Boiled Again!

Desperate Desmond, a melodramatic comic strip character found dead several years ago, chased the heroine daily to the delight of lovers of the sensational and lively comic strip only to see his body slipping from his grasp. "Fogain" he would say, as he gnashed his teeth with rage.

Now the notorious case of the Illinois mine workers' association, the same gentlemen who led the hue and cry against the Hertha miners, is out protesting against the pardon of Vind and his cohorts. If the working class were properly organized, Vind would never have been convicted on such a frame-up charge and there would be no need for representatives of labor to go hat in hand to a capitalist government asking for favors, which the workers would never take in their own right.

Scabbing on the Pressmen

George L. Berry, international president of the Pressmen's and Amalgamated Union, is now doing to the members of his own union what Tom Rickert of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America has done to the members of the Amalgamated Clothing Workers. There is, however, a trifling difference. "Majah" Berry is hiring union scabs to break a strike that he has paraded through the streets of Chicago, while Rickert and paying per capita tax to the union of which he is president. Rickert is hiring union scabs to break a strike on a rival union. If the scab can be made between the two labor cohorts, the breaks must be given to Rickert.

Just as soon as Tom Rickert's agents showed their scabby faces in Chicago the DAILY WORKER was busy exposing the scabbers and brought down upon their heads the condemnation of the Chicago labor movement. Then the initiative of locals of the machinists' union, which had been given by the Chicago Federation of Labor officials were forced to take action, thus earning the censure of the president of the American Federation of Labor, the angel guardian of official scabbing.

It was a splendid thing for the Chicago trade union movement to place the stamp of its official censure on union strikebreaking. Even the action described in this article is something entirely new. Similar action should be taken in the case of Berry's scabbers. There are men on strike to prevent another big printing company from establishing open shops in Chicago. The scabbers, who are the same kind of unionists in the printing industry, who work in the clothing industry. As the Amalgamated Workers are fighting for genuine unionism in the clothing industry, so locals 2 and 4 of the Pressmen's and Amalgamated Union are fighting in the printing industry.

The delegates to the next meeting of the Chicago Federation of Labor should go on record against Berry's strikebreaking tactics. Local unions should take up the matter.

This is a vital matter. The interests of one union man are the concerns of all. If Berry succeeds in breaking the strike at Conso's big plant, he will give aid and comfort to the growing open shop movement in Chicago.
