But compulsion in principle was maintained largely from fear of a general flight from Government into private employment; and it was applied by the Commissariat of Labor no so far to favor Government enterprises in their negotiations with private employers. The Trade Unions, however, were determined to secure complete freedom of contract and the Fifth Congress, September, 1922, finally ratified the "free contract" Code of Laws. The new agreement was based on "occasions of general crisis," thus preserving it in principle as a last resort.
