SAN FRANCISCO. - Branding published reports of movements of "hot cargo" as mostly pro-

paganda to cause confusion, War ren G. Denton, president of the executive council for permitting Warehousemen's Local 38-44, I. wholesale race discrimination, L.A., said Wednesday morning the Kern County Central Labor that he knew of only one case where employers had actually moved goods into warehouses in defiance of the union.

This case, said Denton, was a small quantity of goods moved by the Dunham wholesale hardware concern, which had obviously moved in an effort to create a provocation similar to that when cargo from the struck River Lines was piled on numerous San Francisco docks. Denton revealed that so far as

he could determine, no Teamsters were otherwise moving goods being picketed by the union. Goods from the struck warehouses of the McKesson-Langley Wholesale Drug concern were being allowed to move to Fresno, where it was expected that union teamsters would allow it to go no further.

The Warehousemen have settled with cold storage warehouses and have offered to release \$50,000,000 worth of goods from public warehouses. It is around this movement that the employers are attempting to force a stampede to break the blockade on struck wholesale warehouses as well.

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Japanese Maneuver Unmasked

THE SEIZURE of Chiang Kai-Shek by the young Marshal Chang Hsueh-liang was a clever maneuver instigated by Japanese imperialism in order to take advantage of the ensuing crisis to push its drive into China. Obviously the danger of outbreak of open civil war in China, which was intended to be brought about by the kidnapping of Chiang, makes more difficult the unification of China against Japanese imperialism and furthers the ends of the Japanese invaders.

The attempt of Japan to cover its role of instigator by the issuance of "demands" by Chang Hsueh-liang for the unification of China against Japanese aggression was clever demagogy—but easily punctured as such when it came to light that Chang's confidential adviser was a notorious Chinese agent of the Japanese government.

This move by Japanese imperialismwhether Chang consciously served its ends or was merely a tool—was caused by a desire of the Japanese to stop the trend of Nan-"kind towards national unity, even though that trend was slow and had not yet resulted in effective unified action against Japanese imperialism.

Meanwhile, taking full advantage of the crisis it brought about, Japanese imperialism is pushing its drive into China—and its actions are admittedly based on the recently concluded German-Japanese anti-Communist

Japanese imperialism cloaks its drive under the guise of a campaign against Bolshevism; and very conveniently stamps any Chinese people's movement against imperialism as launched by Moscow.

Japanese imperialism has openly allied itself with Italian and German fascism as the worlds greatest menace to peace. Its maneuvers in China further the program of this Unholy Trinity, rapidly moving to involve the entire world, including the United States, in the world slaughter they are plotting.

America's answer must be joint action with the world's forces for peace—and first of all, cooperation with the peace policy of the Soviet Union, the world's chief bulwark against fascism and war.

Back Labor's Fight to Free Modesto Prisoners

NOW THAT the sordid facts of the Modesto frame-up by the Standard Oil Company have been brought to light by the confession of James Scrudder, a former longshoreman who told of being hired to perpetuate the deed, and organized labor in San Francisco has taken the first steps in the fight to free the Modesto prisoners, every progressive group in California must mobilize behand the S. F. Labor Council in its fight.

The S. F. Labor Council adopted resolutions demanding of Governor Merriam immediate pardons for all seven Modesto prisoners now behind the bars; the indictment of Scrudder for perjury and the indictment of District Attorney Cleary of Stanislaus County, one Standard Oil attorney and a commpany agent for subornation of perjury; a swift and thorough investigation by Mayor Rossi of the connections between the S. F. police department and the Standard Oil Company; and an immediate sweeping investigation of the frame-up by the LaFollette Committee. Committees were appointed to push these various matters.

This action by the labor Council must be followed up immediately. The Committees must waste no time in pressing these demands -but the committees must receive immediwately the organized support of every trade union and other progressive organization throughout the State!

All organizations wishing to help smash the frame-up system which has made Cali fornia notorious for many years should at once pass resolutions addressed to the Governor. Mayor Rossi, and the Attorney General Webb, calling for the actions proposed by the S. F. Labor Council. Only a flood of protests will force these officials to act such a contribution.

The Seamens Church Institute, boycotted by seamen since 1934, when it was used to recruit strikebreakers is not now a Seamen's institution in any sense of the word. The only people to be found inside its doors, besides the high-salaried officials, are a constantly-shifting handful of homeless men who visit it for a feed, as they do every other mission on the skidroad.

If the purpose of the Community Chest officials is to use this \$1,000 where it will do the most good for the maritime workers, the Recreation Center is the only logical recipient of the funds.

Leroy Kitts, executive director of the Community Chest, has scheduled another meeting with a Maritime Federation committee within two weeks to go further into the matter before a final decision is made. Trade unions, other working class organizations, and individual Chest contributors are urged to write Mr. Kitts urging these funds be diverted to the Recreation Center.

In the union and outside. People they have known for years. Friends they ate with, went to shows with, spend Sundays and holidays with And so they never considered them as contacts. Contacts to them were some vague persons, whose names you put on a Contact List, who you saw once a month or so when you had a few minutes.

These are the contacts. The others are the friends and relations whom you have known for so long that they weren't contacts any more and therefore never considered for Party membership. This seems unbelievable but really is true.

A Good Recruit I know of one case where Party member, giving this same answer, had a brother-in-law working in an unorganized shop. Because of close association for many years with our Party member, this worker inbibed not only the interest but a great understanding and appreciation of our Party's work. It never occurred pended or disbanded. to our Party member that here in his own household was a fine recruit for the Party. It was just his brother-in-law. That unorganized shop began to unionize. Another Communist working in that same shop recruited this worker after two weeks friendship. Our first Party comrade was amazed when he heard of it. Diseases Can Be Spread Through Kissing of Images, Communion

San Rafael, Calif.

DEAR SIR: My sister, who is quite religious and who works in the church, says that all of the people taking communion drink out of the same sacrament cup. Does this spread disease?

ANSWER-Religious ceremonies are often the focus of infection for all kinds of epidemics. I remember attending the Easter services at the Russian Orthodox church in Paris, and to my amazement, all of the hundreds of broken-down aristocrats and white-guardists filed past the head priest and kissed his long, filthy beard.

In Rome, the right foot of the statue of St. Peter, made of marble, has been worn completely away by the kisses of pilgrims who have brought virulent diseases from all over the world.

As is well known, taking communion includes drinking wine out of the sacrament cup. It is claimed that the alcohol in the wine kills all the germs. This is not true; the alcohol is not strong

From Painful Feet, An Occupational Disease San Francisco, Calif.

DEAR DOCTOR: I am a clerk at the Emporium department store, and my feet often pain me after several hours of work. Thave been told that I do not have flat feet. Many of my fellowworkers have the same trouble.

ANSWER-In such cases, standing is harder on the feet than walking, because while walking the musicles are exercised and toned up. Where there is no evident disease of the feet, such as weak arches or arthritis, these symptoms are caused by the occu-

The feet should be exercised frequently by rising on the toes repeatedly in order to strengthen the musicles. If this doesn't bring relief, the only treatment is rest in bed for several days at a time. I believe that industrial compensation can be obtained

No one can deny that we thoroughly established our Party as an American Party, that our slogan—"Communism is 20th Century Americanism," registered deeply with the American people. Can anyone deny that in this campaign the Communist Party smashed the conspiracy to outlaw it, to rouse a pogrom spirit in America against the Communists, to drive us out of politics? We forced our Party on the ballot in states that had passed laws designed especially to keep it off. Where, as in Illinois, we were kept off the ballot it was by arbitrary violation of the letter and spirit of the election laws, unreasonable as they were, or as in Florida, where the law now even excludes the Republican Party. When in Terre Haute and Tampa, and against Comrade Ford in Durham and Toledo, mob action was resorted to, this did not rouse the country against us. as the reactionaries hoped, but we turned the attacks into the most effective boomerang whereby we rallied even large sections of the capitalist press to speak in our defense, and won new sympathy from millions who were formerly indifferent to us. Here also is a great achievement.

Let us now turn attention to some of the most serious weaknesses and shortcomings of the campaign, First of all we must speak of the entirely unsatisfactory state of the recruitment of new members. Our membership grew but there was not an increase in tempo to keep pace with our heightened activity and broadened contacts. Our units, sections and districts were not able to keep this task in the center of their attention. It constantly slipped into the background and was forgotten in favor of the more exciting and spectacular sides of the campaign. Concentrated attention to important industries and localities was also too often forgotten and the Party slipped back too much into the old diffused general approach against which we have struggled for years.

I shall take up the great Marine Strike which occupies the center of the picture today. This should be some indication to us of what is going to come in many other districts of the country. what a higher plane it is this forces of the marine workers, how much more widespread is their influence spreading to the other sections of the labor movement and how they are gaining international support from the French and Mexican longshoremen. That is why Mr. Ryan was in a hurry to adopt a solidarity strike with the employers as a means of combatting the solidarity actions of the workers.

This great battle in marine should become the first point of concentration of all the energies of the Party. Successful results from this struggle seem quite possible, quite within the grasp of the workers today, especially if we raily all possible support to them. They will have an enormous influence in stimulating and hastening the growth of similar movements that are maturing in many other industries all over the country.

The next industry that must be especially mentioned is agriculture. The activities there are tremendously encouraging, showing great possibilities. Unfortunately, there is a negative side to the picture, showing in many districts the neglect of this queswhere to neglect the agricultural workers. Violators of New Constitution to Be Punished

MOSCOW. - First charges of violating the new Soviet Constitution were brought at Kazan, where 11 persons were illegally arrested without a warrant. According to the new *Constitution, 'no one may be subjected to arrest except upon the decision of a court or with the sanction of the prosecutor."

Krylenko has assumed his duties as head of the newly-created All-Union Commissariat for Justice, and is reorganizing the whole legal profession into voluntary association, which will give legal aid to any accused persons demanding their services. FRANCO CAN'T TAKE MADRID WITHOUT MORE NAZI, ITALIAN AID, SAYS 'N. Y. TIMES" MAN

Describes Garabaldi Battalion of Anti-Fascists In International Column, Headed by War Vet Leader

ally had to take some action, so finally, after much delay, they drafted an ordinance strengthening fire safety requirements as far as night clubs were conthing about the flop houses, rooming houses, and apartment houses, although a number of people were burned to death in a rooming house fire.

Bankers and Supervisors . . . Why didn't the supervisors e action on residential build-

The answer is simple: I shouldn't even have put the question. The supervisors and the people who own all these buildings and the bankers who own the mortgages are all great pals. 

Relates Its Achievements in Mass Production Industries and Its Plans for These Basic Industries; Relationship to the American Federation of Labor

for Industrial Organization received hundreds of letters from workers in all conceivable inlustries asking for assistance and in many cases for charters. The Committee for Industrial Organization decided that it must, for the greatest possible effectiveness, concentrate its energies on autos, rubber, and, later, steel. And of course we have from the start maintained our policy of not entering fields where the craft unions are already estab-lished. Since many of these groups nevertheless look to the Committee for Industrial Organization for future aid, and indeed have already been given new courage by our accomplishments, it is worth describing briefly the more important ones.

SHIPYARD WORKERS AND THE MARITIME FEDERATION

The Industrial Union of Marne and Shipbuilding Workers had been forced to set itself up as an independent union before the Committee for Industrial Organization came into existence. After a notable victory in Camden, it spread to private yards in San Pedro, Chester, Newport News, Staten Island, and other centers, the craft unions having made little headway in these places. Unions in the Committee for Industrial Organization have continued the friendly interest in this shipyard union which they nad shown before the 1935 American Federation of Labor
