Employers Want Pre-Strike Conditions

The employers' answer to the demands of the I.L.A. represen tatives proposes to go back to Blue-Book (company-union) conditions of lower wages, longer hours, unemployment, speed-up, blacklisting, and favoritism.

While cynically throwing overboard the entire 1934 award, the employers are attempting to fool public opinion by hypocritically claring, with tongue in cheek, that they are "willing" to arbi-

They are laying the groundwork to try and justify their plan to deliberately provoke a strike or lockout on the waterfront, and place the blame on the maritime unions, which have declared that they are willing and anxious to negotiate a peaceful settlement of

The attitude and proposals of the employers in the I.L.A. negonations clearly indicate that they didn't come to negotiate but to declare war on the unions and terminate the 1934 award.

Also Aimed at Seamen's Crafts

This first blow aimed at the longshoremen is also directed against the seamen's crafts which are preparing to enter into negotiations with demands to improve the disgraceful and intolerable working conditions on the ships.

NEW DANGER IS FOUND IN THE **COPELAND ACT**

"Rating" May Mean Character Entries

SAN FRANCISCO-New dangers in the Copeland Bill, which provides for the continuous discharge book, have been discovered in carefully examining the pro-shipowner measure. The new dangers are reported in the "Voice of the Federation," organ of the Pacific Maritime Federa-

Under Section 3, Section 4551 (b) states:

"Upon the discharge of any seamen and the payment of his wages, the shipping commission er shall enter in the continuous discharge book of such seaman the name of the vessel, the nature of the voyage (foreign or coastwise), the class to which the vessel belongs (steam, motor or sail), the date and place of the shipment and of the discharge of such seaman.

seaman shall also be entered. Whenever a seaman is discharged in any collection district where no shipping commissioner has been appointed, the master of the vessal shall perform the duties of such commissioner and shall make the proper entries in such continuous discharge book; and when the seamen are not required by law to be signed on and discharged before a shipping commissoner, the master shall make such proper entries in the discharge book."

The word "rating," it is pointed out, calls attention to the daninto account the present Dept. of Commerce Discharge, it is pointed out, under the word "rating" The word "rating" cannot mean the job the seaman held, for this is specified under "Capacity."

By the use of the word "rating" and the wording of the clause, the Copeland continuous discharge book can be taken only as a blacklisting measure.

The frameup in the Point Lobos case proceeded Monday with the indictment of five men by the Alameda County Grand Jury, on charges of "murder."

Those indicted and held are:

Earl King, secretary of the Pacific Coast Marine Firemen's Union; E. H. Ramsey, and George Wallace, members of the Name sof the other two indict-

ed were withheld. A. M. Murphy, assistant secretary of the Marine Firemen, was not indicted, nor was he held in custody The indictments were made after alleged "confessions" by Walace and Murphy.

After Wallace's statement, the press reported that a warrant had been issued for the arrest of Lawrence Ross, editor of the Western Worker. When he learned of this, Ross, with Attorney George Anderson, went to District Attorney Warren, in Alameda County. He was not held.

Halt Hitler's War Plans

HITLER has dropped all pretense that he is for peace, that his previous steps, such as the building of battleships and the re-militarization of the Rhine, were purely "defensive and protective." With one stroke of his pen he has doubled the strength of the Nazi army by extending military service to two years.

Hitler paved the way for this stroke by an intensive war-inciting campaign against the armed strength of the Soviet Union, attempting to convince the masses of German people that the Soviet Union was pursuing an aggressive policy.

The whole world knows that the armed strength of the Soviet Union is a purely defensive force, to defend and guard the victories of the Socialist revolution against any attempt at intervention and aggression.

The announcement by Hitler of the redoubling of the Nazi army comes on the heels of a secret conference between Hitler, Air Marshal Italo Balbo of Italy, and Admiral Horthy of Hungary. There, no doubt, the plans were drawn up for the crystallization of a central European fascist bloc for war against the Soviet Union.

Hitler is calling the Reichstag-his parliamentary puppet—together for September bth. This all logically fits into the war-making plans of the Nazis. The Reichstag will put its rubber stamp of approval on Hitler's acts, will listen-and the entire German people will be forced to listen-to Hitler's speeches about the "destiny of the German Aryans, 'and actively launch the entire country into the last stages of intensive war preparations, the chief theme of which will be lying and vicious attacks on the "danger of an attack by Moscow."

The war no doubt will be termed a "holy war," a "crusade against Moscow,"-a "preventive war."

What can the American people do to help prevent Hitler from carrying out his murderous plans?

First, render all possible support to the heroic Spanish people fighting against Fascism. Resolutions of solidarity with the Span-

ish republican forces should be passed by all trade unions and other working class organizations. These resolutions should be backed by financial assistance to the embattled Spanish anti-Fascists. This fight is not only against the Spanish Fascists, but against the Hitler and Mussolini brands of Fascism. Both Germany and Italy have been actively and materially supporting General Franco and his



Cops Aid Food Plant By Getting Phoney "Identification"

By a Worker Correspondent. BERKELEY-On Tuesday, August 18th, as some of the workers from Durkee's Foods, Inc., Berkeley, went up to the office of Federal Labor Union No. 20-218, they were attacked by five men and beaten.

As they were fighting, the workers knocked out three of the gangsters we heard; that is, the union men gave the gangsters the worst of it. At the end of the fight, cops appeared on the scene and the workers

Next morning a couple of men went to the home of one of the Durkee's Foods workers and attacked the wife of Frank Gomez, 2717 Tenth Street, Berkeley. "Identification" Trick

The next day the police took the woman and went to identify the machine which was supposed to have brought the man to her home—the machine of the men who attacked her. These men who attacked her are supposed to be the men who attacked the workers the night before.

She is supposed to have identified the machine as belonging to a worker who was fired from the Durkee plant because he had joined the Federal Labor Union. This worker's name was Strigle. His machine could not possibly have been the one used because he had used the machine in going to work early that morning.

We got hold of Strigle yesterday. Strigle, Greatheart and Cassiday went to Gomez's house last night to try to straighten local "Red Squad," who have out the matter, inasmuch as the woman had identified the wrong machine. Mrs. Gomez, either being under the influence of the police, or badly confused and intimidated by the police, called the police again.





JAPANESE AND CHINESE MUST

Big Business Robbed Orientals Too, Says Worker

By An Agricultural Worker. STOCKTON-I want to say a word in regard to Chinese and Japanese workers. I remember very well how these workers were brought here.

Mr. Jim Hill, president of the Great Northern Railroad Company, brought over hundreds of these workers to take the place of white workers on all jobs Then the Milwaukee Railroad Company brought 2500 Japanese workers over and put them in full charge of section gangs, round-house men, and on engines. That took place in 1907.

We workers put in a protest to those companies and pleaded with business men for support. What was the answer?-they told us that they wanted them because they could sell them \$2 hats for \$4 and \$20 suits for \$30 and they did not kick on

the price. But they were not satisfied with the hard work and being robbed by the businessmen, so they went into business for hemselves. Then the big business men woke up to the fact that the Japanese and Chinese were keen business men and went after the business. Then the business men came to us and wanted us workers to stay out of their stores and restaurants, but we workers did not forget the stand that the big business men took in our 1907 demands.

Deafening cheers from the men.

At this point Dudley, disguised as a worker, steps forward, drags the agitator from the soap box and knocks him unconscious with one blow. Twenty or thirty men jump on him, but he sends them all sprawling with his fists. From now on he is the most popular man in the mill and is immediately made leader of the union.

That night, on the way home from work, he catches the Red agitator trying to force his love on the local school teacher, a lovely, buxom creature with a voice like a glass bell. He again thrashes the agitator and walks home arm in arm with the school teacher.

Reviews A Book

IN DUBIOUS BATTLE, by JOHN STEINBECK.

In Dubious Battle is the story of a strike in the apple orchards in California. Although it is about workers and written from the "proletarian slant" its author remains a bourgeois intellectual. In no place in the book does he or his main character, MacLeod, any faith in the courage, integrity or the honesty of the work ing class. Throughout the book Steinbeck, through his main character, remains aloof from the workers, never for one inthe workers, but rather stands aside and views the scenes objectively. As the title implies, Steinbeck is not quite certain about the battle. It's a dubious battle at best. If such be the case, that there is anything dub-'ous about the workers' fight for bread, Steinbeck has never been hungry in his life and doesn't know what the hell he's talking about.

The story opens up with young kid of 22, or so, Jim Nolan, applying at the office of a section organizer for admission to the Communist Party.

According to Steinbeck, section organizer was satisfied that Nolan was of timber of which good Communists are hewn. He is O.K.'d as a member in good standing. The organizer assigns him to duty as field worker in the apple orchards. Just like that. 

I would like to re-emphazie that the ability of the staff members in such clinics, and especially

those that are connected with medical schools, is the best in the community. Any mistakes that may be made or any poor treatment that may be received are due to the overcrowding conditions and the small amount of time that the doctor has for each patient.

For these reasons, it is always best to follow the advice of the doctor who knows your case personally, whether he is a private physician or

a clinic dictor. In spite of the carelessness with which patients are often treated in the large clinics, the advice is always better than that of a friend or the corner druggist. Some cases of diabetes can be controlled solely

by the proper diet, and others require insulin in addition. This can only be determined by weighing all the facts about each individual case. The attacks of trembling which you experienced were undoubtedly a reaction from the insulin taken, but this does not necessarily mean that the insulin should be stopped altogether.

The swelling of the ankles may have something to do with your heart.

Several months ago, I wrote an article explaining my opinion that the units and leading committees should take into consideration a comrade's physical disability when assigning him work to do. 

Organized Labor In Show of Might

By a Laundry Striker

SAN JOSE-The strike of the Laundry Workers in San Jose has shown no new developments for over a week. On that day, Judge Syer, at the suggestion of Attorney Gabriel of the Laundry Owners' Association, dissolved the injunction against the union drivers for the time being.

This move on the part of Gabriel demonstrates how obvious it was that the injunction to keep union drivers from their bread and butter for six months would not be sustained.

Watson, th racketeer who manages to keep a diminishing number of San Jose Laundry Owners under his vulture's wing for a commission of 1 per cent got 67 votes.
