In spite of the extremely cold weather and icy streets the Hunger Marchers displayed militant enthusiasm on their march with banners waving through the business district to the State Capitol.

Filling the main lobby of the Capitol building the Marchers sent a delegation of 30 to the Senate chambers, where they were recelved by a committee of 12 members from the House and Senate.

The Governor refused to see the workers. The spokesmen for the workers included Toohey, Bales, Hull and White.

The Workers Delegation told the committee of the previous demands made to the Governor for a special session to consider solely immediate unemployment relief, which was ignored and a special session to consider revision of the state code was held instead.

When Hubbard heard we were getting samples, he went to the workers and confiscated the rest. Durant Estate. He got a bunch of workers cutting down timber. An emergency relief fund of \$28,000, 121/2% of the total, is set aside for "any crisis." This is supposedly for those in desperate need—if they can get it.

Unsanitary Camp Care Is A Serious Menace To Health

SAN BERNARDINO, Cal., Jan. 15.

-Workers kick about the food in the Forced Labor Camps, but I think they overlooked perhaps the worst feature of all, and that is the lack of decent medical care. These camps are a deadly menace as the bosses don't care whether workers live or die. Little or nothing is spent on care of the sick. I contracted "poison oak" in the Del Rosa Camp last winter. It was in only one spot on my face. Like a damn fool I went to the camp "doctor." After his treatment the discase spread rapidly. Editorial Column

THE HUNGER MARCH IS OVER WHAT NEXT?

Four State Hunger Marches have already taken place. Even the capitalist press furnishes sufficient evidence that they were the biggest workers demonstrations yet seen in these states. They are the best examples of the tremendous growth in the struggle for Unemployment Insurance and Immediate Relief.

They are the answers to the fake unemployment insurance bills now being sponsored by the American Federation of Labor, and to relief fakers in the ranks of the jobless.

Perhaps the best proof to discredit the lies of the capitalist press that the marches are only small groups of agitators without mass support is in the fact that when the delegations arrived at the capitols in place of tear gas and riot squads, they were greeted by "glad hand" methods. In California and Oregon special sessions of both houses were arranged. In Utah and Arizona special commitees were appointed to receive the marchers. In all cases, at least promises were made to introduce the proposed demands and bills into the Legislatures.

In California, while during last year's Hunger March, water hose, gas bombs, arrests greeted the workers along the entire line, and in no case were the workers fed, this time they were fed and housed by the cities (except of course Los Angeles). The \$255.00 collection made in the Legislature for the Hunger Marchers is another indication of the policy.

MILITANCY WILL FORCE GAINS

They realize that behind the marches is a tremendous movement which they so far failed to suppress. On the contrary it has increased several fold.

They were compelled to give concessions. And they will continue to do so provided the tempo of struggle and intensity of organization marked by the marches continues.

Now is the time to make the biggest relief gains yet made in these states. But they will only result from a network of Unemployed Councils and block committees immediately organized, beginning the fight on the basis of relief demands in every town, neighborhood, soup line, and charity job. Only that will prove to the bosses that the workers mean business and can not be so easily disposed of.

COUNCILS MUST BE CONTINUALLY ACTIVE

Of course we have many unemployed councils and block committees. It is thru them that the march was chiefly organized. But they are far from sufficient to measure up to the great task. The many thousands of workers who supported the marches, show the tremendous reserve to draw from for organization. Furthermore too many of our councils live from one demonstration to another and are not continually alert to every issue within the neighborhood.

The mass of fresh forces will make this possible. But there isn't a minute to be lost!
