## World Court Decision Shows Baker's Hand

### COOLIDGE'S STAND FOR WALL STREET PREVAILS OVER VIEWS OF LODGE, WATSON, PEPPER

(Special to The Daily Worker)  
**CONVENTION HALL, CLEVELAND, O., June 10.**—The hand of J. Pierpont Morgan moves the puppets in the national republican convention now in session here.  
The House of Morgan will get everything that it wants, in spite of anything the delegates may say. Every move goes forward as if specially ordered from the offices of the International Banking House of Wall and Broad Streets in New York City.  
Take the one instance of how all opposition to Morgan's plans for the salvation of capitalism in Europe was swept aside. The first collision came on the question of the League of Nations world court plan. There was senatorial opposition from Pepper, Lodge and Watson, but this has been completely liquidated by the assaults of the Coolidge forces in favor of the Morgan-Howes plan for the entanglement of the United States in the affairs of capitalist Europe.

### FRENCH LEFTS CAN ONE-DAY GOVERNMENT

#### Millerand's Fall Is Deemed Near

**PARIS, June 10.**—The steps toward the overthrow today before it had time to say "Jack Robinson," by the French senate. The vote was 154 to 144.  
The short-lived cabinet did not expect a long and happy life. There was no surprise when the votes were counted. The main object for its coming into existence was to present to both houses of parliament the message from president Millerand, expressing his refusal to resign.  
Millerand said in his message that his government was trying to prevent the legislature with a revolutionary act. He hoped the senate would do likewise. His hopes were dashed.  
The radical bloc fears that Millerand in the event of a severe political setback, would, in conjunction with Poincaré, across the constitution and establish a dictatorship in the Italian fashion. That there was a plot to assassinate this about the time Morgan's 100 million dollars saved the franc and the Poincaré ministry, was rumored around Paris.  
Millerand is expected to resign next Thursday, as the left is determined not to accept office under him.

### Military Training in Cleveland Schools Is Condemned by Labor

**CLEVELAND, O., June 10.**—Military training will depart from the city schools if the parents represented by the Cleveland Federation of Labor have their way. The organized labor population of this city has unanimously adopted a resolution against the draft for military training. It is expected that the board of education will take some action on the protest of the labor people.

### Turks Buy Most of Their Grain Cheaper from Soviet Russia

**MOSCOW, June 10.**—A commission of the Turkish Government, which arrived recently in Sopotopol, declares that 75 per cent of the total grain imported into Constantinople is Russian grain. The quality of the latter is excellent, and the price cheaper than American grain.

### OHIO WORKERS LAUNCH FARMER-LABOR PARTY

#### Seven Delegates Will Go to St. Paul

**CLEVELAND, June 10.**—The Ohio State Farmer-Labor Party was launched at Columbus yesterday, a complete ticket for the major political offices of the state was nominated, a state executive committee elected, seven delegates chosen to represent Ohio in the St. Paul national farmer-labor convention to be held on June 17, and a ringing rebuke administered to Senator Robert M. LaFollette or anyone else who may want to confuse this movement in order that he be turned from its path into merely the tail to the political ambitions of any individual. The delegates elected to attend the St. Paul convention were instructed to stand firm for the immediate formation of a national Farmer-Labor party and committed to oppose any attempt to discriminate against any element of workers in the formation of such national party.  
The Columbus convention was held in response to the call issued by the central labor bodies of three Ohio cities, Lima, Mansfield and Marion.

## Forged Names in His Attack on St. Paul

ST. PAUL, June 10.—Mr. J. A. H. Hopkins, of the Ethical Committee of 48, carries political parties around in his vest pocket—but they refuse to stay. He thought he could handle the St. Paul Convention also, and when he found he could not, he withdrew with much newspaper noise—all 48 of him. But before he left, he made a malicious record of loose political maneuvering. Under the name of Hopkins' attacks, Gompers now tries to attack the St. Paul Convention arrangements committee.

Committee Refutes Falsehoods. The Arrangements Committee has issued an answer to a statement of Gompers, repeated by the Socialists, that the names of the Progressive parties of Idaho and Pennsylvania were used without their permission. The statement reads: "Did the National Arrangements Committee force the names of the Progressive party of Idaho and the Progressive party of Pennsylvania to the call for the National Farmer-Labor Convention to be held in St. Paul on June 17th?" Gompers sends out letters. The International News Service, the news service of Mr. Gompers, carries the story that Mr. Cookley acting as a member of the Progressive party of Pennsylvania had his name signed without his knowledge or permission. (They are mistaken so far as Mr. Samuel's name is concerned as that is not on the call.) This is certainly very damaging news to the supporters of a National Farmer-Labor Party. The committee that we thought Mr. Hopkins had "all of his organizations in his vest pocket."

Hopkins Endorsed Call. You see it was this time—conference was held in St. Paul on November 15th and March 10th, attended by representatives of bona fide Farmer-Labor parties. It was also attended by Mr. J. A. H. Hopkins that is what caused our trouble. It was decided to issue a call for a national convention. The present signed the call. Mr. Hopkins said he had some parties that he knew would endorse a statement and asked that they be permitted to sign later after he had had opportunity to correspond with them.

Hopkins' Letters Show His Lie. A few weeks later he sent a mass communication received from him a list of organizations, including Pennsylvania and Idaho. It is a statement that they wanted their names added to the call. We have his letter also. He has the letters of these organizations on file. At any rate, it becomes apparent that Mr. Hopkins cannot deliver. He has now gone to the C. P. P. A. We have had our disagreements with those who were opposed to the formation of an independent party, but we never washed them any such luck as that.

## Even Indians Think Time Propitious for Burying of Hatchet

TULSA, Okla., June 10.—Ten thousand Americans Indians held their first national powwow here today. The Osage, made rich by oil, arrived in costly imitations. They are spitefully dressed and act with costly fiery in contrast to their poorer cousins who dress in their own skins. Hundreds arrived by pony or by rail. Tents were pitched at Sand Springs Park where country dances are held. The richer tribes held Tulsa's prominent hostesses. From the north woods, the Everglades of Florida, the Snow Camp Rockies and the government reservations, warriors of the flat distinguishing tribes arrived. Hereditary enemies would bury the hatchet for the last time. One thousand red men grazed in the dance of peace and goodwill. Among the prominent visitors are Oklahoma House Chief (not Horse Tail) Little, son of the chief of the Peace tribe who wears a head dress valued at \$10,000; Bacon Rind, picture actor; Henry Sisk, Ponce de Leon and leader of the Snow Camp dance. Joe Rebeck of the Incoyot tribe of Montreal traveled the greatest distance to attend the convention.

It is easier to criticise than to construct. Far easier to condemn than to perform. The program is everywhere—would that their numbers might diminish—and the parties in that argument is favorable to his cause are eagerly accepted as heaven-born injunctions, while opposing arguments are treated as emanations from the depraved. Under the cloak of patriotism interest is brewed against the station and or ignorance sometimes displaces reason and truth.

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All of which will stir the unruly French workers to make more of those troublesome demands of which the leaders have been complaining since the election. It is indeed troublesome to have a rank and file that makes demands; indications are that the French politicians will have, before long, a rank and file that also acts. For the French workers are swinging toward Communism.

Whenever a murder is committed in the city of Chicago, the Tribune is the first to publish the Chicago Tribune's main circulation area, and paper howls for the blood of the murderer.

The long fought battle between the Tribune and the other newspapers of the city for the right to publish the names of the murderers is now over. The Tribune has won.

For a long time this official was able to make their expansion easy, because there were such people in the ranks of the miners' union, but the expansion never carried the information that these people had been put down.

Why? The answer is obvious. The fathers of the murderers are wealthy. Because of their wealth they are respectable. No doubt they advertise in the Tribune. They might, by advertising with the Tribune indicate its customary desire for more sacrifices to glut its insatiable thirst for human blood.

In addition to the many men who are known to protect them, the Tribune is known to protect them. A glaring example is the case of the man who was arrested in Pennsylvania, District No. 1 at Pittsburgh, where a man by the name of John J. Brennan is a professional detective and no attempt is made to keep the

plot and oppression of the working class, thousands of Communists and revolutionary workers are thrown into the Federal prison at Leavenworth.

These tens of thousands of revolutionaries and their families must be fed. The working class movement is international in scope. The struggle is not local, not national—it is international in scope.

The Social-Democratic parties, with one exception, have placed themselves on the side of the capitalist system. Look the promoters of the "Socialist commonwealth," when the moment for action comes they flinch and supported the capitalists against the revolution.

Also the hands of capitalism have been freed for any acts of vandalism against the working class, the capitalist and capitalist governments do not feel perfectly secure. They no longer trust "democracy" to keep the workers peaceful.
