DOUBLED ACRES Under the piece work and contract system the workers get practically nothing and are cheated on that. An example is the notorious contractor, Andrews. He promis \$5 an acre for thinning lettuce, beets, etc., but measures his land so that almost two acres are done for the price of one. No check-up measure is allowed the workers; he pays whatever he pleases, and those dissatisfied are immediately

ALAMEDA CHARITIES SCABHERDING FOR RHUBARB FIELDS

A.W.I.L. Organizing Against Forcing Relief Workers To Set New Low Wage

HAYWARD, Calif., March 26.-Combatting the scabherding move of the Alameda County Welfare Board to supply cheap labor in the rhubarb fields by cutting off relief the Agricultural Workers Industrial League is rallying workers to a mass meeting here. A strong delegation will be sent to the Welfare Board to force the continuance of relief for dozens of families cut off, and every effort is being made to build the A. W. I. L. for a fight for better conditions during the

When a local contractor visited Mrs. Robinson, at the welfare office, wanting fifteen rhubarb pickers, she drove down to shacktow and cut off fifteen families, telling them to go work in the fields. The workers went and asked the foremen what wages were. Expecting willing slaves he told them not to gia chain gangs, and showed that ask questions. Further inquiry disclosed that pay is 13c for a 45-lb box and that an expert picker can not make more than 78c from sunup to night. The workers refused such miserable wages.

They immediately visited hundreds of other workers and called a mass meeting of the Agricultural Workers to combat this scabherd ing move of the charities.

Japan To Go Below Wall

Changchun, Manchuria, March 31.—"If eventually we are compelled occupy Peiping the Chinese army will be responsible." This is from General Koiso, commander of the Japanese forces in Jehol.

Already bombings have taken place below the great wall, and the Japanese are already lying a basis for occupying all North China, of which Peiping is the chief city. It has a great international settlement and will bring to head complications between the imperialist powers.

Japan in Anti-Soviet Provocation

HARBIN, Manchuria, March 31.—Almost all traffic on the Far Eastern Railroad was stopped and the international border between the Soviet Union and Manchuria was closed. This is another provocation on the part of Japan through its puppet state, claiming that the Soviet government has been withdrawing railroad equipment from the line. The Manchurian railway guards seized Soviet freight trains loaded with goods. The Japanese likewise claim that the Soviet government is making "unauthorized shipment of war materials."

Anti-Jewish Violence Increases

BERLIN. March 31.—The boycott against the Jews started in full wing as the Nazi special boycott committee issued directives providing for picketing all Jewish stores and establishments; 30,000 have been armed to carry out the order.

Although the official time set for the boycott to begin is April 1st, Hitler's bandit hordes took the hint, for already two weeks, and violence prevails everywhere, in the form of breaking store windows, wholesale beatings, preventing Jewish teachers, professors and judges from attending to their duties, etc.

Most of those effected in the boycott are the small storekeepers and middle class elements, as the big Jewish business men are in the large stock companies, not bearing a clear-cut character and are really behind the fascist regime.

Fascists Prepare To Take Power in Vienna

VIENNA, Austria, March 31.-As a further step towards Fascism the government ordered the suppression of the Socialist Party controlled defense organization the "Shutzbund," which it is estimated has 150,000 members.

Simultaneously with the order two hundred truck loads of steel helmeted soldiers with fixed bayonets swarmed through the cities warning the population in the workers quarters to remain "quiet and disciplened.

It is reported that Prince Von Stahrenberg, commander of the Austrian Fascists, is planning a march on Vienna. Further reports that thousands of German Nazis registered as students are in Vienna to reinforce the move is likewise making the atmosphere more tense

Mexico Demonstration Against Daniels

MEXICO CITY, March 30.—Twenty workers have been arrested as result of a demonstration led by Communists, outside the American Embassy on the occasion of appointment by Roosevelt of Joseph Daniels, former U. S. Secretary of War, as the new Ambassador. They will be exiled.

Daniels is remembered by the Mexican workers since the time he sent marines to occupy Vera Cruz.

Workers Demonstrate Against Prince

GLASGOW, Scotland, March 30.—In face of a large demonstration of workers many police reserves had to be called out to guard the prince on his visit here. This was another of a long series of demonstrations that greeted the prince with boos all along the route. In one ease a stone smashed the window of his car.

Anti-German Boycott in France

PARIS, March 30.—To counteract the anti-Jewish boycotts in Germany, a great move is developing throughout France for boycotting German products.

Irish Workers Fight Fascist Attack

DUBLIN, Ireland, March 31.—According to capitalist press reports a Fascist mob was incited to attack Connoly Hall, headquarters of the Communist Party, wrecking the place.

The attack was continued at the headquarters of the Unemployed at Great George's street, and at the Communist College on Eccles street. Thirty are reported injured in the fighting.

A. C. Bundy, his wife and three their home at 8611 Elm street, on Monday, by Tuesday evening were in a new home, with rent, gas, light Mooney convention. and water paid for and a constant supply of food guaranteed.

This was accomplished by the Communist Party and the Young MONTEREY JOBLESS Communists' League, with the rank and file of the Unemployed Cooperative Relief Association and the Homeless Youth.

When the Bundy family was evicted, at least 300 of the Cooperative Relief Association rallied to the house. The crowd became so great that traffic in the street was halted completely. A tent was pitched in the middle of the street for the Bundy family, and bonfires were started around which the workers kept warm all night, singing and listening to speeches.

In the morning sympathizers brought food. Throughout the day the crowd kept growing, despite a drenching rain, and music, singing and dancing kept up its spirits.

All this time Sheriff Biscauluz and his deputies kept watch on the proceedings, but were kept inacive by the militancy of the pickets. Stool pigeons who tried to provoke the crowd were baffled by the

working class discipline and unity. In the meantime the authorities had become alarmed as speaker af ter speaker explained to the crowd the true reasons for the conditions they faced. Seeing their cloak of lies failing, they sent the Salvation Army to placate the workers. A better house than the old was secured, rent and service paid for, and a supply of food guaranteed. Then the workers picked up the furniture and marched in triumphal possession to the new Bundy home.

O'CONNELL WORRIED BY REDS, **NOT WAGE CUTS**

Two defeats inflicted upon the San Francisco Central Labor Council misleaders, within 1 week-once when the Mooney Auditorium meeting proved a great success, and then when a new trial was granted-leads them to a rage that shows very clearly how seriously they feel the defeats.

This is best revealed in the latest issue of their paper, the "Labor Clarion," which really is meant to be a special

anti-red issue, as every page shows.

That Mooney is granted a new trial gets a little cold item inside, but the real "hot news" is the story on the front page, "Socialists and Chicago Federation of Labor repudiate Communists." They reprint in full the letter of the Socialist Party National Committee advising all their organizations to refrain from taking part in the Free Mooney Congress in Chicago on April 30, and the usual calumny against the Communist Party and the Tom Mooney Moulders Committee.

These fakers, unable to disrupt the local United Front for Mooney, are now mobilizing their artillery to disrupting the great National Congress that they know will play an important role in forcing into the open the frame-up evidence at the trial.

LABOR FAKERS AND SOCIALISTS UNITE

The unity here between the "Socialists" and the labor fakers is not an accident. Already on a national scale Norman Thomas has announced a "conference" supposedly against Fascism, and although refusing to accept the proposal of the Communist Party for an anti-Fascist United Front, they are proposing to William Green the chairmanship of this conference.

"A public hearing was held which was attended by a large delegation of "reds." One of those while haranging the committee was asked by a member whether in case of war he would fight for the country. He refused to answer. The inference was plain, and the committee lost interest in the argument.

'Another incident that aroused the animosity of the committee occurred when the recent murderous assault on President Roosevelt was mentioned. The crowd of "Reds" laughed uproariously. Had "the little red brothers" stayed away from Sacramento there might have been a chance for repeal."

From the above we can see how sincerely the fakers stand for the Malony Bill. The hearings on it are not yet over and already they are doing their bit to knife it, and a good way is to blame it on the reds. As a matter of fact if it were not for the work of the Communists, such as the campaign last year and at the present time, the bill would have never been introduced.

REDS SPOILING IT FOR THE LABOR SKATES

How well O'Connell would like to see the "little red brothers" away from Sacramento! Then he, Sharrenberg and Co., could without difficulty continue making their deals with the boss politicians and sell out the workers, through such frauds as the Hornblower Bill. In that same report O'Connell expresses doubt on the passage of the Hornblower fake Unemployment Insurance Bill, "as delegations of reds are spoiling it." We are certainly glad that we are beginning to spoil the smooth "give and take game" between the O'Connells and the ruling class, and they'll see much more of us in Sacramento.

But the most brazen example to show the lying character of this faker is his reference to the Zangara case. It was the representative and lobbyist of the S. F. Chamber of Commerce, and the California Manufacturers Association, Jack Pettis, who argued at the hearing against repeal and gave the Zangara incident as an example "of these menacing times." And when the workers laughed at this nonsense, everything was spoiled, according to O'Connell.


