

PEIPING, China, March 10.—The growing antagonism between the U. S. Imperialists and the Japanese, was clearly revealed when the resignation of Chan Hsiao Liang, overlord of North China, was accepted and Chiang Kai Shek, leader of Nanking, assumed command of the against the forced labor starvation | forces against Japan. Chiang Kai Shek is agent of Wall Street.

It is now clearly revealed that Jehol was practically handed over to the Japanese by the treacherous northern generals, causing the slaughter of thousands of Chinese soldiers. While this treachery was in process Chiang Kai Shek put his entire force, the best equipped of the Chinese forces, against the Soviets in the Central area.

The Japanese are now preparing for a further advance into China proper, by claiming it will be necessary to wipe out such armies as are planning return into Jehol.

U. S. S. R. Declines League Invitation

MOSCOW, U. S. S. R., March 10.-Litvinoff, Commissar of Foreign affairs, sent a note to the League of Nations, stating that the Soviet Union declines to accept the invitation, to take part in the committee on the Far Eastern situation, in view of the fact that 13 of the 22 on the committee do not even have direct relations with the Soviet Union. The note also stated that support will be given to such moves as advance world peace.

Hitler Terror Increases

BERLIN, March 10.-Following the elections Hitler's storm troops are running wild, bringing terror into all working class quarters. Anti-Jewish pogroms have likewise been started.

The main attack is directed against the Communists and a slogan has been issued by the fascists that for every Nazi killed three Communists will be killed.

Poles Mobilize Around Danzig

BERLIN, March 11.-With Hitler's assent to power, war clouds on he Polish frontier are already beginning to darken. It is reported that Polish tank corps, heavy artillery, and aerial bombing squadrons are being concentrated at strategic points around Danzig.

The Danzig corridor is a strip of territory taken away from Germany to give Poland an outlet to the sea. One of the promises made by Hitler is the restoration of that area into the Reich.

Dictatorship in Austria

VIENNA, Austria, March 11.—The government announced that it would prevent the meeting of the parliament which is scheduled to meet on Wednesday, and aroused great protests.

Chancellor Dollfuss has practically assumed the role of a dictator, and brought in 20,000 well armed troops and police equipped with machine guns, now concentrated in the government barracks.

British Navy Budget Increase

LONDON, March 10.—This year's British navy budget is \$183,745,000, which represents an increase of \$10,611,000 over last year. This is especially for the construction of new capital ships. A considerable increase was also in the appropriations for the air force.



to get the child admitted to the county hospital, but was refused. Three weeks later she carried him back again and was referred to Mrs. Frost, the hated Kern County Welfare Director, who refused to act. Finally the young mother managed to get the baby admitted by bringing him at night.

This is the last call for the great Mooney meeting at the San Francisco Civic Auditorium, on March 19, that you will get through the Western Worker.

The mass meeting will be only six days prior to the hearing on the remaining indictment against Mooney. At this hearing it will be determined if Mooney will get a new trial. Tom Mooney's framers and every one else know that the trial, if granted, will reveal to the whole world all the defails of the frameup, so as to leave no doubt in any person's mind that Mooney is innocent. That is why District Attorney Brady has already stated that he believes the case should be thrown out.

The importance of a mass demand that a new trial be granted should therefore be apparent to all.

A powerful demonstration, packing the auditorium as last November 6, and more thousands outside, backing the legal fight which will be made by Walsh and Gallagher, can force a new trial.
