicago to awaken from their slumbers. Let them arouse themselves, and settle the example, get down on the picket line. If the organized labor movement in Chicago and the whole country know that they are behind the Ladies' Garment Workers at the last ditch, then the job will not be done to the satisfaction of the strikers in jail."

"Most of us together."

"The time has come when the 85 per cent of the people—the workers—who produce the world's wealth should realize the necessity for getting together in a great Farmer-Labor Party, so that the producers of the wealth shall be able to run the nation. The politicians have been keeping the workers divided, as have many of the officers of the international trades unions."

"We must do as they are doing in Great Britain. There is no occasion why we shouldn't have a working class government in America. Let us get behind the June 17th convention and form a militant Farmer-Labor Party."

Cossacks Rule Where Kluxers Murdered Two at Lilly, Pa.

LILLY, Pa., April 7.—State cossacks today were in Lilly, following a revolver battle Saturday night between members of the Ku Klux Klan and town folk in which two men were killed and a score injured.

The riot started when a group of young men turned a fire hose on more than five hundred Klansmen who were marching to the railroad station after holding a ceremony at Piper Hill.

Klansmen Start Shooting. When the water struck the marchers, it is alleged, members of the Klan drew revolvers and fired into the town folk.

Four men of Lilly, believed to have been the ringleaders in the riot, are under arrest today and are being held for questioning. State troopers made the arrests after an investigation. Fifteen of the townsman injured in the battle are in hospitals.

LABOR RULE IN ENGLAND HITS SNAG

Suffers Defeat in House of Commons, 251 to 212

(Special to The Daily Worker) LONDON, April 7.—The Ramsay MacDonald labor government was defeated in the House of Commons this afternoon 251 to 212, in a vote on its proposed evictions bill.

The defeat was a serious blow to the government and was its first defeat in Commons.

Altho critics of "resign" followed announcement of the voting, it was understood the government would retain office.

The Bill was one that provided protection to persons out of work against eviction for non-payment of rent. It contained provisions that the rent in such cases should be fixed from taxpayers of the community.

It was a radical measure, proposed, not entirely, by the cabinet's approval, by more extreme members of the labor party.

After the defeat MacDonald announced that the government would reconsider the measure and meanwhile would not resign.

An eviction order shall be issued until the tenant has a reasonable opportunity to apply to local rent authorities and the authorities have been given an opportunity to investigate.

Ex-premier Baldwin urged that the entire clause be abolished.

Ex-premier Asquith declared the amendment "meaningless, impacticable and worthless."

LaFollette Could Defeat Coolidge Now, Says Barrett

If the presidential elections were held now Senator LaFollette's third party movement would carry enough states to defeat the regular republican organization and permit the democrats to win, or throw the election into congress, John Barrett, former ambassador to Argentina declared here today on his return from an investigation of conditions in Illinois, Iowa, Nebraska, Minnesota, Wisconsin and the Dakotas.

LaFollette would be sure to carry the Dakotas, Wisconsin, Minnesota and possibly two other states, Barrett said.

Pepper for World Peace, But What About Pennsylvania?

WASHINGTON, April 7.—A resolution requesting that the president call a world conference for limitation of naval, land and air armaments and for furthering world peace, was introduced in the senate today by Senator Pepper, Pa.

The resolution stated that the conference should consider plans for a world court "either thru development of the present permanent court of arbitration at the Hague or thru the establishment of a permanent permanent court of international justice at the Hague from the league of nations."

MRS. JAKE HAMON IS CALLED TO TESTIFY IN HARDING DEAL PROBE

(Special to The Daily Worker) WASHINGTON, D. C., April 7.—Senator Walsh, chairman of the committee today was ordered to bring with her all bank books and records of expenditures made by her husband and other leading made during the 1920 campaign and six months before.

BLOODY FIST WINS ELECTION FOR MUSSOLINI

Voters Told Duty to Vote Fascist

ROME, April 7.—Premier Benito Mussolini, the fascist dictator of Italy, thru the application of his iron fist and bloody rule, has been able to keep himself in power. During the elections which took place Sunday the fascist terrorized the populace and in many districts there was only one candidate, that of the fascist.

This election was merely an attempt on the part of Mussolini to wrap the cloak of constitutionalism around his fascist dictatorship.

The elections were arranged that he positive of at least the solid parliamentary majority of 326 delegates. The opposition parties could at the most, elect only 129 delegates out of the 325 delegates in the Italian Parliament. Under this arrangement he cannot be overthrown by the opposition parties.

The entire fascist organization was mobilized yesterday to get out the vote and supervise the election. Whenever the result was in doubt, fascist pressure was brought to bear upon the electors. Personal letters, warning the recipient that it was his duty to vote, were sent to everyone.

In some of the outlying districts, the polling was conducted in the open, so that every voter might be encouraged to vote "right."

Saw Bars and Win Freedom at Military Prison in California

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., April 7.—Search for nine convicts who saved the bars in the military prison at the presidio of San Francisco last night and escaped, being permitted today by military police and San Francisco officers.

Twelve prisoners escaped but three were captured.

Twelve prisoners in the guard house could have followed their companions to freedom but did not.

U. S. ATTORNEY, POLITICAL HEADS, AIDED BOOTLEGGING IN CHICAGO, SAYS WITNESS

(Special to The Daily Worker) WASHINGTON, April 7.—A sensational story of his unsuccessful three years' fight against an alleged bootleg ring in Chicago was told before the Senate Daugherty Investigating Committee today by Brice Armstrong, a general prohibition agent.

Armstrong told how he had been threatened, his house blown up by a bomb and of alleged offers of a bribe of \$5 a barrel on beer from seven Chicago breweries. He connected many men high in Illinois politics with the alleged ring.

Armstrong brought the name of Attorney General Brundage of Illinois to the attention of the committee. Brundage, chairman of the Cook County Republican committee into his testimony.

James Illinois Brokerage Co. Armstrong charged that C. W. Middlekauf, a special assistant in the United States attorney general in Chicago, in charge of injunction cases against prohibition violators, had permitted many injunctions to "lay dormant."

He also charged Middlekauf with conspiring in a plot to permit the Pure Products company, accused of prohibition violations, to sell its property while an injunction against it, was temporarily lifted.

James Illinois Brokerage Co. Armstrong named the Illinois Beverage company, among others, that had been enjoined and the injunction never passed. This company, he said, was owned by "Terry Druggan and Frank Lake."

"It is the same 'gun crew' that owns the Standard Brewery and others," said Armstrong.

"Who were the attorneys for this 'gun crew'?" asked Senator Wheeler.

"Lowell R. Mason, state senator from the Oak Park district, who had violated the law," said the witness.

"Who was the man this bootlegging ring went to find out what to do?"

"Caught Red Handed. Homer Golbin, chairman of the state committee."

Officials of Brundage's office came to him and endeavored to have him dismiss a case against a bootlegger. He had "caught red handed selling poison stuff," Armstrong said.

Armstrong said "Terry Druggan personally had threatened him, telling him he would 'wreck' his life if he didn't lay off."

He said the offer of \$5 on a barrel of beer had been made and the offer would just stay out of the vicinity. The offer was made, he said, thru another prohibition agent who would offer, unless Armstrong agreed to accept it.

Smiths Government Quits at Capetown, Prince Stays Home

(Special to The Daily Worker) LONDON, April 7.—A central news dispatch from Capetown, says that the government headed by Premier Jan Smuts has resigned.

A Capetown message says the Prince of Wales has abandoned his South African trip, but his over-land trip in London hasn't confirmed the report.

There is much speculation as to whether the political crisis or the Prince's health is responsible for the reported cancellation.

Postponed Muscle Shoals Hearing. WASHINGTON, April 7.—Unless Senate floor managers, to be overruled by floor backers, the Senate agriculture committee will postpone hearings on the Muscle Shoals bill until next week.

SOUTH SLAVIC SECTION, W. P., IN CONFERENCE

Ranks Are Consolidated For Communism

Fifty-five delegates from all parts of the country gathered at the Second National Conference of the South Slavic Section of the Workers Party to review the work of the past year and to lay plans for future activities.

The delegates realized the tremendous tasks before them and went to work in all seriousness. The problems before the conference were: How to consolidate and strengthen the ranks of the South Slavic Federation; to determine the attitude towards those who left the party during the strike; to strengthen the federation against opportunism and petty bourgeois ideology; to increase the trade union work and carry out the party policy all along the line.

The membership increasing showed an increase in membership. Over 200 new members were brought in since the last conference, and 24 new branches were organized. The membership is active in every party activity, especially in the Labor Defense Council and the DAILY WORKER. The most important work was made in the campaign for the protection of the foreign-born workers.

About 70 per cent of the members are in the labor movement which is the U. M. W. of A., but that was not quite satisfactory to the convention and efforts will be made to increase membership in all eligible labor organizations.

Comrade C. F. Rubenstein, who represented the Central Executive Committee of the Workers Party, gave a report on the party activity and explained the course of the discussion, one of the resolutions adopted at the last party convention and at the enlarged meeting of the Central Executive Committee of the party. In the course of his speech he made it clear that every party member must engage in some party activity, otherwise he is not a good party member. The development of the Labor Party and our attitude towards the strike, that our party had a correct policy, which was nothing else than the American capitalist policy.

The American capitalist policy, the Front Policy, adopted by the leaders of the World Revolution—the Communist International. He said that the members must not only carry the party policy into effect, but they must also understand it. In regard to the struggle against the Federation, he said that the bureau fought for Communism, while the former editors, who were expelled from the party, represented an opportunistic tendency. His speech was heartily greeted by the whole conference.

True Communism Shown.

Comrade Fisher stated in his report on the economic and political situation, that the aggression of American imperialism against the cultural crisis in the United States gave the Communists an extraordinary opportunity to work for an alliance between the workers, farmers and oppressed peoples in the struggle against exploitation, reaction and oppression. In this struggle, the industrial proletariat must take the lead. The Communist must not fail to take advantage of this opportunity.

The delegates took a lively part in the discussion on every point on the agenda, especially on the question of the Labor Party, the Federation and the third bourgeois party.

A telegram expressing great sorrow over the death of our great leader, Comrade Lenin, was sent to Moscow. A declaration from the opposition came to the conference and submitted certain conditions for their return to the ranks of the party. The convention elected a committee which, in conformity with the representative of the Central Executive Committee of the party, drew up a reply to the effect that every expelled member, as well as those who voluntarily left the party, if they were sincere, should go to the respective branches and make an application for readmission. To every such application special consideration will be given by the branch and by the Central Executive Committee of the party.

The policy of the bureau in its fight against the former editors was unanimously approved by the convention.

Unity Prevails.

Never in the history of the South Slavic Federation was there such a unity of ideology and unanimity of decisions. Last year's convention was very stormy, there being three factions pitted against each other. The traces of this bitter conflict could not be found at this convention. The petty bourgeois ideology of Kuznetsov and Kuznetsov has been uprooted and there are no signs that it will ever be revived. The delegates left the convention with a firm determination to increase membership in the branches a hundred fold, to liquidate the remnants of the old Workers Party and to join the South Slavic section of the Workers Party with the Workers Party and draw the members into the active political work of the party.

Report by the Session of the Executive of the Communist International, held on January 6, 1936.

COMRADES!

I shall try to make clear the main points of difference. I believe the following questions to be most important:

I. The Dispute with regard to the essential character of the Bolshevik Party, and in connection therewith, the permissibility of the formation of fractions within the party.

2. Party Apparatus and Party Bureaucracy.

3. The Young and the Old in our Party.

4. The "degeneration" of the Old Guard, especially of the core of the Old Guard.

5. Special Differences of Opinion with regard to the DAILY WORKER.

6. The Portion of Forces in the Party.

7. Our Main Deal with these seven points.

I. Essential Character of the Bolshevik Party.

This question forms the real center of our discussion.

Our Party is a party which has already had a positive history. It possesses a number of peculiar features which we find in no other party. In the course of the course of the discussion, one of our oppositional students objected to the Russian Communist Party consisted of the following points:
