Union Organizer Has a Big Meeting

UTICA, N. Y., Jan. 28.—The Utica Steam Cotton Mills and the New York Mills, both of which have announced a wage cut of 10 percent.

A mass meeting of workers was held at the Utica Y. W. C. A. on Friday evening, addressed by Joseph R. White, organizer for the United Textile Workers.

The speaker, though lacking any military might, moved the large audience of textile workers to great enthusiasm with the mere promise that the union would not accept the reduction.

This mild expression of resistance was, of course, for the benefit of the textile workers, who expect the union really to put up a fight. But it was modified by White's subsequent remarks that he "was not advocating any strike."

Why Not One Union—And One Voice? The Loometers' Union has declared unanimously, it is said, against the cut, and similar action was taken Friday by the spinners, carders and weavers in a closed meeting of the union, following the mass meeting.

The effort will be made to call a meeting during the day or Saturday and Sunday to bring about an amicable adjustment of the matter, as all strikes affecting the industry are forbidden by the bosses.

U. S. SENATE VOTES TO CONTINUE BLOODY DOLLAR RULE IN HAITI

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28.—Withdrawal of American military forces from Haiti, which they had maintained as a vassal state since 1915, was defeated without a record vote by the Senate today.

Senator Odie of Nevada attempted the customary eulogy of the marine regime in the Negro republic. Senator King replied with a scathing denunciation of the killing of thousands of Haitians absolutely at the mercy of the conquerors.

King asked how Latin America would ever have faith in the friendly intentions of our state departments when before their eyes was so impressive a demonstration of the fruits of imperialism. Because the Haitians are predominantly of African blood, the southern democrats in the senate are indifferent to their fate.

The southern democrats remember, too, that William Jennings Bryan and Joseph Daniels were the cabinet officers who ordered the marines to take possession of Haiti.

BERLIN, Jan. 28.—The central organ of the social-democratic party of Hungary has published the text of the pact which the leaders of the party concluded with the Horthy government on Dec. 22, 1921.

The declaration of the prime minister Count Bethlen, which appeared in the Christmas number of the "Neue Freie Presse," that in an event of the renunciation of the social-democratic members of parliament he would see it as necessary to publish the pact concluded with the social-democrats in 1921, compelled the party leaders of the social-democrats to publish this shameful document themselves.

These Hungarians scoundrels, with the signing of this pact, not only suppressed Noeke's record, but also their own openly shameful record which they raised by their participation in the bloody government of Noeke.

When one reads the text of the pact one perceives that only the most desperate situation could have compelled the social-democrats to publish this shameful document themselves.

In the bloody treaty which was concluded three years ago between the allied great capitalist and czarist government of the one part and the leaders of the social-democratic party of Hungary of the other part, the Hungarian proletarian was delivered over to the worst of the Magyar nation to the terror, in the strictest sense of the word.

As every social-democratic program contains a statement of principles and transition demands, so is it the case in this program, and it is difficult to decide which part of the social-democratic program of 1921 constitutes the protest crime against the Hungarian proletarian.
