LABOR PREMIER UNDER FIRE FOR MEXICAN CRISIS

British Government's Foot in Oil

(Special to the Daily Worker) LONDON, June 19.—Criticism of Premier Ramsay MacDonald and the Labor government for their handling of the Mexican crisis has increased since the Mexican government has again politically offered to let the British agent provocateur, H. A. C. Cummins, depart in peace if he will go soon.

MacDonald has shown the whole Mexican recognition issue and since he has headed the government and shown no interest in behalf either of the workers of England or of Mexico. Bove to Bove.

His action is being condemned as one of the most glaring failures of the Labor government to safeguard the people as opposed to the capitalist-imperialists, particularly the oil barons of the Shell company.

President Obregon of Mexico has been rightly ignored by MacDonald and the Labor premier's critics. The premier promises to monitor the settlement of the British-Mexican situation, but instead he allowed the "ambitious" Cummins to head off the protection of the British legation in Mexico City, from where Cummins sent out the most treacherous reports on Mexican conditions.

Like slavishly, Cummins' scurrilous and wholly untruthful notes to the Mexican foreign relations committee have come to light in the present crisis. The report is by Cummins' lying reports on the case of Mrs. Rosalinda Ybarra, a Mexican woman, in which Mexico took a determined stand to get the victim freed from her captors.

British agents have been amazed that the British government, especially under a Labor premier, could allow such humiliation by its representative to continue.

Mexico has made every proper move to get England's diplomatic attention. The big business of the state has each time agreed on recognition, according to the critics of the government. In the present instance Mexico has again been polite and given the lying British agent another chance to leave the country without a stain upon its reputation for more than two years he has been a constant offense and source of danger to the Obregon government.

The Chilean minister's intervention is held responsible for this latest concession on the part of Macdonald in granting Cummins another chance. Macdonald's appeal to the United States secretary of state, Mrs. Ambassador Kellogg, did not win the Labor premier any respect. It was obviously a move of the premier to big business to stir up American opinion in Mexico that is trying to stabilize itself constitutionally, since it had not yet reached the position of a real workers' government.

It is expected that Sir Thomas Blaber will go to Mexico, as previously planned, to make an investigation and report to Britain on the desirability of recognition. Cummins' departure is anticipated, unless Macdonald allows himself to stop even lower in listening to the cries of the capitalist.

POLITICAL MUMMIES HEADED BY GOMPERS PLAN TO BLOCK FARMER-LABOR STAMPEDE TO ST. PAUL

The real issue, as far as the farmers and industrial workers are concerned, has passed beyond the stage of the pure selection of a standpat bearer of the LaFollette type which may mitigate a feeble middle class protest against the present corrupt system of government. It has become a question of the mass revolt, the mass break-away from the old corrupt parties and the organization of a new party which can effectively engage in the struggle to wrest the state from the hands of Wall Street.

Press Supports Farmers. This middle class politician and reactionist labor leader, who is just what they need and are ready to fight to prevent. In this movement they are being actively supported by the boss controlled daily press. For weeks they have been telling the workers and farmers to stay away from the June 17th convention and to support the LaFollette ticket. Only the DAILY WORKER is bringing the real issue before the eyes of the workers and farmers.

The great importance of the DAILY WORKER, particularly in this situation, may not yet be able to fully realize. But one thing we certainly do know, and that is that we have not the time to spare to put the DAILY WORKER in a position where it may clash with the interests of the country to another, into every worker's home. All the readers of the DAILY WORKER should form one great, solid army of active boosters, each reaching a new reader every day of the year.

ST. PAUL, June 19.—The Ku Klux Klan completely dominates the church, schools and politics of the state of Oklahoma, according to Daniel Cobb, delegate from the Laundry Workers' union of Oklahoma City, to the Farmers-Labor convention here.

Cobb, former secretary of the Socialist Party in Oklahoma, upon the graduation of his daughter, Fern Cobb, from the normal school a month ago, sent out a circular letter in an attempt to find a teaching position for her. He was told that it was futile for his daughter to attempt to teach in Oklahoma, because the school boards were controlled by the Klan, and required prospective teachers to be members of the Koo Koo organization.

"They didn't treat me right," cried Josephine Batolomew, a 15-year-old inmate of the Hope Development School, as she confessed that she set the match to sack and kiding in the basement of the home on the night of May 21. "I didn't like things at home, so I set the fire."

Because the girl is mentally defective, no charges will be pressed against her, but charges of criminal negligence ought to be placed against the authorities responsible for the conditions which prevailed in the school. The girls were kept in a rickety old beach pavilion which had long before been condemned as unsafe.

As usual in state institutions, particularly those which are supposed to take care of the poor, the defective, the insane and the feeble-minded, about as they had no feelings, are given the cheapest food obtainable, which is subjected to the nagging of paying attendants whose strongest motive is to get the most out of the Governor.
