NAIL FACTORY IS 'NUT HOUSE' FOR WORKERS

Boys Deafened by Din of Nail Machines

MONESIE, Pa. April 17.—In a section of one of the Pittsburgh steel mills in Monesie, Pa., called the "nut-house," unspeakable noise and so much dust that the boys are deafened mostly young boys.

Up to a short time ago we were working on fairly basis getting 43 cents an hour. Now piece work has been introduced. It was bad enough working on work, now one man is required to do the work formerly done by four or five and still the wages are only 70 cents more a day. The machine noise operator can make a day.

"Nut House"—Correctly called the department is nicknamed the "nut-house" because that is just what it is. With 300 machines all run at the same time in one room it is to drive anyone crazy. Every day the hammer on one of these machines hits, a nail drop out. On average each hammer hits 300 times a minute depending on the size of the nail, and every time the workers have to pack their teeth with cotton. There is no chance to talk to any of your neighbors of the shop, they wouldn't hear you even if you'd try. Everyone has to make himself understood by the motion of his hands and arms.

Constant splashing of oil from the machines not only covers the machines creating a heavy grease but it also covers the workers and soaks their overalls and underwear clear to the skin, coating the body with oil. And in this condition the young workmen go to home, no provision is made to wash up and change clothing.

Each operator runs six and seven machines for 10 hours on day turn and 12 hours on night turn. Who said steel workers have an eight-hour day?

Government Would Shield Rich Office Holders in Tax Case

WASHINGTON, April 17.—The right of newspapers to publish individual income tax payments was argued today before the supreme court of the United States. The Kansas City Journal-Post and the Baltimore Daily Post, two of the many newspapers publishing such returns under the publicity feature of the 1924 revenue law, were indicted by the government for this test case.

The lower federal courts held publications were legal.

The rich men of the country, especially those holding high government positions, were embarrassed by the publication of the amount of their fortunes.

Solicitor General Beck argued for the government.

Senator Reed of Missouri, and former Secretary of War Newton D. Baker, of Ohio, representing the newspapers, argued that the law gave the right of publication in the newspapers when it provided that the returns should be opened to public inspection. They insisted the attempt to punish the newspapers for publishing these returns was an abridgment of the freedom of the press, which was prohibited by the federal constitution.

Boston Teachers' Rates Paid. BOSTON, Mass., April 17.—The house, by a vote of 33 to 46, passed a bill raising Boston teachers' wages 10 per cent. The bill faces a fight in the senate.

TEACHERS' WAGE LOSSES IN RACE WITH LIVING COST

Urge N. Y. Governor to Sign Salary Bill

ALBANY, N. Y., April 17.—There was a terrific crash when the 1,000 teachers, parents and friends of the teachers piled into the executive chamber to urge Governor Smith to sign the teachers' salary bill.

The United Real Estate Owners, who has been attacking the teachers' bill in New York City and who expressed such confidence in the governor that he would not sign the bill after he talked to him, was on hand and brought with him one or two teachers, whom he could use.

In his vitriolic speech he denounced the teachers as a pack of thieves and among other things said the bill had been "cleared" thru the legislature by the teachers. This did not come as a surprise to anyone of the teachers for Brown has used no scruples in his campaign to kill the bill. One of the New York papers quote him as declaring that the teachers are only half educated and ill like pickpockets.

Children of Teachers. Attorney Samuel T. Hays, who appeared for the teachers who were first speaker in favor of the bill. He said it was the duty of the city to get the right kind of teachers, not in saying this, he added: "I am concerned about the teachers but I am more concerned about the children of our public schools."

Supreme Court Justice T. C. C. Crain also spoke for the teachers. He said he had no misgivings about the financial ability of the city to pay the teachers what they ask. He stressed the mental attitude of the teacher saying it was as important as the manual ability of the teacher. He said, "are entitled to have in the classroom not merely one equipped from the scholastic standpoint to impart instruction but one who is not an unimpaired, undisciplined teacher with a cheerful outlook upon life. If our children are to have all that should come to them from our public schools it is short-sighted to continue to underpay the teacher."

Mr. Lasher proved by statistics how the teachers' salaries had not kept pace with the decrease in the purchasing power of the dollar. A number of teachers spoke urging the governor to sign the bill. The Women's City Club filed a memorandum in favor of the bill with the governor.

It is claimed that Governor Smith will put the bill up to Mayor Hylan under the home rule law.

The Bulgarian Situation

The inevitable has happened in Bulgaria. The bloody oppressions of the Zankov government, following the overthrow of the Stamboulsky peasant régime, have made the workers and peasants desperate...

The officials of the Zankov government, generals and cabinet members, make up the most of the casualties. No one will mourn them except the allied imperialists who recently allowed these murderers to add three thousand more degenerates to the remnants of Wrangel's army...

The bomb explosion in Sofia comes shortly after the exposure of an international plot, financed directly by the Zankov government, having for its purpose the murder of all the leaders of the Bulgarian workers and peasants and many prominent officials of the Soviet government...

The Zankov government not only sent punitive expeditions into the villages and tortured and murdered peasants and workers wholesale, but had under way a scheme by which opposition members of parliament were murdered in the streets and in their homes. Life in Bulgaria for the masses is a nightmare of bloody horror.

It is quite obvious now that the Zankov government is not going to last for any great length of time. The Bulgarian masses have had a long training in fighting tyranny and the explosion in Sofia is proof that the mass terror has not stamped out their will to fight back.

The czar could not kill the will to revolt by filling the prisons and slaughtering thousands. Neither can the Zankov government, even tho it is supported by the social-democrats of Bulgaria and the allied imperialists, succeed in saving itself from a mightier vengeance than that of the recent explosion.

Miners' Enemies Expose Themselves

Farrington, president of District 12, United Mine Workers of America, makes a trip to Chicago. The next day the Journal of Commerce publishes an exclusive story in which it is stated that negotiations for a revision of the existing agreement between the union and the operators are in progress...

This is the first that anyone has heard of the matters mentioned. Has Farrington been plotting a reduction of wages, dealing with the coal operators' association without the knowledge of the union?

Again, the Journal of Commerce story contains the names of Watt and Thompson, officials of Sub-District 4, whom Farrington is trying to unseat and expel. The mouthpieces of the coal operators states openly that Watt and Thompson are the chief obstacles in the way of "readjustment" of wages—the euphemistic term for a wage cut.

Here is evidence of something more than sympathetic understanding between union officials and the coal capitalists. It is evidence of a hard and fast alliance by which the coal operators and their press engage to fight Farrington's battles in return for his betrayal of the miners.

The Journal of Commerce story refers to Watt and Thompson as "disrupters," but since when has an organ of the capitalists been hostile to real disrupters? The capitalists always welcome anything and anyone that weakens a union and it is obvious that they are disrupting the plans of Farrington and the coal capitalists to the union.

This is the reason why the Journal of Commerce, the coal barons and Farrington join hands in the offensive against them and the fighting program which they lay before the coal miners.

The Barr Cossack Bill

The raging with disgust because it could not secure the passage of its pet state police bill, the Chicago Tribune wisely urged its big business supporters to back the Barr bill which is not so good, but is a step in the right direction.

The Tribune deserves credit for exercising sound political judgment in this fight for the state cossacks, which has been waged by the Illinois chamber of commerce representing the employing class of Illinois, for several years. The main obstacle in the way of the state police was the opposition of the organized workers. Their labor leaders had to be placated. Governor Small, their Santa Claus, was the only one that could do this. The Tribune reasons correctly, from the big business point of view, that once the opposition of the organized labor movement is liquidated thru the surrender of its official leaders, it will be an easy matter in some future legislature to amend the Barr bill or introduce another bill that will suit the employers down to the ground.

The labor misleaders, no doubt, will brag that they won a victory in defeating the Dunlap bill which was the favorite of the big business interests represented by the chambers of commerce. But how can they explain the fact that the Chicago Tribune, their beto nor, supported the Barr bill as a step in the right direction?

The fact is that the state cossacks have been put over very badly by the misleaders of this state. They are the concinnance of the labor fakery who are not so stupid that they could not see what was being done, but whose treachery knows no limit.

The action of the labor leaders in supporting this bill is only additional proof that they have gone over bag and baggage into the camp of the capitalists.

PUTS SPLUNDER POST OFFICE WITH UNCLE SAM'S AID

Workers' 8-Hour Day Goes By the Board

Without flinching a "hat" without uttering a threat of violence, the advertisement posters have for the past week been robbing Uncle Sam's post office on a scale compared with what the Roundout and Leonard St. mail robbers were pikers' pickings.

To escape paying the higher rates, the publishers of circulars that became effective on April 15, these capitalist dole dispensers have for the past weeks flooded the post office with millions upon millions of circulars that ordinarily they would have sent at other times, until the service, the employees, is straining under this unprecedented

Police Break Up Workers' Protest

Touring the country in the interest of the International Red Aid on behalf of the Polish workers, the police broke up a meeting of the workers who from his intimate knowledge of the Polish situation, being the editor of Tribuna Robotnicza, the Polish Communist weekly of Chicago, was not able to give a strong and well-received address; a resolution was adopted protesting against the white terror in Poland and other foreign countries, and the Polish government.

J. A. Hamilton, local organizer of the International Red Aid, who acted as chairman, then told the audience of the police ruling as to the collection.
