## AS WE SEE IT

CHARLES EVANS HUGHES will not direct the course of the United States' foreign policy after the March 4 date on which the Massachusetts mill king, H. V. Rogers, takes over the White House for Wall Street, through the capitalist machine, Calvin Coolidge. Hughes' letters of resignation leaves nothing to be desired in the way of diplomatic refinement, but capitalist statements are not accepted as a basis for telling the truth even when no good purpose can be served by lying.

Why did Hughes quit the cabinet? This question will be asked and answered for many a day to come. We are not interested in superficial reasons. This much we do know: The committee of the capitalists and individually, the representatives of powerful groups of capitalists. When the president of the group is not getting its share of the spoils it is customary to sphere a resignation on the part of the minister of finance. It is not this case that there are more reasons.

HUGHES is a capitalist statement in the Wilson speech. He could not have made a more explicit statement of the interests of capitalism as a whole. His extremely hostile attitude towards Soviet Russia has a tendency to surrender points to England in order to save that country's dignity in the matter of the United front for the exploitation of the world by the big robber powers; his desire for peace with Japan is a result of his unfortunate suggestion to a previous Japanese ambassador on the Imperia question; his preference for the United States to do some substitute for the league of nations that could be put over on the United States; all these policies indicate that Hughes had the aim of bringing about an international alliance among the big capitalist powers for the common exploitation of the world in this regard; the destruction of the power of the workers and peasants of Russia figured prominently.

PHILADELPHIA the question of Soviet recognition is at the bottom of the Hughes act. The rise of Senator Hughes, an advocate of Soviet recognition to power in the present government and the death of Senator Connors, a bitter foe of Russia, makes the position of Hughes very difficult. There is no doubt that the question of Soviet recognition will come up immediately at least after March 3. Obviously Hughes' preference for conservative methods in the case of evidence collected by his investigators during the last four years, designed to prove that Russia is interfering with the internal affairs of the United States. Hughes is a good instance of a man who is not intelligent, which is not our fault. The reason for Hughes' retirement will become evident as time goes on. We cannot miss the luxury of those who have.

UNLESS the German revolution is a member at least a part of those who socialize the Communist's will work back that they lost in the recent election. # Germans Want to Collect in Munitions

William Morgan Butler, Coolidge's Labor Commissioner, has controlled the New Bedford Cotton Manufacturers' Association, and in the meantime has been cutting wages in the mills of New Bedford. The action follows a similar wage cut in the cotton mills of Fall River.

REVIEW OF FOREIGN LABOR STATUS SHOWS INSTABILITY OF CAPITALISM THE WORLD OVER

By LELAND OLDS (Federation Trade Industrial Editor) In Austria unemployment has been a month since August, 1925. The number of subsidized unemployed on Dec. 30, was 116,000. In a similar condition completely lost the New York City. The large number of New Year's eve was attributed by the Austrians are experiencing.

In Belgium the coal mines were shut down by a hard fought strike by which the miners won a 5 per cent increase. In Bulgaria wages remained low in spite of the steadily mounting cost of living.

In Denmark the number of unemployed has increased seasonally from 20,000 in November to 25,000 in December. In the same month a year ago there were 22,500 unemployed.

In Lithuania wages of farm laborers are lower than a year ago with farmers finding it difficult to pay expenses and taxes.

In Norway the end of widespread labor conflicts has been followed by an increase in industrial operations.

In Poland strikes have been frequent during 1925. In spite of the fact foreign capital has been increasing its hold, coming especially from Italy and Great Britain.

In Romania labor is suffering from a severe depression with manufacturing industries running at 50 per cent capacity.

In South Africa unemployment is prevalent with both the national and the local governments attempting projects to furnish employment. The banks and mines are paying generous dividends. The gold mines report profits 25 per cent greater than 1925, having introduced efficiency methods to speed up productivity.

In Sweden employers decided to lockout 100,000 metal trades and textile workers to combat demands for wage increases. Lockouts of other trades are expected and it is expected that a large part of Sweden's organized labor will be affected. The government has appointed an arbitration commission.

BRITISH MENACE U. S. GRIP ON COTTON MARKET

Migration of Negroes Causes Labor Shortage

"Due to a steady migration of cotton belt Negroes to industrial centers of the north and east, there has developed a serious labor shortage in this region of the United States," says the report. The report shows a steady decline since the strike began in this country, and increased production by foreign countries.
