238,000 Unite In Pacific Coast Anti-War Meet

GENERAL STRIKES AGREED AS WEAPON TO STOP WAR, FASCISM

292 Organizations PLANS CALL FOR SETTING UP COMMITTEES IN ALL CITIES

SAN FRANCISCO, April 29.—A General Strike to answer war or fascism!

This proposal was cheered enthusiastically by the four hundred and five delegates from 292 organizations representing 238,000 persons who joined legions in the greatest United Front demonstration ever seen on the Pacific Coast last Saturday and Sunday when the first Pacific Coast Congress Against War and Fascism was held in the Building Trades Council at San Francisco.

Plans were adopted for future action, including the setting up of regional headquarters and permanent councils at San Francisco, Los Angeles, Portland, Seattle and Denver. And within two weeks City Committees are to be formed in all main cities to broaden the work, particularly in unions and shops.

But the big event of the Congress was not its size nor the quality of its delegates, who included ministers, trades unionists from 37 A. F. L. and ten independent unions, unemployed, Mexicans, Negroes, Chinese, Filipinos and others.

Davis, S. F. Relief Tsar Is Ousted

CAMPAIGN FOR REMOVAL BEGUN BY WESTERN WORKERS

SAN FRANCISCO, April 30.—Paul H. Davis, local relief Tsar and puppet of Hearst in a series of anti-Communist attacks on S.F. workers, is out of office today.

But he will not apply for an S.F. work order himself, for the main point in forcing his resignation is the exposure of his grafting in selling of wood from Suro Forest projects, to private individuals. His responsibility in this is unquestioned. The wood was cut for free distribution to the unemployed.

The forced resignation culminates a campaign begun by the Western Worker several months ago against this relief dictator who used every means, however small and evasive, to cut unemployed off relief. The workers on S.F. responded and at meetings and at the demonstration March 4 five hundred jobless demonstrating against a relief cut of 20 per cent marched to his office demanding his removal. Davis however, decided to be elsewhere at the time. The relief cut was halted, but he found new means to cut workers off relief entirely.

Then, to cover up his activities of which the Suro Forest was a fine example, he launched into an alliance with Hearst's Examiner to carry a series of attacks on workers on S.F. jobs, at the Presidio and elsewhere. Many men were and still are, fired on the excuse of being agitators. The entire smoke screen of anti-Communist hysteria fitted into the schemes in Sacramento where anti-Communist bills were being introduced. All but one have been beaten by the state-wide protest of the workers and in San Francisco Davis himself is now out, a result of the campaign against him and the exposure of his racketeering.

MARITIME FEDERATION IS ESTABLISHED DESPITE ATTACKS OF FAKERS

Labor Party Scuttled LONGSHORE CONVENTION TO OPEN AT PORTLAND NEXT WEEK

SAN FRANCISCO, April 30.—The next step in the fight to build the rank and file control of maritime unions on the Pacific Coast will be made at the District Convention of the International Longshoremen's Association, to be held at Portland, Oregon, the second week in May.

The West Coast Maritime Federation, comprising five maritime unions and representing approximately 35,000 workers was formed at the Seattle convention last week. The formation of the Federation was a big step forward in the struggle to unite maritime workers into one organization.

"Dirty Deal," the high mogul and rank labor faker now at the head of the Ferryboatmen's Union, was thrown out of the Federation, his credentials refused and his sell-out record so thoroughly exposed that even the Paddy Morris clique was afraid to come to his rescue. Deal is another of Paul Scharenberg's "faithfuls."

* Labor Party Dumped

Although the reactionary clique, headed by Paddy Morris, present secretary of the District I.L.A., succeeded in dumping the Labor Party resolution and gaining some control of the top machinery of the Federation, closer bonds of friendship were welded between the seamen and longshoremen militants, who were forced to fight shoulder to shoulder to prevent the labor fakery from gaining complete control of the organization.

The fight to get complete rank and file control of the Maritime Federation will be waged in all the local councils to be set up in all the major ports of the Pacific Coast. Most of the reactionaries lost prestige in their efforts to humiliate the Federation. With all their hypocrisy and lies, they could not prevent the militant delegates from forcing action in (Continued on Page 4, Col. 7.)

The Present Status of The C. S. PRISONERS

SACRAMENTO, Calif., April 29.—The eight working-class organizers convicted of conspiracy to commit Criminal Syndicalism and sentenced to one to fourteen years, have all been transferred to the penitentiary. The girls, Caroline Decker, Lorine Norman and Nora Conklin were moved to the Women's State Prison at Tehachapi, about fifty miles up in the mountains outside Bakersfield, on last Friday.

The men, Pat Chambers, Al Hougardy, Martin Wilson, Jack Crane and Norman Mini, were transferred to San Quentin on Saturday.

It is estimated that the hearing on their appeal will not be granted before eight months. Meanwhile, their freedom will depend upon the strength and earnestness of the mass pressure rallied behind the appeal movement. The International Labor Defense is conducting the appeal for all prisoners. At least \$10,000 will be needed to carry on this campaign. Funds should be sent to the I. L. D. office, 1005 Market street, Room 410, San Francisco.

The case against Defendant A. G. Ford has been dismissed for lack of evidence. Ford took sick during the long trial and had to be transferred to the hospital. Judge Lemmon ordered his case continued, rather than delay the trial for all.

PERKINS BOARD HELPLESS WHEN COMPANIES DENY UNION RECOGNITION

BULLETIN

SAN FRANCISCO, April 30.—San Francisco local of the Sailors Union of the Pacific, meeting here last night, voted to accept the present constitution of the West Coast Maritime Federation with 5 cent assessments to start as of April.

The Sailors also voted demanding the resignation of Carter, business agent of the Portland Sailors Union, for his part in attempting to sabotage formation of the Federation. The sum of \$100 was voted for the defense of the workers held in a Modesto jail framed on charges of having participated in a "dynamite plot."

SAN FRANCISCO, April 28.—While the oil companies consistently refused to grant union recognition to seamen and other maritime workers involved in the tanker strike, Harry Lundberg, newly elected president of the Maritime Federation declared that the Federation "favors immediate action even to the extent of calling a general strike vote."

Joseph E. Myers and E. P. Marsh, two more so-called "crack" federal mediators have been ordered here to try a hand at "settling" the strike. The Perkins-Mediation board has admitted its inability to end the walk-out and is waiting word from Washington, D. C., before taking further action.

Oil companies insist they will require seamen only as jobs become available and flatly refuse to grant any satisfactory measure of union recognition. Meanwhile, because labor fakers here and at other ports refuse to organize militant picketing, the companies have been running tankers with seamen.

Seamen here last week voted to revive the picket lines and passed a resolution to the effect no more men would be allowed to ship out without the regular picket stamps. Many of the original tanker seamen already had re-shipped on deep water boats, unwittingly playing into the hands of the Paul Scharenberg clique that called the strike over the heads of the rank and file union members.

Stockton Striker Murdered; To Be Buried May Day

STOCKTON, Calif., April 30.—Ray Morencey, striking warehouseman shot in cold blood on the street here Sunday by Charles Gray, son of a trucking company owner, will be buried May First, the day of international proletarian solidarity.

Plans for a huge funeral demonstration to be participated in by all local unions and other workers' organizations were being made today.

Meanwhile, the killer was in jail here facing a murder charge. Even police were forced to admit his plea of self-defense is sheer fakery since Morencey was unarmed when fired upon by Gray.

More than 300 warehousemen, members of the International Longshoremen's Association, had been on strike here for more than two weeks, demanding increased pay and better working conditions. The strike has been under arbitration for several days before the Federal Regional Labor Board in San Francisco.

Union Band To Lead OAKLAND DEMONSTRATION IN PARK AS PARADE PERMIT DENIED

LOS ANGELES, April 30.—The United Front May Day demonstration in Los Angeles will begin in the Plaza, Sunset and Main, at 12 noon. Speakers representing the principal participating organizations will address the workers. Various Epic, Utopian and Church groups, many Public Works and Unemployed Leagues, S.F.R.A. Unions, the League of Struggle for Negro Rights, the Young Pioneers, the Communist Party, Painters Local 138, International Furriers, Garment Workers Local 96 and Bakers Local 37 are some of the scores of organizations who will take part in the May Day demonstration, or who will have acted on May Day in fraternal conferences.

The evening May Day Celebration will be held in Mason Opera House, 127 So. Broadway, at 7:30 p. m. Louise Todd, Section Organizer of the Communist Party will be the principal speaker in the evening. Comrade Todd is at present free on bail pending her appeal on a framed charge of perjury brought against her when petitions putting the Communist Party on the state ballot were filed last year.

NATION-WIDE PROTESTS FLOOD SANTA FE ON FRAME-UP

10 Held For Murder FIVE OTHERS FOR DEPORTATION

SANTA FE, New Mexico, Apr. 27.—The mass protest of workers already taking on nationwide dimensions, has snatched from the shadow of the gallows twenty-seven of the Gallup defendants who were charged with first degree murder.

At the preliminary hearing Wednesday, these twenty-seven were freed and returned to Gallup, the frame-up against them being too raw to stand in the light of the aroused working class which from all parts of the country is flooding Santa Fe with protests.

The attempt of the mine operators to crush labor, however, is being continued, and fourteen defendants were held, ten on the murder charges and four more on charges of aiding and abetting Exequio Navarro to escape custody. This latter charge is also pending against the ten facing murder charges.

Four of the defendants are held without bail—Manuel Avila, Juan Ochoa, Augustine Calvillo and Leonardo Velarde.

Six, Joe Bartol, Gregorio Correa, Victorio Correa, Rafael Gomez, Willie Gonzales and Serapio Susa are held on \$7,500 each and the four facing aiding and abetting charges are held on \$500 each each.

The charges arise out of an unprovoked attack with guns and tear gas that Sheriff Carmichael, Sheriff Roberts and a gang of deputies made on a crowd of workers who had come to see the outcome of charges of Navarro, arrested on order of Senator Vogel for fighting the Senator's order of eviction from his home. During the shooting Sheriff Carmichael was killed by his own men. It is for this death—not that of two workers who were murdered also by the deputies at the time—that the ten are now held in death cells in the state penitentiary. Navarro escaped in the excitement and is still free.

No sooner were the twenty-seven released than Federal deportation warrants appeared against two of them, Dototoc Andrade and Basilio Gutierrez and they were rearrested. This makes five who are held.

OAKLAND PARK MEET

OAKLAND, April 30.—The back-passing maneuvers of the Oakland City Council and Police Department has prevented the issuance of a permit for a workers' May Day parade; so there will be a mass meeting in Jefferson Park, corner of Grove and Eleventh, at 2 p. m., following which there will be an indoor rally and banquet at the Danish Hall at 3 p. m.

The City Council, in its meeting April 25, neither refused nor granted a permit to the representatives of the United Front May Day Committee; instead referring the workers back to the police, who had refused a previous application.

SAN DIEGO

April 30.—A mighty United Front of workers from Seattle to San Diego will go into action May Day to march and celebrate their International Labor Day. Sacramento workers will hold the first march since the vigilante raids of last summer; Portland workers have forced the city council to grant a parade permit to the "unemployed" after it was refused to the May Day Committee. San Francisco's United Front forced a parade permit for Market street, Los Angeles workers will demonstrate in the Plaza, regardless of police efforts to harass them by barring loud speakers.

2000 At Oakland Mooney Meeting

OAKLAND, April 28.—With a record attendance of over 2000 the United Front here Tom Mooney mass meeting in the Civic Auditorium Theater today was a tremendous success. A broad campaign of publicity over the radio including announcements on the East Bay Labor Council's regular program, with thousands of leaflets rallied one of the largest labor turn-outs in recent years in Oakland.

Furniture Workers Picket L. A. Plant

MAY 1 STRIKE MAY TIE UP INDUSTRY IN 18 PLANTS

LOS ANGELES, April 27.—Collective bargaining elections in 18 factories, scheduled for next Tuesday, have been cancelled. This followed disagreement between unionists and the Los Angeles Furniture Manufacturers' Association.

The Morris Furniture Company, 4433 So. Alameda street, is idle and workers are picketing the plants.

A strike throughout the industry in Los Angeles is anticipated for May Day, unless unforeseen developments take place. Dr. Towne Nylander of the Regional Labor Board admitted that "the manufacturers have withdrawn their consent to the elections and there is nothing we can do to stop a strike."

At least 1000 men will be involved in the strike, affecting the 18 plants. In 14 other plants, involving 1800 workers, the strike may be held in abeyance.

The union has as one of its principal demands a scale of 75 cents an hour for skilled and 50 cents an hour for unskilled labor.

600 At "Front" Street Meeting

SAN FRANCISCO, April 29.—More than 600 maritime workers attended the first waterfront street meeting since the strike last year, held near the I.L.A. dispatching hall on Clay street here at 7 o'clock this morning.

The meeting was held under the auspices of the United Front May Day Conference. Speakers called upon the workers to down tools May 1 and to take part in the May Day march and demonstration.

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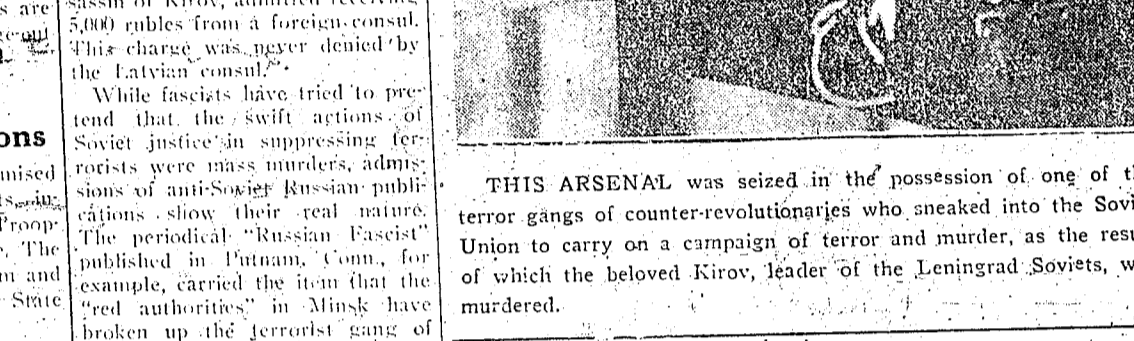
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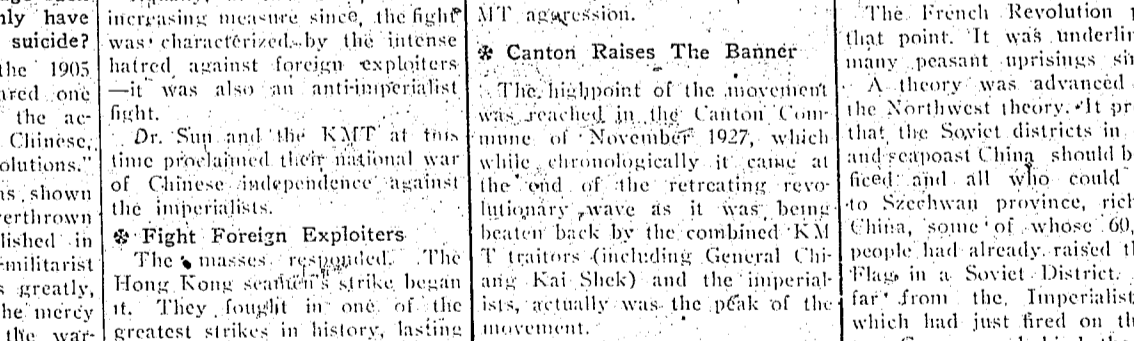
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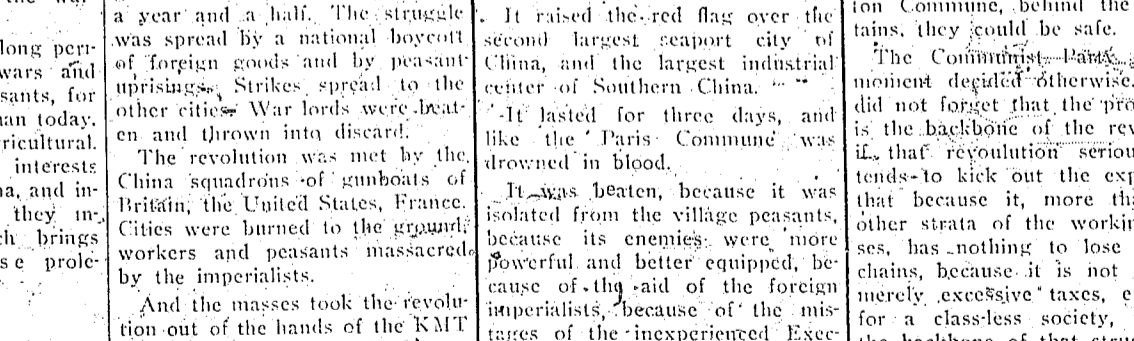
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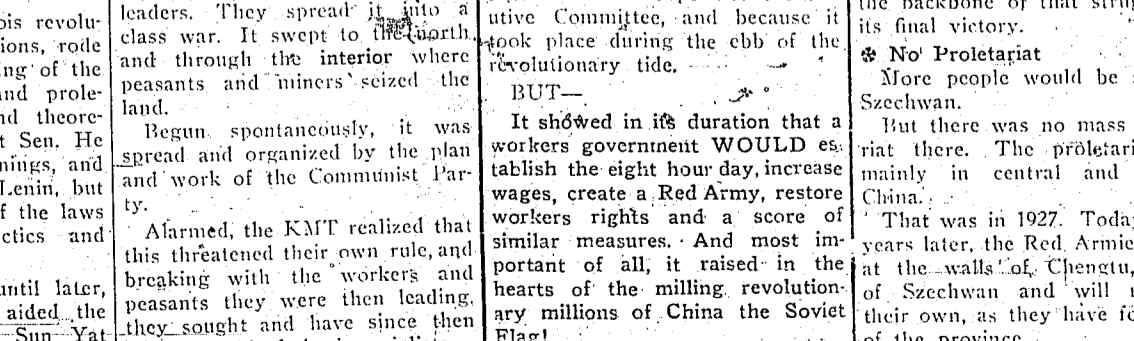
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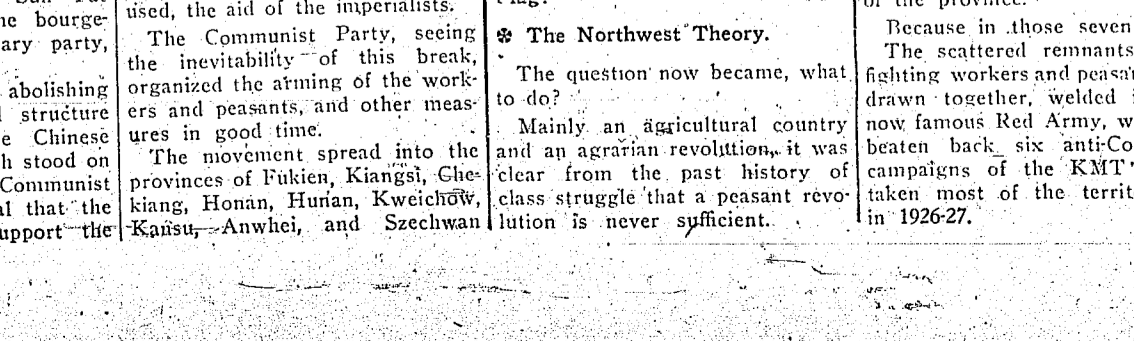
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HEARST PAPER'S "SOB STORY" EXPOSED AS RIDICULOUS LIE

EVICTING THE HOMELESS

Hardly a month following the conviction of eight working-class organizers on false charges of conspiracy to commit Criminal Syndicalism, the City of Sacramento is launching a drive against the unemployed more despicable than anything California has seen to date.

Along the banks of the Sacramento and American rivers at the outskirts of the city, it is estimated that approximately 15,000 destitute workers are living in makeshift huts and dugouts. This remarkable community started during the Hoover administration and bears the name of "Hooverville." Driven to the last stages of poverty, these workers were forced to build homes of old packing boxes. They comb the city garbage dumps daily in search of food. Rather than diminishing, this little city of misery has grown steadily during the Roosevelt administration.

Encouraged by the convictions gained in the Criminal Syndicalism frame-up, the city rulers are now moving to rid themselves of what constitutes a major blot on their administration. They have issued orders that all Hooverville residents on city property must vacate within five days and all on private property within seven days. No provision is being made to move them to other shelters.

Protest must be made at once to City Manager James Dean, District Attorney Cecil B. Anderson, Mayor Merriam at Sacramento. Demand that suitable time be given the Hooverville population to vacate and that adequate houses be provided for them to move into.

VIOLENCE! BY WHOM? AGAINST WHAT?

Bernarr McFadden, in the May 13th LIBERTY MAGAZINE has written an editorial advocating that all Communists be seized, exhibited in cages like wild animals, and then put to death.

Such an intense outburst of fanaticism from the editor of an allegedly 100 per cent American magazine needs some explanation. From the Czar of all Russias, a Roman Caesar or a Pharaoh of ancient Egypt, an appetite for murder and torture such as this might pass as the expected thing. From a self-proclaimed exponent of freedom and democracy, it is a glaring contradiction.

The title of the editorial is "How the Communists Plan to Wreck the Country."

The rapid spread of Communist ideas through the working class has become a fact of national importance. It is necessary to make the parasitic section of the populace tremble in their swivel chairs.

The whole thing is very simple. There is no more democracy in the United States today than there is in a department store or a cotton mill. The country, and everything in it and on it, is the private property of a very small (and very frightened) minority of capitalists who easily control the government by the domination of all propaganda mediums. They operate this private estate of theirs, not for the benefit of the population, but for their own profit. The result is very apparent in the depression and the immiseration of a new world war.

Communism would extend democracy into the factory, the field and even into Mr. Bernarr McFadden's giant publishing plant. Communism proposes that the people who do all the work in a country shall own that country and operate its industries for the common good.

The simple logic and justice of this as compared to the outlandish private anarchy which Mr. McFadden chooses to call "Americanism" is the explanation for the rapid spread of Communist ideas.

The establishment of this Workers and Farmers Government in substitute for the tragic, madhouse America has degenerated into today (under the leadership and ownership of such as Mr. McFadden) is what this forcible editor would call "wrecking the country."

Mr. McFadden is well aware that Communists do not advocate either violence or sabotage. On the contrary, throughout all Communist teachings these methods are bitterly opposed.

But the Communists place themselves in opposition to such potential murderers as Mr. McFadden and William Randolph Hearst, who realize that their "statistics" will attack them with every violence and every dirty treachery conceivable. Therefore Communists understand that the task they are undertaking is a dangerous one that will eventually bring them into hand to hand combat with a brutal force that did not legitimate during the World War to slaughter 22 million men because there was a handsome profit for them in every skull.

And for this reason the Communists salute the future with upraised fists.

WHO IS REALLY DESTROYING AMERICA?

If the policies of the AAA were not insane enough on the face of it, with their plowing under of acreage, destruction of produce and wreckage of the nation's natural resources, the following figures on the importation of farm products should be sufficient to enlighten the mind.

In the first three months of 1934, the importation of most products amounted to 11 million pounds. In the first three months of 1933 the figure jumped to 25,600,000 pounds. Importation of butter fell from 127,500 to 8,538,140. Corn, from 50,151 bushels to 7,017,550 bushels. Cotton cake and meal from 47,014 to 35,402,696.

FINNISH WORKERS ISSUE LEADING ASKING FOR SUPPORT IN TRIAL

BERKELEY, May 20.—A three weeks' postponement by the court has delayed the damage suit of the Berkeley Finnish Workers' Association against the city of Berkeley for wreckage of their hall by vigilantes last July.

Intervened among the ships under construction are two aircraft carriers, three heavy cruisers, seven light cruisers, ten submarines, and forty-four destroyers. Certainly an impressive fleet. It is expected that the new navy will be ready to sail in the next few months.

The current government drive "Off Relief Onto Work" has created a condition in California agricultural fields which undoubtedly have serious results in the immediate future.

Today he received word from San Joaquin County that 1,700 relief cases had been closed within 12 weeks. Of these, 1,300 accepted private employment while 400 refusing employment found SERA aid off.

Since that day relief cases have been cut at a rapidly increasing rate. Newspapers report the move as a recovery device.

The truth of the matter is that a conspiracy exists between the big growers and the relief offices. The grower offers the workers employment in the fields at a wage the same or lower than his relief quota.

The growers now regard themselves as monarchs in the field. They consider their workers and the unemployed as a section of the populace in semi-dependence—a mass of propertyless men and women who should accept any work offered to them, regardless of wages, and be glad to get it.

President Roosevelt's message on the Patman Bonus veto was so much talk against that particular bill, as against payment of the bonus in any shape or form.

And it is certain that if the veterans were today receiving adequate relief they would not be instituting such a vigorous demand for their bonus situation, a series of bitter struggles can be expected.

As regards both bonus and relief, the problem becomes "herculean" to the government of capitalism, for it exists for the purpose of preventing these very methods which are the only methods by which the task could be accomplished.

CHAIN LETTER HYSTERIA

At a time when the American people are faced with the most serious problems that ever confronted a civilization, the post office becomes swamped with a tide of nonsense letters that threaten to break its back.

There is a definite psychology to gambling. The more desperate, miserable and poverty-stricken a country or civilization becomes, the more intensely does gambling rage amidst its social life.

The poor gamble out of desperation. The rich gamble out of boredom from their parasitic idleness.

WHAT ABOUT THE BONUS?

Many veterans, when they heard the Communist Party was opposing that Patman Bonus bill, said, "My God! You Communists are against everything."

One veteran remarked: "We don't care how we get it, just so we get it."

Let it be clear that the Communist Party does not oppose payment of the bonus. On the contrary, it has given practical support at all times to this just demand of the veterans.

But the Communist Party means PAYMENT of the bonus and not some deceitful evasion. We do not approve of the government's paying off the veterans in United Cigar Store coupons, which is what the Patman bill amounts to.

It is a pretty difficult task for the exploiting owners of America to suck any more blood out of the dry bones of the American working class. They have them pretty well pauperized as it is.

The Communist Party firmly contends that the bonus must be paid by taxation or assessment of the wealthy parasites who profited billions out of the World War.

A second bonus march is in process of formation. The veterans will make a sad mistake if they waste all their mass pressure demanding passage of the Patman bill.

WHY IS HEARST SUCH A DRIVELING COWARD?

Why is Hearst such a driveling coward? This question is probably in the minds of millions of American readers. Why are all the wealthy parasites frothing in such abject terror at the very mention of Communism?

You have possibly seen our headquarters. Certainly nothing magnificent as compared to the mighty skyscrapers of the terrified. Countless hundreds of police raids throughout the nation have revealed that we possess not so much as a sling shot with which to storm their fortresses.

Yet they possess tanks and machine guns no end. Their mercenary army boasts that it could exterminate the entire population in a few weeks. They control all the money in the country. They own all the buildings and all the ground that they're standing on.

THEY ARE AFRAID OF YOU.

They are afraid of you. They are afraid of you and what we are telling you. They don't want you to hear what we have to say.

Certainly Mr. Hearst, lounging in his fabulous San Simeon palace is somewhat ridiculous when he uses the editorial "WE" in addressing you in his newspapers, and Mr. Hearst knows it. So do all these bombastic parasites realize it.

They realize the insecurity and senselessness of their position. They are bombarding the American people with high sounding phrases of "patriotism" and "Americanism" and "freedom" and "democracy." Yet they know full well there is no more democracy in America than there is in one of Mr. Hearst's printing plants. They haven't an argument nor a fragment of logic with which to defend themselves.

What we are trying to tell you is that this America they talk so much about is YOURS. It belongs to you. You built it and you do all the work in it. TAKE IT. Why should it exist as the private estate of a handful of depraved parasites like Hearst. The land and the industries can already produce ten times more than enough to supply the needs of the population. Yet year after year, half the population goes without suffers untold brain-torture and worry trying to make ends meet.

This is the kind of cold logic that makes Hearst and his like tremble in their boots.

They know that even their mercenary army is recruited out of the poor. They're afraid of their own shadow. Every time an automobile backfires on the Coast Highway, William Randolph Hearst jumps out of his skin, thinking you are on your way up there to bounce him in a blanket.

He has just finished publishing an elegantly printed pamphlet imploring you to have nothing to do with us—telling you we are a bunch of bearded foreigners intent upon plunging you into misery and hunger.

Why should we want to do what Mr. Hearst and his tribe has already accomplished?

As for "bearded foreigners," come around to our meetings sometime. Visit us in our headquarters. You will find we are the guys you used to go to grammar school with.

JUNE ELECTIONS SHOULD PUT RANK AND FILE IN OFFICE

Epic headquarters is over \$100,000 in debt. Most of the income is from wealthy-to-people. Very little from the general mass. About two-thirds of the Epic groups have ceased functioning. And the display of Sinclair's autocratic control at the convention did the organization no good. Yet the Epic followers have a desperate need to struggle for improved conditions. It is up to the members of the Communist Party to establish a United Front for that purpose.
