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COMRADES! Acfoss the sea the workcrs are rising, wave on wave. The surf of Social Revolution beats on the crumbling dikes of the old order.
The nations of the world are bankrupt. The Capitalist System is bankrupt. The headlong competition of the two imperialist groups of nations, resulting in the great war, has wrecked the international credit system upon which Capitalist Imperialism is based, and taug the industrial proletariat that there is no hope for the world but in the Socialist Commonwealth.

At the sane time, that "Socialism" in whici the "orking class of Europe so coniidently trunted to avoid a world war, went down lite a house of cards before the first serious milaught of international cap:taism. The Second International joined the Army! Rewitdered and hetrayed, the workers were divided and romumered horled. ints the trenche, in slaughter and be slaughtered.
"Moderate Socialism" revealed itself in its true colors. Hawing adopted the tactics of paliamentary action within the capitalist state, the "Moderate Socialist" leaders found themselyes forced to uphold capitalism in its grand climactic crime, and consoled themselves by preaching that the War was the last great "reform"-a step in that slow and peaceful evolution from autocracy to parliamentary democracy, and then to Socialism, in which they believed.
Obsesied with this theory, they beheld the disillusioned proletariat rising to overthrow the parliamentary state, between whom and the Kaiser the workers saw little to choose. And the "Moderate Socialists," in Russia and Cermany, found themselves on the capitalist side of the barricades, shoothong down workers to preserve their petit bourgeots theories.
Capitalism is bankrupt. And "Moderze Sociatism," an integral part of the capitalist system, is also bankrupt. Therefore the question of "moderate versus revolutionary Socialism is ne longer debatable. The sum and substance of parliamentary democracy is the Wrond Wat, now happily ended with all the belligercrets defeated-and among them, the "Moderate Socialists."
The workers know now that only by means of the Dictatorship of the Proletariat can they actrieve their ends. And the experience of the Rassian Soviet Republic, atfacked on alt sides by the combined eapitalists of the wortd, tat shown brilliantly that only the destruction of the capitatist forms of goverament, and the erection of a new
prolctarian state, can guarante the workers' revolutionary victories.
The American Socialist Party, alhough its idfierent currents have not thecn as clearty defined as those of European countries, has been for years contrulled by petit bourgeoll Uements.It has compromised with bourgeois liberatism to a point where its campaign literature, and the writings of its leaders, sounded like a movement to return to Jeffersonian Democracy; it has pushed reformism to a point where the Progressive Party could safely adopt planks from its platform ; it has entangled itself with capitalistic parlamentarism to the point where Meyer London could support the war and still be renmminated-where Socialist Aldermen could vote for Liberty Bonds and still be asked to speak at official Party meeting to greet the proletarian revolutions in En-rope-where a Socialist Major could join Gompers' Alliance for Labor and Democracy. and not be censured.
The Non-Partisan League, the Labor Party, the League of Free Nations, the People's Council-to the suppart of all these our Socialist leaders instinctively rush-to the support of everything except Revolutionary Socialism. They greet Kerensky as as revolutionary proletarian; they endorse the Ebert-Scheidemann Government as a "Socialist" Government; they hasten to send delegates to the Berne Conference of socialpatriots, who are as responsible for the war as Wilhelm.

We of the Left Wing declare that we repudiate "Moderate Socialism" and all its hourgeois affiliations, whose activities, however sincerely meant, are nevertheless directed toward patcling up the capitalist system and aroiding the Social Revolution. We demand that the American forialist Party adopt this attitude.

We take our stand with the Russian Commuriist jarty (Bolsheviki), with the Sparc... ues of (jermany, and the Communists of Hungary and Bavaria, believing that only through the Dictatorship of the Proletariat can the Socialist order be brought about.

And in token of our position, we have named our official organ The New York Communist:

## Why the New York Communist?

WHY does the New York Left Wing establish another paper? Isn't The Revolutionary Age enough to represent the Ieft Wing? Are we fighting The Revolutionary Age? If not, if we intend to publish a paper which cannot compete with The Revolutionary Age, why do we call it The New York Communist? All over the country a multitude of little Socialist papers is springing up, all professedy advocating Left Wing principles and tactics. With the resources of the Left Wing so weak, why do we divide our forces still further?
First, let us make our bow to The Revolutionary Age, which, with the support of Local Boston, and under the brilliant editorship of Comrade Louis Fraina, has, from the beginning, been the best expression of tevolutionary Socialism ever published in this country-and indeed, has created a new type of Socialist journalism here.

The Revolutionary Age is to be, withont any doubt, the official organ of the National Left Wing, which will be created by the National Left Wing Conference. This is made more certain by the generosity of the

Comrades of Local Boston, who have passed a resolution providing that the paper, with all its assets, shall be turfied ower to the Execuitive Committer of the Left Wing as soon as it shall be constituted.

But in the meanwhile, the New York Left Wing, which has taken the initiative in forming a National Left Wing by issuing its Manifesto and Program, has no organ of its cwn. The Revolutionary Age cannot fill our needs. It is the organ of Local Boston; so far it has confined itself largely to being "A Chronicle and Interpretation of Events in !urope"; it has no space, nor should it have, for the details of our fight here in New lork; and it is published two hundred and fifty miles away.

The Left Wing organized in New York. In New York, with its thousands of Party members, the Left Wing is fighting for con.

1 If the local Party machinery, againet a fierce and unscrupulous resistance by the petty politicians who direct the Party machine. The Revolutionary Age has contributed enormously to the education of the rank and file in New York; but we need a paper here.

After all. New Jork is the citadel of Right Wing resistance. As long as the entire machinery of the Party is not in our lands, a New York left Wing paper is essential.
Be it understood, however, that The New York Communist, as it now stands, is a nore or less temporary affair. When The Revolutionary Age is turned over to the Central Committee of the Left Wing, The New York Communist will probably comiine with it, as we hope other left $W$ ing oggans will. into a national weekly interbreting and expressing the revolutionary class-conscious proletariat of the United Statcs, interpreting revolutionary erents in Europe, and conducting an active propaganda for Socialism among the American workers.
At the present time we must strengthen and spread our Left Wing propaganda among larty members everywhere. For that reason the more Left Wing papers, the merrier-so long as they hold to true I.eft Wing principles.

Kate Richards O'Hara has entered Jeffer$\operatorname{son}$ City prison to serve her sentence of five years-if the American working class stands for $i t$. The war is over. In no other country in the world would the government now dare to imprison a working class champion for expressing anti-war opinions, Only our economic powerlessness makes us powertess to rebuke the insolence of the master class. Before the American Socialist Party can remedy such evils, it must enlist the ceonomic power of the workers.

Whe are iniormed that forpier had an actual copy of the minutes. and this precludes the grossibility that he was actimg on a report of the meeting. Where did he get his cops? Hut even the means phat. lierber employed to obrain a cony of and minates is not for the moment important. The important print is that an oificial of the Sociainst Party reads from copies of minutes that he had no title to possess, to one of the highest delegate bodies in our organization. It was obrionts to everyone present that he had not come by his copy openly. yet he was allowed to proceed withwut aivone making a protest.

The party has been protesting vigotously aratisat the espinnage carried on in this countr: both by official government asencies and ls unofficial stool-pigeon organizations. lit when information ohtained by methods manifestly similar to those employed by the esphonage agencies is laid lefore our "Comraties" no protest is made. but on the contraty the Right Wing sits open-eared and 1, repares to act upon the information.
(1) what ground does the party emest agains geyerment espionage? Is this a somple of Socialist hanor: Is this typical of the tevolutionary integriti of war ratty?

The pussession of a copy of olit minates did us no larm and consequently we are not whifering ander the sting of defeat. Are these the methods the Right Hing intends to unc in future? Does the menbership of the l'arty supporit these methods; Forewarned is iorearmed.

## National Left Wing Conference

Tc call for a National feft Wing Comference, published in The Revolutionary Age, has our heartiest endursement. ten as the left Wing has united all the irvily revolutionary clements within the Parly in New York, so nust we join forces whth these same elements the country over, s., as to organize more efficaciously for the capture of the Party both localty, local by luca! and Brench by Prauch; and nationally in the corning Eimergenc: Party Cunvention,

Thic Cemtriets protest that they agree abmilutely with the principles and program of the left 'W'ing. but they do not approve of a "separete organization" within the Farty. How then, we ask, shall we actually SI alous capturing the Party machinery? They ton us to form coucuses in the Erayches and the Central Committees, and at the same time so agitate our principles and program among the rank and file.
Thistead of a series of little caucuses.. we substitute ope big capcus - the left Wing - which at the same time agitates our prin. ciples and program. The National, Left Hing Conference whil create a National

Caucus, which can presest in action within. the Party a disciphined and united front.
It is true that the Left Wing has called fur an Energency National Pardy Convention. It is argacd by many Cubrades that in vest of inis fact. a National Left Ning Conferense is urmectssary - since the rank and file is with as atready and a conference oi lecit lling delegates to the Emergency Convention hecid a few days before it. conld accomplish our parpose of arranging for united action in the Consention.

Toa certion extent this is true. But we must remember that. although the rank and file si the Party menters are muc! more revolutionary than sheir leaders, they are not by any means united on the details of Party tactics.

The Lefit Wiag has an inmense propa gamla to accumplish before, in this cot:utry. we have a Socialist farty fit to take its plece as the " nust advanced and resolute section of the working elass parties." Even after the delegates to the Energency Nationat Connention arc, elected, the education of the rank and file must go ons. so that they may intelligently follow and pass on the significiant action of the Emergency Convention
A Natiomal Left Wing Conference will weld into one conscious unit the delegates of Jacals from all over the country. and their returna th their homes will carry into the remutest branches Left Wing pronciple: and tactics. which will operate to change the fundamented ideas of the Farty more profoundly that ten thousand speakers sem out on tobe from dew Jork, Boston or some other center.

Ciene Dels tohd the truth about the war. Fsery event that has happened since he spethe the invasion of Socialist Ruasia by the International Imperialists, the armistice ${ }^{-}$ urms to Gemany, the futile procedingof the impotent "Peace Conference" at Paris. and the mobbinges. suppressions and arrest. oi Socialists home-all thes. things prove ckarly to the blindest that the War was nothing but á capitabists' war, and no workingapen had eny place in it.

The court which conviated 'Gene Debs, and atic Supreme Court. which sustained the cosuiction. proved his charge-that the courts oi this country are created to defend aud protect the capitalist class against the workers.
The ruthless ruling class of the linited States, hysterical at the sight of red clouds in the east. purns instinctively to its soc weapon against the righteous wrathooi the tyrannized and exploited workers-brute force. They have taken awar our betoved 'Gime; they have shut in their ferocious bastille our leariess Comrade, who dared to speak what is in the hearts of thousands

The National Execative Committec of the Socialist rart: has arranged to bold five thosisand meetingy of protest all over the country on May Zat .
Erotest? To whom? To the capitalist Government that put Debs in jail-and whose spies and petty agents hase riveted
on America for the past two years a veritble White Terror: The Government pays no attemtion to cur protests; the Gavernment allows Tom Mooney to put in prison for life. convicted an perjured evidence; the Gowarnment permits torture of conscientious objectors. aud holds behind bars thoussands of palitical prisuners, under terms of inaprisanment unparallesed in moderp countries.

Does the Government yichl to our pro tests: One fundred odd conscientious objectork out of many bundred baye been set free: beiore saiting for Eurape the tast time President Wiinon "pardoned" one Sicialist pulitical prisoner, who didx't commit the crime for which he was conyicted, and 'redused the sentences" of others; from twenty and fiftecn years down to one, twe and three years. The press reports that he has sent from Paris for the "papers" in the Debs case. presumably to "reduce the sentence."
No. Comades, our protests and our prayers did not win these contemptible sops. It was the European comrades, the Communists of all countries who, growing tired of lits and hypecrisy, have turned to action. The Dictaturship of the Proletariat is the worker: answer to the White Terror. It is to quiet the giant of awakening Labor in Eurg e that 1 iilson hands out these crumbs, saying. "See. here's an amnesty. I'm a Demucrat-1 love the wirkers."
Protests are foolish. Pravers are despicable. The only way to answer the brute forec of the ruling class is ty means of the organized power of the American workers. Kiglit. justice. reasen mean nothing tomour ruler: : organized power is the only argument they recognize.

## The Party Situation in New York

## THE INQUISITION

WITH the rise to power of the lefit Wing organization within the Socialist Part! :n New York City, the local officiakdom instituted a variety of new refulations and committees governing thuse within the tarty and thuse who would within the Farty be. Not the least offensive of these was the creation of a committee of three for the purpese of grilling applicants ior nembershing in the Sociathist Party.
In the past the party has treen very lax rearding the admission of new merabers. practically any one who signed an application hank leeng admitted without question. The iact has often lreen pointed out by matl , if these members who now constitute the leff Wing. but without result. But thise who sugereted a change in the methed of atmitting new members had no idea of handing the control of the growth of the part it the chy orer tua few hand-picked individuals. The mont conmon suggestion made wais that branches should exercise, through their executive or membership committees, a suricter control in this matter.
The creation of this committee, or Star Chanber Extraurdinary ar it nuw functions, at this time is clearly not a matter of comeidence. It is a dircet attempt by those at present in contmil to perpetuate themelves. Apparently the Right Wing helieves that the present trend of events in the world at large will tesult in the rise of such revolutionary sentiment, that it behooves the Yarty to be very cartiul in admituing new members. lect the influx of revolutionary recruits overwhelm, the present oficiald in and give the Left ling control of the party. The net result of the creation of this Star chamber is the loolding up of hundred of applications and the consequent loss to our havement of the servires oi men and women whose eyes have been opened to their economic conditions throngh the pressure of world events. The fact that over 90 per cent of the hundreds of applicants so held uf are working men and women, members of that class in scocicty which we claim to be the vice. merely strengthens the assumption that this whole proseeding is a political move in the interest of the machine. While some of the questions asked by this a mateur Overman Committe clearly show that the applicant's knowiledge of, or sympathy with. the Socialist movement is not the real point at issute.
The following is an account of these third dexree methods by one of the victim-

Together with several would-be "comrades," ] waited one Sunday murning. leinore locked dound at the appinted hour. for those annointed of the lord to arrive, to pur us though our tests. While waiting. we exchangel experiences at to !ow many times we had come before etc. - was told how the Sunday previous fifty or mure working men had waited in vain fir wer ain hour, and finally had gone way with their object unachieved. One cumrade remarked. "They don't want us in the l'arty now"--but just as I was bepiming to lose all hope of being a "Party memher." our (hief Examiner arrived and unlucked Koonı 50. We filed in and whiled abay the time reading our Socialist papers and writing for Chief Examiner No. 2. Finally he ton arrived. and the Holy of Holies was opened, and in we went, one by one. to meet our fate.
"Why are yol joining the Party now ?" wats the first question. Remembering the law of the land. that one is assumed to be imucept until proven guilty. we took courage and replied: "Because it seems the peychuldrical moment." This seemed ti) pass, and we waited breathlessly for the next "test." which was, whether we were lourn in this country. Reassuringly bulwarked by the fact that cur ancestors since 16 something had been bom here. and we likewise. we answered in the affirmative. Whether we stcod by the statement printed on our pink application card. which was taken from a box where it had lain for some seven weeks. was also an--wered in the affirnative.
Here the examination seemed to be wer, and we were told there would apparwer. and we were told there would be apmirently no, further difficulty as to our mambeship. We prepared to teave, when suddenly Chief Examiner No. 1, who had stood iny silently during the proceedings. shot out the question. "Do you know anyone in the 3rd, 5 th and 10 th A. D. Branch?" Kemembering our conversa(1.01 with the comrade who had assured us that we were not wanted in the Partywe scrambled frantically in our brains for some inmocuous-sounding AngloStux.mi names, carefully avoiding all of Celtic grigin. and found two. These seemed ales th pass.
With a sugh oi reliei we left the building. feeling sure our red card was as good as in our procket : hut to dat:-two months since apphcation-we are still cardless

fowng to the fact that the machinery of the larty is in the control of the Right Wing many oppostumitics occur whereby the machine consolidates itself. While all hranches known to have a majority of Right Ning members are given theis full quota oi dielcgates to the Central Committee. brancher buw to lie cuntrolled be the Left Wing or suspected of harterting a sitrong minority of left Wing members are wherever jussible deprived of their full reprecentation. This especially applies to the varions Russian language branches. For (xample. the first (downtown) branch of the Kussian Federation was given only two delegatco, after protest by the bran:lh it was wiven three delegates. although its full repre--entation is at least four if not tive delegates. The 2oth Pranch of the Cikranian Federation hat only two delegates. although according to the by-laws it is entitled to four. or five.

## GERRYMANDERING

Amorlier of thice methexts recentity brought intō play by the Kight Wing of the party is the lierrymander-a tactical manoeure whirh calls iurth woluble denounciation ly the Soceialist Party when practised by either oi the old partices. The Cierrymander is a scheme of reorganizing districts solas to divide the fureses of the opposition. It is mot a particularly viciow molitical move and, inderd, in capitatist circles has come to be koched uponits one oi the little privileges of the party in poner. Riut the majority fecialists have always afiected righteous indiguation when they were the victims and
profess to belicue that it is a yi=ions method of foiling the "will of the people." Now, however, that officialdom faces insurgeney it immediately discovers in the Gerrymander 2 friend indeed, and it proceeds to attempt the reorganization of several branches in order, if we are to believe its previous arguments. to foil the will of the people, who in this particular case are the mernbership of the Socialist Party. The second Jewich Branch has been so reorganized and the 17 th A. D. Branch is at present in the throes of the Gerrymander.

Where the case is so hopeless that the Gerrymander is useless more violent measures are resorted to; as in the case of the 3 rd. 5 th and 20 th A. D. $\operatorname{zod} 8 \mathrm{th}$ A. D Branches, both of which ave charges pending against them which in is siderely hoped (by the Right Wing) will result in their expulsion from the Socialist Part

## THE PARTY PRESS.

Although ona of the immediate point at issue between the Right and Left H ings is the ownership and cumtrol of the party press; the Kight Wing taking the attitade that the status gro scould be maintained to all imtents and purposes the machinc within the Party controls the press when it comes to matters of larty policies and tactics. (Ificiaddom is invariably in the prosition of the rtand patter. Thus when the Party press remains silent on the matter it is playing the game of the machine.

In all appeals for moral and financial support which from time to time are istued by Party papers one of the strungest arguments advanced is that the mempf thip "flll have a paper which will presert its views and which by virtue of the absence of iinancial control througis subsidies or advertisements, will present the trath on ath orcasions. Jet when a powerful minority arises wintin the farty the official press refuse: to acquaint the nembership.avith the fact. The Call, through its Board of Management, has refused to give any publicity to the l.eft Wing organization; reen going to the length of refusing to advertise mectings held under its zuspices as such, and the Left Wing can only insert nutices of its meetings by camotilaging under the name of a committee or some other lody The Call says in effect "we will accept your advertisements but we will nat print the name of your organization" and thes it maintains the fiction of a "free press" for which it is always ostensibly fighting.

The Jewish Daily Forward, an official organ of the Socialist larty, takes much the same attitude towards the left $W$ ing but in other matters it goes so far to the right as to refuse in print the names oi party members who may have fallen under the displeasure of tive government. It refuses to advertise the Novy Mir, the official organ of the Kussian Federation, althougt this body is pairt oi the Socialist Party. ill fact ascupies in relation to the Party exactly the came position as does the Jewish Federation.

## The Left Wing and The Call

AMONG the ridicuions accusations huried at the Left Wing by the Right is the charge that we want to wreck the New York Call.
This is based largely on the fact that the Left Wing has refused to support or contribute to The Call's campaign to raise $\$ 90.100$ for a new printing plant.

## Why?

The left Wing stands for Part ownership and control of the official Party press.
The Call is an official organ of the Party. yet it in neither owned nor controlled by the Part:. The Call is raising $\$ 0,000$ for a new plant. and as an official Party organ, is appealing to the rank and file of Party members for funds. Yet when the printing plant is bonghtit. it will be neither owned nor controlled by the Party.
This is how The Call is owned and controlled.
It is published by the Workingmen's Co operative P'ublishing Assaciation, an organination of Party member. Contro! is rested in the Aisociation. and in a Board of Manager.

The Association meets every three months Party members. and only Party memisin, may be elected members of the Assiciation, upon the payment of five dollars initiation fee and dues of one dollar per уear

Thu Ruard of Stanagers is elected as inllows: intur members elected in, the Association: four members chosen by the four Lo cal-oi Sireater New Yorly, and the State.

The Board of Managers is elected as follows: four members by the Association Fine members by the four lacals of Greater New lirk, and the State Committee. IA the prosent time there are five additional members, who act in a more or less advisur: apacity, representing organizations. formed at one time to raise money for The Call: we are informed that these adtitional membershipe will be akolished at the mect ing of tpril 25th.)
Twir facts are plain First, that it costs money to, enter the "ikenorracy" of the Worhingmen's Cooperative Publishing Asswintin.". Second, that the "official" Party delegates on the Board of Managers are in a bare majority-five to four. Fr that by siding with the Association members. one Incal delegate could defeat the will of the three wther Locals of Greater New Yintk.

Party members pay dues to the Party. For that they are entitled to a mive in Party affair- The Call is an official Party organ: hut beinere a Party member can have a voice in the mangement of The Call he must pay sis d.liars. This is a mockery of "Party contral."

Wic inave stated peblich many times that if The Call would submit to Party control, .e would support the campaigo of the official larty organ for a new printing plant. and gladly

How can the management of The Call be democratized? Among many plans. the following has been submitted to the Board of Manaecrs:

Every member of the four Locals of Greater New Yort becomes ex-officio a member of the Association. If the money paid by members of the Aseociation is necessary. an annual epecial dues stamp will yield the revenue.

Why is there opposition to such a scheme
-or something similar: We are told by members of the Boarl of Managers that "the initiation fee and ducs restricts the Assciation to those Party members who are really interested in the paper." What a splendid reason for a Socialist!
Why is it, as the Bcard of Managers says, that "plenty of people kick athout The Call but the kickers are never interested enough to come to meetings $9^{\prime \prime}$ We have heard similar sentiments from captains of industry, explaining "why democracy is a failure."
Democracy is a faiture chiefly because the great mass of the people have nothing to say about the Government. The "de mocracy" of The Call doesn't work for exactly the same reason. The constitution of the Association places obstacles in the way of Party control. In the first place, it costs money to be a member; in the second place an applicant for membership must be voted on. and eren then he cannot exercise hin rights as a member until the next quarterly mecting. three months off.
To the rank and file. impatient with The Call's editorial policy, the B ard of Managers and its supporters use strange arguments.
For example. "Party ountership and control is inefficient." This is the same argument used by private capitalists against Government ownership. In a Party which aims at the public ownership of industry, it sumads a little incongrucus--and moreover it shows that distrust of the proletariat characteristic of "Moderate Socialism."
Another: "The ownership of property makes the P'arty conservative." This is als surprising ; if it is true, then the ownership of all private propertw. which is our aim. will make the workers hlack reartionaries!
We were told ly one membe, of the Board if Managers. "It takes time to accomplith these changes. In the meanwhite. it is vitally neressac for The Call to have it printing plant. Helu, us now. and then we'll talk about changing the ownership and comtrol." This is the same argument with which the Coverninents of Europe persuaded their workers to support the War!
The credulous are impressed by a:other piece of specious reasoning. The Board of Managers says that "Party ownership" is dangerous. for if the Association were iden tical with the Locak of Greater New York then any suit for damages against The Call would make it powsible to attach the Party funds (if anyi) or, since the Party is not incorporated it might make evers nember liable.

Possilkt. That is mot the point at issue here. We do not demand the immediate abolition of the Workingmen's Cooperative Association: we demand that memberahip in the Locals of Greater New York carry with it memtership in the Association.

[^0]To our demends, the Board of Managere aiswers just what the capitazist syotem an swers to the workers, just what the Right Wing machine answers to the Left Wing: "Change it, then, by all means change itbut use the legal and constitutional menchisery, which functions to protect us againe you."
We reply: "What is your reason for refusing to democrative The Call? There can be no honest reason. Do not tall to us choust 'legality' and 'constitutionality', as if you were afraid of the majority of the Cocialion Party."

Why sliould the Left Wing want to wreck The Call? On the contrary: the Left Wing wants to take over The Call, with the reat of the Party machinery, at the coming Emergency Convention.

# Problems of the Representative of Soviet Russia in America 

## By Nicholas I. Hourwith.

AFEN days ago the proletariat of Imerica joyously greeted the news of the appointment here of an oificial represntative of the Socialist Republic of Russia. Celebrations on this account are sill going on. Everywhere mectings are lo ing held to greet this newly appoint dambassader. Socialist and labor organizations friom all parts of the country are sending telegrams of greetings and letters, promising aid and expressime willingness to help in every way the success of the cause of iicially ref resented here by him; and equally dear to the conscious proletarians of the entire world-the cause of the Proletarian Kerolution in Russia, the creative-constructive work of the toiling masses alreads begun there to strengthen and deepon the Somdatión of the new Socialist-communist astem.

But the revolutionary Serialist orvaniza tions of the American proletariat would: hane made an inexcusably fatal eror had the w-with an idea that now there is someone here who, without their aid, could take are of Revolutionary Russia-limited them. sevenonly to these greatings and pmomises. ia:ling to translate all this into revolutionary activity.
The great siguificance of the appointment bere of a Soviet representative consists precietly in that this appointment opens before the American proletariat new perspective and new opportunities: opportunities of rev -hutionary activity in direct contact and oumeration with the Russian proletariat and
 nifiraner of this appointment fies in the fact that it represents aygreat appeal, reminding the American workingman that the ."-riancipation of the workers can be acmplished only by the workers themselves." Not for a single mome it do we doult, he great importance of the purely "diphematic." so to sar, activity here of the Soviet representative. Still less are we inclined :o Wonbt the magic power of the Russian golld - - the influence of this gold on the minds and disposition of American plutocracy thas : iready manifested itself in a most olvious mraner. But, with all due allowances, giving due justice to all this. we should like to srund a warning to the American workersa!d to Comrade Martens himself-rgainst art undte exaggeration of the imporfance oif $h_{h}$ is purely diplomatic-commereial functions In. re. W'e would consiter it a fatal mistake in purdy diplomatic-commercial "eiforts" become the centre of his activity.
However, 25 segards "diplomatic" activity. Connade Martens himself evidently entertains no sentimental illusions. In am inierview given by him and publisted the other day. he definitely and unequivocaly stated:
The Russian Socialist Federated Republic dies not care about political recognition by the United States....All that we whut is trade secognition. Comrade Martens perfectly understands that, in the world of capitalistic relations, "commerce"
in the words of Kuzma Prutkov-"is the real thing, and all the rest-nonsense." "Commerce" will create definite socialeronomic relations. a definite "equilibrium
if social furces." after which, as Comrade Martens has it, "the flag, i. e., political reognition, will follow.
We sloould like $\frac{10}{}$ go a little further in this ahoolutely correct. truly Marxian reasoning. lie should like to emphasize that *commerce" itseli-the establishment of com merrial relations between Russia and the Conited States-will coune only as a result of definite sucial furce-the very equilibrium apun which depends the success and the salvation of the Russian Revolution in general.
What, indecd, will guarantee the success of the: Russian lroletarian Revolution: The siniet Bolshevist leaders in Russia, including Comrade Jenin, have answered that question on several occasions.
Comrade lemin has stated that the final triumph or the rain of the Proketariat Revofution in Russia depends on whether the revolutionary movements of the proletariai and Proleatrian Revolutions in other countries will come to its assistance. And in this :1rase one finds the key for the understanding of the present political situation!
If the revointionary movement of the probetariat in other countries triumphs. then the confucst of the Russian Revolution, the \&ussian Sovi:t kep-lilie will be sated; and as a result, there will come also "commercia!" and "trade" and all sorts of wher relations. If. on the contrary. the recoln thonary workiny class movement in other countries iailx, it will strike a mortal fow at the Revohtion in Russia. And no "colthmercial and trade relations" can help Russia in that event: Why, after all, should the ranitaiist world, canitalist America included, weed "commercial relations" with socialist Kuswia. while the cherished hope of the entire capitalist world is something greater namely - to crush the revolutionary resiviance of the Russian proletariat, to suppress Socialism in Russia, and then swallow the whole of Russia-with all her commerce tradc and natural resources?
Inder juresent day political conditions, the ravolutionary movement of the proletariat in all countries is the main thing, is the center of gravitation, is everything-both for probetarian Kussia and for the emancipation of the proletariat of all the world.' The succese or failure of the proletarian movement, the strength of the Bolshevist movement, in couniries ruled by capitalism, is at the pres-

ent moment a barometer of the "favorable" ur openly hostile, attitude of capitalist governmerts towands Soviet Rassia.
The establishment of commercial inter course between Russia and capifalist countries, with all its intrinsic advantages for the economic life of Rassia, in on her हide in a certain degree similar to the signing of the Brest Litovak treaty, merety a means to "gain time."
All the forgong, in our opinion. tends to inticate a 'line of behaviour" for the revolutinary Socialist organizations of the Ameri con proletariat, as well as for Comrade Martens as the representative of the Rassian Soviet Governinent
The center of his'attention. the evercomstant "compens" directiag his activiv. here. shontd be the interests of the re,olutionary Socialist movement antong the innerican proletariat, the infersts of th advanced guard, the hope and wairantiee o the success of that movement-the Lefs Wing of the American Eocialist Party.
We are fully aware that in his manifol: activities he may not always. or eren frcm!ently, be in a position to cict under thbanner of the Left Wing; but tre should tak:great care that his attitude dors not provid. "hait" for the Right and "Moderate" social opportunists, thereby unconscinusly to "stal, in the back" the only bulwark: and hope oi proletarian Russia-those whom it invites to its International Communist- Congressthe left Socialist Wing.
With these wishes, which aire at the anmr time Bolshevist greetings to Comrade Marlens, we conclude oar articic.
We beliere that the "compass" recum mended by us, and revolutionary Bulshevik sensitiveness, will help Comrade Martens to orientate himself in difficult moments, and will guaranfee success to his coming serious and responsible work.

We heartily wish him that success.

Resoived, that the State Committee instruc:s its executive committee to revolse the churter of any local that affiliates with any such urganization or that permits its subdivisions or members to be affiliated.
