Comrade John J. Ballam, manager of "The Daily Workers" campaign, reports that we have raised in cash \$68,000. This figure includes \$4,000 raised by the Finnish Federation of the Workers Party up to November 1, since that time the Finnish Federation has raised another \$4,000, making the total cash available \$82,000.

Gompers tries to Hide Alliance with Big Bankers; Also Exposed in Effort to Aid Agents of Stinnes

Amalgamated Gives Lie to New Charges Spread by Gompers

(By Federated Press)

Falsely charges of share practices of the Amalgamated Bank of New York in transmitting money to its agents in Russia are broadcasted by Samuel Gompers, President, American Federation of Labor, and vigorously denied by the bank's president, Gompers, who has been writing a series of six articles on the subject syndicated in the capitalist press under the "Whisper" column. The article in his final article to the Communist in America. He charges that the bank leads clients to think it transmits cash to the Russian agents while the money is actually being held in America. Gompers cites this alleged fact as an evidence of red propaganda work in America.

The bank is not identified by name in the Gompers article, published in the Daily News Nov. 27, but is described as a "New York bank" that has just arranged with the Soviets to transmit money direct from America to relatives or friends in Russia.

"It is absurd," commented R. L. Sedwiler, president, Amalgamated Trust & Savings Bank of Chicago and of the Amalgamated Bank of New York, in relating Gompers' charges. "Our repudiation to Russia is paid in Russia in American dollars, not in rubles. Our charge for remitting 7 per cent plus 10 cents postal charges. For example, a man wishing to remit \$20 pays us \$21.90. The 20 remains in whichever of the maltreated banks is handling the remittance until the money in Russia has received the funds, the Russian bank transferring the American dollars to aid the payment there. When we receive the receipt shows for Russia and we obviously owe the amount to a Russian bank. The American bank has placed to its credit either in London or New York, or remitted in cash. We have been remitting actual money, a hundred thousand dollars at a time, thru the First National Bank of Boston.

"The largest banks in Chicago are sending their customers for Russia on a change to us. When every dollar is in American dollars in Russia, it is obvious that it does not remain in America and that there is no possibility of the funds either in this country or abroad.

Congress has assembled in Washington. This issue goes to press as President Cal Coolidge is sitting on the steps of the national capitol ready to deliver his message to the hundreds of congressmen assembled in the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America.

At this writing we do not know what President Coolidge will say about the recognition of the Russian Workers' and Farmers' Republic. But whether he ignores this subject in his message or not, it will be one of the big problems before the present session of this Congress.

The carefully laid down barrage of Secretary of State Hughes and the well-prepared propaganda campaign of Samuel Gompers, President of the American Federation of Labor, have not been for nothing. Their anti-Soviet attack has been as thoroughly thought out as their lies are.

Gompers and his regime in the American Federation of Labor are co-operating with the open shoppers of the National Civic Federation in the attack on the first Workers' Republic. The malicious propaganda this combination has well-planned. It is the medium of the kept press.

We wish to accept the recent challenge broadcasted by Mr. Gompers, calling upon the friends of Soviet Russia "to tell the American people just who the international bankers are who are preventing the recognition of the soviet." A line-up here now would be interesting.

New York Gathering of Labor Czars Plans Stab in Back for Militant Workers in Germany

NEW YORK CITY.—Samuel Gompers and a group of labor leaders met here in a hotel last Sunday and formulated plans for assisting the reaction in Germany to crush the rising working class.

Not content with his unenviable notoriety as scullion for the loot-hound sleuth, Wm. J. Burns, and the chauvinist moron, H. M. Whitney, of the American Defense Society, this arch-reactionary, who has betrayed the rank and file of American labor for 40 years, now proceeds to extend his perfidy to the service of Poincare and Stinnes under the guise of assisting the German workers.

Gompers and his associates propose a voluntary assessment of ten per cent of a day's wages upon members of all unions affiliated with the American Federation of Labor to send the officials of the German Trade Union Federation "to be used to assist the unions in their fight against Bolshevism" and to enable them to "maintain their organizations." Thus, under the cloak of benevolence a vicious attack is made by the A. F. of L. officials to stab the battered and bleeding masses of Germany in the back.

The decision of Gompers was in response to an appeal from the leaders of the German Federation. These leaders are the same agents of the capitalist class that came to the rescue of the Kaiser of Germany in 1918 and forced upon the trade union movement of Germany a policy in complete harmony with the imperialistic aims of the German government and which, since that time, has been the policy of the German government and which, since that time, has been the policy of the German government.

The trade union officialdom of Germany, just as the Gompers machine in America, followed its betrayal in the world war with a series of the most flagrant acts of treachery in the history of labor's struggle. At last, after nine years of war, starvation, pestilence, with every achievement of years of struggle taken from them, the masses of German workers have deserted their treacherous leaders and are driving steadily toward the proletarian revolution, the only way to their liberation from the Communist International. Confronted with the conquest of Germany by Bolshevism, capitalist orders all the flunkies into action, so Gompers' group of years ago, against the German labor leaders and calls upon the rank and file of the German labor movement to resist the assistance of the identical people in the interest of the war aims of Great Britain.

Germany now Gompers now supports during the war the staunch supporters of the late Karl Liebknecht for many years head of the German Federation of Trade Unions. We were then in a conspiracy with Hugo Stinnes, the steel king of Germany, against the membership of the trade unions and who organized the infamous "industrial strike" which was the mechanism for settling industrial disputes between workers and capital.

Illinois Miners in Militant Stand at District Convention

This resolution declares for an investigation by the international board in conjunction with a committee of five to be selected from the national convention and that, "if conditions be as we suppose," the provisional officials be ousted and the deposed men be again put into office where they belong." It is suggested that the unions to have the delegates to the next international and district convention be instructed to vote for the resolutions adopted by this convention.

More Bad News

Here is more bad news for the grand dukes of the American labor movement. The London Daily Herald reports that the International Federation of Trade Unions is in negotiations with the All-Russian Trade Union Executives for a United Front.

Reactionary American labor officials had heralded the resignation of Edo Finschi as secretary of the Amsterdam International, as an indication of the triumph of stampanism in the European trade unions. This false hope is now dissipated. A formidable minority in the Amsterdam International is in favor of the immediate establishment of the United Front with the Russian workers, especially in view of the possibility of counter-revolution in Germany, similar to that which has taken place in Spain, Italy, Greece, Bulgaria and Hungary. Another element, however, is in favor of delay in these negotiations.

Delegations have been appointed by the Amsterdam International to visit the United States, Mexico and other countries on this side of the Atlantic. This will also be bad news for Compers and his following.
