

CIVIL WAR IN CHINA FACTOR FOR LIBERATION Imperialist Tools Lose Everywhere

(Special to the Daily Worker)

PEKING, China, Nov. 19.—After having led the army of 100,000 men commanded by General T'ang Tseng-shan, the Chinese Nationalist Government has captured the city of T'ung-shan, the capital of the province of Szechwan, in the Szechwan region. This city lies 100 miles south of Peking.

Protection of Children in Russia is Product of the 1917 Revolution

TODAY, without having heard the attack in the Chicago Tribune on the care of children in Soviet Russia, the editor of the Russian Review, issued from Washington, D. C., the publisher of the Chicago Tribune, has written to the Soviet Union, in which this initial declaration is made:

"Before the revolution... the question of physical and psychological protection of children was entirely ignored and left to private charity. The revolution of 1917 the protection of children's health became a concern of the state and the government. The Chicago Tribune will not publish that."

That is the charge made with joy especially by the younger generation in the Soviet Union; that the Tribune is trying to hide from the workers of this country by gross exaggeration of the fact that there are still a few homeless children, orphans, who may be found leading wretched lives in the cities. The fact is that the Tribune has not seen fit to mention the fact that the children of the cities are being protected by the state through the establishment of kindergartens, day nurseries, and schools.

By 1918, when the world war was coming to an end, enabling the imperialist nations to turn their attention to war on Soviet Russia, this department had already undertaken the task of creating standardized children's health institutions as models for similar establishments in the provinces."

The face of physical examinations and medical advice is gone thru with in the schools of some American cities. But this is not the case in the Soviet Union. COLUMBIA, Ohio, Nov. 18.—Since the J. B. Clay and Co. pipe foundry, succeeded in breaking the members' Union with the help of the 1922 strike, working conditions in the shop have been getting worse and worse. Some of the best mechanics have had to quit because they could not stand the new speed-up and because of the new machinery from hot sand cast and gas from shavings in pits and molting fumes.

The men are in constant fear of big castings and from big ladles introduced at the Studebaker plant. Electric cranes, overhead cranes, gas and dust is thickest up above where the crane operates. This again aggravates the danger of hitting someone.

Common laborers, who have the dirtiest work and are the poorest paid, are being asked to spend more or get fired. When a fellow worker has killed this fall by a big tank fall on him, the foreman refused allow the men five minutes' stoppage of work to pay respects to their dead associate on the funeral day.

As the place is full of machinery, it makes it hard for the workers to take union action to react to the company's methods. But it is expected that some dissatisfaction is growing in hope and bode.
