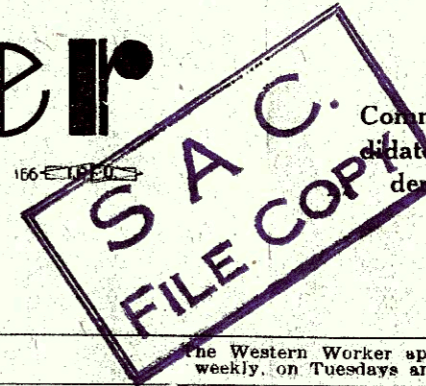

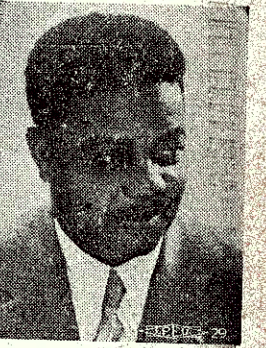

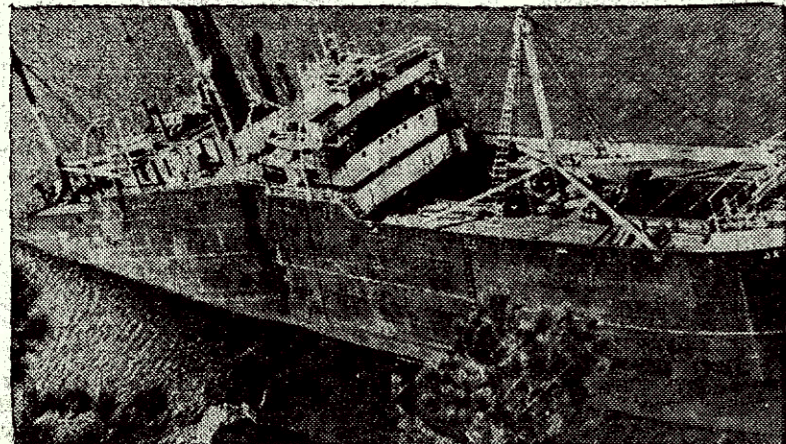
DEMOCRACY VS. FASCISM BORNE OUT AS ISSUE

Schneiderman Radio Talk Shows Events Prove This True

SAN FRANCISCO.—"Events are bearing out the correctness" of the Communists' statement that the issue of this election campaign is "Democracy vs. Fascism." Fascists Given "Acquittal" on Spain

FIGHTING YOUR BATTLE AND MINE, AGAINST FASCISM



MADRID.—With a powerful force of up-to-date tanks and airplanes the government forces launched a sharp counter-attack, taking at least seven towns which had been held by the fascists. The counter-offensive against the fascists began on Thursday, and swept all before it. Torreon De La Calzada, Grinnon and Humanes were among the towns re-taken from the fascists. Heavy fascist losses were reported.

LONDON.—With unequalled brass and total disregard of proved facts, the international non-intervention committee on the Spanish civil war "acquitted" both Fascist Italy and Fascist Portugal of violation of the "neutrality" agreement.

Only the Soviet Union delegate strenuously opposed the "acquittal" and voted against it. The Soviet embassy made public a clarification of the U.S.S.R.'s note on the situation of last week:

"The proceedings of the committee have convinced the Soviet government that at present there are no guarantees against further supply to rebel (Spanish Fascist) generals of war material. In these circumstances the Soviet government is of the opinion that until such guarantees are created and effective control over the strict fulfillment of the obligation regarding non-intervention is established, those governments who consider supplying the legitimate Spanish government are morally entitled not to consider themselves more bound by the agreement than those governments who supply the rebels in contravention of the agreement."

Shipowners Force 39,000 Maritime Workers to Act

East and Gulf Coast Support Assured Behind Fight For Life of Pacific Coast Maritime Unions

At midnight, Thursday, 39,000 Pacific Coast Maritime workers ceased work, as the strike call of the Joint Negotiating Committee of all the maritime unions went out. Every port from San Diego to Juneau and every boat was affected, except for the tankers and fishing craft.

The unions enter this strike powerfully knit together in the Maritime Federation of the Pacific. The strike is assured of fullest support from the East and Gulf Coasts.

A sympathy strike on all American ships in the port of New York was called for noon Friday, Joseph Curran, chairman of the Seamen's Defense Committee, announced.

The shipowners forced the strike. The unions had done everything within reason to avoid a strike, through truces and compromises. The shipowners rejected the basic demands of the sea-going crafts, which are:

Union-controlled hiring hall for all sea-going crafts; cash payments of overtime for sea-going crafts eight hours in 12 for cooks and stewards; preferential employment for licensed desk and engineer department men.

The Pacific Coast strike call was the unanimous decision of the Joint Negotiations Committee after the deadline of 9 p. m. Thursday night had been reached, after shipowners still refused to grant the basic demands of the sea-going unions.

The Joint Negotiations Committee had been empowered to call the strike by a referendum of the members of all the maritime unions up and down the Coast. The balloting of all unions was overwhelming in favor of granting such authority to the Joint Committee, in some cases being almost 100 per cent in the affirmative.

The unions involved are:

International Longshoremen's Association; Sailors' Union of the Pacific; Marine Firemen; Oilers, Wipers and Water Tenders; Marine Cooks and Stewards; American Radio Telegraphists' Association; Masters, Mates and Pilots; Marine Engineers' Beneficial Association.

All the unions stood solidly united as the strike call began. Strike Committees set up by each union are united in a central strike committee, with Harry Bridges, Pacific Coast I.L.A. District President, as chairman and Mervyn Rathborne of the American Radio Telegraphists' Association as secretary. Strike cards were issued at once and picketing up and down the Coast began at dawn, Friday.

All the unions on the Joint Committee had been assured by their unions on the East and Gulf Coasts that full support would be forthcoming in the event of a Pacific Coast strike.

In addition to the strike call announced by Curran in New York, Atlantic Coast longshoremen had withheld signing of their agreement pending the outcome of the West Coast situation.

No East Coast I.L.A. agreement had been signed up to the time of the Pacific Coast strike call.

A meeting of maritime workers was held in New York, with 3200 present, including 1000 longshoremen, it is reported. The meeting pledged fullest solidarity with the West Coast unions. With large strike funds, feeding of strikers and legal defense will be centralized under the joint strike committee.

Support by many unions not connected with the waterfront had been pledged right along, in the event of a maritime strike, in every city up and down the Pacific Coast.

WAREHOUSE MEN STRIKE

SAN FRANCISCO.—800 members of the Warehousemen's Union, I.L.A. Local 38-44, struck Friday morning in San Francisco and across the Bay.

Public warehouses, ice, cold storage, grain and feed warehouses were affected.

A strike in the wholesale grocery warehouses loomed later in the day.

Warehousemen's President Warren G. Denton charged the Warehousemen's Association with "bad faith" in stating they desired resumption of negotiations before a strike was called.

"We cannot take the employers' proposal for continued meetings as a sincere proposal," he said. "The workers feel they must resort to economic action to maintain their union organization and obtain the demands they believe are justly due them."

The union demands 85 cents an hour, a 40-hour week, and preferential hiring of union men through the union hiring hall. The men have been receiving 62½ cents an hour.

WASHINGTON.—Reduction of the railroad work week to 30 hours, without reduction in pay, will be sought in a bill being prepared for Congress by the railroad unions.

TERROR GROWS IN IMPERIAL

EL CENTRO.—Significance of the vicious outbreak of vigilante terror last week here against Esco L. Richardson, Communist candidate for Congress, 20th District, was made clear when several hundred men representing wealthy business and agricultural interests met in the Wilson School here to work out plans aimed to crush any union activity by agricultural workers in the Imperial Valley.

UNITY WILL WIN!

39,000 maritime workers, from San Diego to Juneau, Alaska, are out on strike. This action has been taken only after the unions, through the Joint Negotiating Committee, made every possible effort to arrive at a peaceful settlement of the issues involved.

The basic demands of the maritime workers are: Union-controlled hiring hall and cash overtime for sea-going crafts; eight hours in twelve for cooks and stewards; preferential employment for licensed officers.

These issues are not mere whims of the union officials; they represent the life and future of the maritime workers. This is clearly recognized not only by the maritime workers, who voted to take strike action in the event the shipowners remained adamant in their union-smashing drive—but by the waterfront employers as well, who have therefore forced a showdown, determined to break the back of the unions on the waterfront.

The issue is clear: unionism and decent working and living conditions against the greed of the shipowners. But the waterfront employers will use every means to confuse the issue. They will pose as guardians of the peace and protectors of the interests of the public, they will raise the red scare, in an effort to split the unity of the maritime workers, and alienate public sympathy from the just cause of these workers.

In other crises on the waterfront they have tried the same tactics—but to no avail.

The lesson of unity has been well learned by the waterfront unions. And the people up and down the coast—organized labor and others—are keenly aware of the threat to their own organizations and standard of living contained in the shipowners' attack!

The Communist Party wholeheartedly supports this action taken by the maritime workers in defense of their conditions. We know that workers do not lightly go on strike. Earl Browder, presidential candidate of the Communist Party, has declared: "A strike is a difficult struggle, requiring heavy sacrifices. The strike is a weapon of last resort, to which the workers turn only when capitalists have blocked every other road of redress for their grievances."

This is the situation on the waterfront. The employers have consistently blocked every other road for a peaceful settlement of the vital issues involved. The maritime workers will not stand idly by and see their hard-won conditions wrested from them. East Coast seamen and other maritime workers, who have been working under similar abuses, stand ready to join hands with their West Coast brother-unionists.

Vigilantism In California, Acts Against Earl Browder, Etc., Show This To Be True

Fascism. They therefore drag out the "red herring" in order to befuddle the issue. The typical fascist trend of the Wall Street crowd behind Landon, can be seen in the Republican slogan: "Look at Spain, and Vote Like Maine."

Why GOP Slogan On Spain?

What analogy are they trying to draw with this slogan? In Spain, a duly elected government democratically chosen by the people is faced with an armed uprising of fascists, bankers, and royalists, supported by Hitler and Mussolini. This uprising has as its purpose the overthrow of the constitutional government and the establishment of a military dictatorship. Is it possible that our own "economic royalists," as President Roosevelt calls them, are threatening the American people with similar fascist tactics, to cancel the results of the elections on November 3rd?

It is not so far-fetched as some people think. The danger of Fascism is threatening America even as it threatens Europe. William Randolph Hearst has visited Mussolini and Hitler, and his newspapers sing their praises and advocate their policies to be adopted in our own country. The misnamed Liberty League, financed by the biggest financial interests, advocates the destruction of the labor movement and the spread of company unionism. It glorifies a judicial dictatorship of 9 men, the United States Supreme Court, to make impossible the adoption of any progressive social and labor legislation by Congress. The threats to our civil liberties increase daily.

In Terre Haute and in Tampa, Earl Browder, the Communist Presidential candidate, was met by lawless violence, first on the part of police authorities and then on the part of vigilante mobs, organized and incited by reactionary pro-fascist interests, in order to prevent him from exercising his Constitutional rights of free speech and assembly.

Vigilantism In California

In Imperial Valley the other day, the nation witnessed one of the most disgraceful outrages ever perpetrated in California. A mob of vigilantes in El Centro broke into a radio station, while the Communist candidate for Congress, Esco Richardson was broadcasting, wrecked the mechanism to cut him off the air, and beat him up. These brave fellows also manhandled Mrs. Bessie Keckler, Communist candidate for the State Assembly. And while this was going on, the police authorities were conveniently attending a ball game. California is becoming notorious for this sort of thing.

The people of California who are proud of its good name, proud of the traditions of its pioneers and of its labor movement, are not proud that such acts go unpunished. On the contrary, the labor movement by decision of the recent State Federation of Labor convention, is aroused to the fascist danger of vigilanteism, which is a threat against every worker, and every decent citizen. The example of Salinas has become a warning-signal that vigilanteism and the faked "red scare" is being aimed at the fundamental democratic rights of the people, and the right to organize and strike and picket for the improvement of intolerable economic conditions.

In the same way that Hitler rode into power on the war-cry "against Communism," and then proceeded to also put trade unionists, and Socialists, and Catholics and Protestants into concentration camps, so it becomes clear now that vigilante terrorism, aimed ostensibly at the Communists, is an attack on the whole trade union movement and on our democratic institutions. It is not the Communists who threaten democracy, it is the fascists.

We stand for the defense of democracy in the true American tradition. When you are warned by professional red-baiters about "radical alien influences" imported from Europe, remind yourself of a bit of past history. When the American Revolution of 1776 was followed by the great French revolution, which threatened the monarchies of all Europe, the reactionaries of that day warned Europe against the alien revolutionary influences that were being imported from America. Truly history is repeating itself in reverse form.

A Real "Alien Influence"

If there are any "alien influences" imported into America today, it is the Fascist creed of Hitler and Mussolini, and Wil-

liam Randolph Hearst is their chief prophet. The traditions of our forefathers live today, but not through the voice of Hearst and Hoover and Landon; the work of Washington, Jefferson, and Lincoln are carried forward today by the life and work of Eugene V. Debs, Tom Mooney, and Earl Browder. They stand for 20th Century Americanism.

All true Americans want work, social security, and peace. That is what we Communists are fighting for. We believe the only way to get it is to build a Farmer-Labor Party. We have entered our candidates for President, Congress and the Legislature, because we believe that to defeat Landon is not enough. We do not believe that Roosevelt is an effective barrier to ward off the danger of fascism, which will be still greater in 1938 and 1940 if we do not build a powerful Farmer-Labor Party now. But our program looks further ahead.

The time will come when the majority of the American people will see, as we do now, that Socialism is the only means to wipe out unemployment, poverty, insecurity, and wars. In a rich country like ours, Socialism can assure democracy, security and abundance for all, if the people would collectively own and operate the means of production and distribution. But today, Socialism is not the issue of the 1936 campaign. We Communists believe that the most urgent immediate question is to defend democracy against reaction, and we join with all other progressive forces in America to build a Farmer-Labor Party for that purpose.

Do we need any better example of the need for independent political action by labor, than the experience of the maritime workers in the 1934 strike, and the more recent experience of the Salinas workers, whose most elementary rights have been daily violated, while local and state officials stand by and justify the employers' terrorism, and the Republican and Democratic parties alike condone by their silence the violation of those rights. If there were Labor's own representatives in local, state, and national office, there would be a different story to tell.

Today, when we are in the midst of a great crisis in the maritime industry on the Pacific Coast, look and see how public officials rush to the defense of the open-shop interests who have put them into office. The same people who cry the loudest about spending too much money for wages and relief, are ready to spend millions for tear-gas and strike-breakers and billions for war preparations.

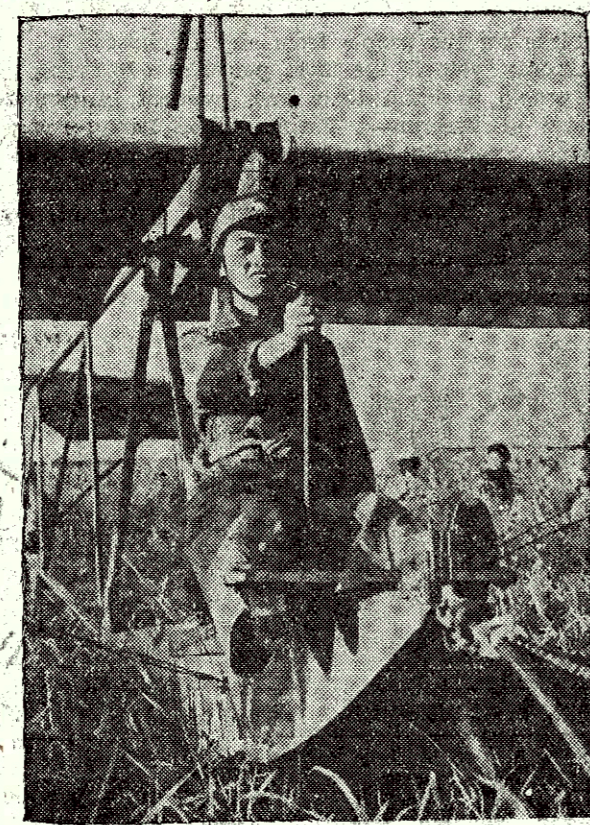
The time has come when the workers and the farmers and the middle class must unite their forces in a Farmer-Labor party; being the majority of the population they can elect Farmer-Labor and other progressive representatives to local, state, and national office that will really defend the interests of the people. A Farmer-Labor party would fight most effectively to put America back to work; open the idle factories; provide adequate social insurance against unemployment and old-age; defend and protect the liberties of the people and the rights of labor; curb the dictatorial power of the Supreme Court; provide education for the youth and security for its future; place the burden of taxation on those privileged few who hold the wealth of the nation; furnish adequate relief and security for the small farmer; guarantee equal rights for the Negro people; and follow a firm peace policy in collaboration with the forces for peace throughout the world. That in substance is the election platform of the Communist Party and its candidates, who have entered the field in the absence, as yet, of a Farmer-Labor party. A vote for the Communist party is a vote for the above program which answers the immediate needs of the American people.

A Vote For Landon

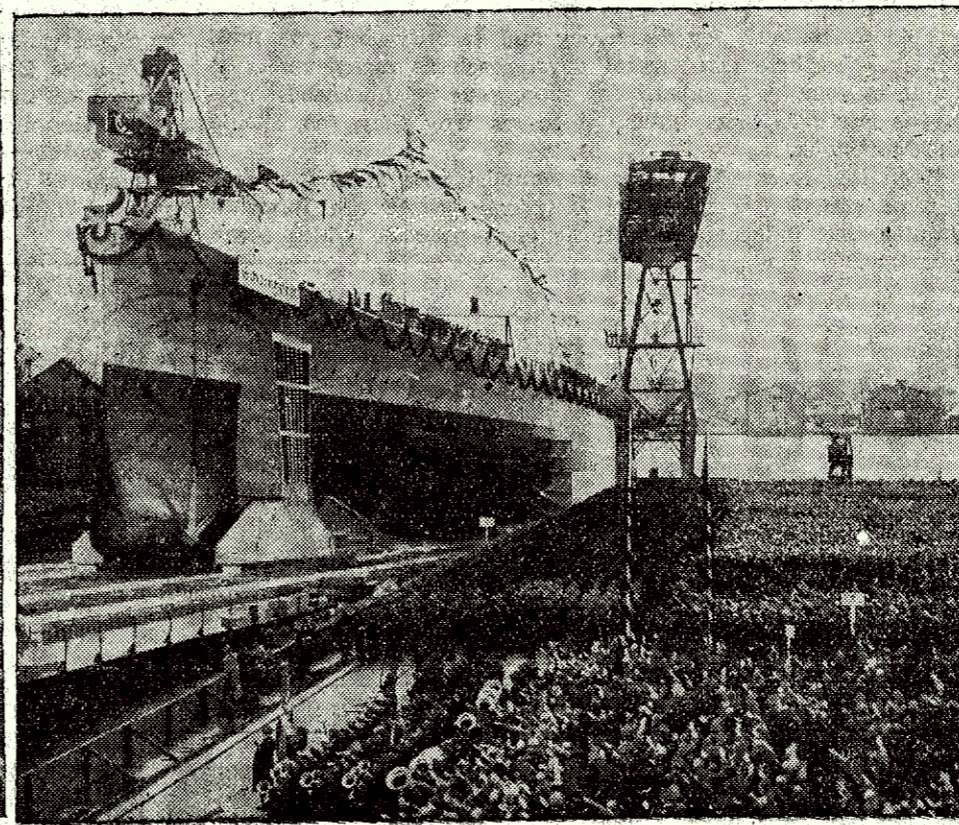

COUGHLINITES, TOWNSEND CLUB HIT AT FASCISM

Martinez Sections In Opposition To Lemke And Landon

MARTINEZ—Both the Coughlin unit and the Townsend Club here have repudiated Fascism, the former refusing to endorse Lemke and the latter refusing to go behind the Landon candidacy.

Although both organizations endorsed Roosevelt, their actions aimed at Lemke and Landon were definite expressions of anti-Fascist sentiment. of Labor, as the mouthpiece for company-unionism against genuine trade unions. What a perfect set-up for Wall Street! Thus the genial mask of liberalism is torn off the face of Landon, and we see his Fascist backers who pull the strings.

A story is going the rounds about Landon's ill-rated visit to Los Angeles. A chorus of boogieing greeted him as he rode through the streets, and another Republican candidate leaned over and whispered to Landon: "Don't mind them, Governor, they're only working people." A truth of this story is the well-known fact that the Republican-Liberty League program is anti-labor and pro-Fascist, and the workers know it.

Labor will be helpless to meet this threat of reaction, unless it organizes now for independent political action. Reliance on Roosevelt will not stop Fascism; even the progressive trade unions that are supporting him recognize this, and are taking the first steps in the direction of a Labor party. They see that because of Roosevelt's weak and indecisive stand on many questions, because he vacillates and retreats under pressure from his reactionary opponents, there is a grave danger of labor losing even the small gains it has made unless there is built a mass pressure from the labor-progressive camp to stop his retreat and win more concessions for labor. That can only be done, we say, by the speedy development of an American Peoples Front, a Farmer-Labor Party. A big Communist vote will hasten that development, and strike a blow against reaction.

We therefore call upon you, worker and farmer, young and old, and to you of the middle classes whose fate and whose future is tied up with that of the working class, to make your voice and vote felt on November 3rd for democracy against Fascism. Keep Hearst out of the White House! Vote for Earl Browder and James W. Ford, the presidential candidates of the California ballot. Vote Communist for a free, happy, and prosperous America.

FILIPINOS AREN'T FOOLED

Few Fall For Repatriation Act Bait REALLY DEPORTATION PLAN

WASHINGTON.—Labor Department officials claim that so many Filipinos have taken advantage of the repatriation act that an additional appropriation would be asked of the next Congress.

But the attempt, called "repatriation," to actually deport scores of thousands of Filipino workers back to the Islands is not working out, for in the same breath the Department of Labor reported that 379 Filipinos

have gone back under the offer to pay their fare.

When it is considered that there are over 35,000 organized Filipino workers alone in California, it is seen that the thinly disguised deportation measure has flopped.

Another 100 are due to sail Saturday from San Francisco on the President Hoover, but this is the largest single batch to leave yet.

A.F.L. COUNCIL HITS P-I STRIKE

PROPOSES TO LEAVE 2 FIRED MEN IN COLD

SEATTLE—Treachery on the part of William Green and the A.F.L. Executive Council is behind their proposal that the Guild strike against the Hearst Post-Intelligencer be settled without reinstatement of Everard Armstrong and Frank Lynch.

It was against the discharge of Armstrong and Lynch for Guild activity that the strike was called in the first place. The Green proposal also demanded that the Labor Council remove the P-I from the unfair list. The Seattle Guild's strike committee stated on Wednesday: "After reading the proposal of the A.F.L. executive council, it becomes apparent that fears expressed during the conference in Washington by Guild representatives—were well founded.

"Those fears were simply that the executive council had been misled by false statements of the Hearst management regarding the situation in Seattle."

Chemical Strike In Pittsburgh Ends

2 Final Rallies In East Bay

PITTSBURGH, Cal.—The strike of over 200 workers at the Great Western Electro-Chemical Co. was ended when strikers agreed to submit their grievances to arbitration.

The strike was called following the discharge for union activity of Ramon Rabeles, a Mexican worker, member of the recently organized Chemical Workers Union. Rabeles was reinstated pending arbitration. The California Chain Stores Association, with headquarters here, claims a huge sentiment among California farmers against the chain store tax. This claim is made in face of the fact that the California Grange, influential small farmers' organization, in its convention here went on record for the chain store tax. A clue to what the chain store interests mean by "farmers" is seen in the fact that they list the Agricultural Council of California, a large growers' organization, as one of the groups against the chain store tax. SAN FRANCISCO.—The delegation of the Spanish government to the American people, bearing the truth about the civil war, will appear here at a gigantic mass rally on Sunday, November 15th, 2 p.m., at Dreamland Auditorium, the American League Against War and Fascism announced last Friday.

Subway Strike Seen

NEW YORK.—The Transport Workers Union is considering calling a strike on New York subways because the companies have refused to recognize the union as collective bargaining agent for the employees.

WHY TERROR MOB FREED IN SANTA ROSA

Wife of Vigilante On Jury; Prosecutors "Unwilling"

SANTA ROSA.—An unwilling pair of prosecutors from Attorney General U. S. Webb's office, and a judge who permitted "red baiting" and gave all the "breaks" to the vigilante defendants, were the primary causes behind one of the worst miscarriages of justice in California history—the acquittal of the six remaining vigilantes in Superior Court here last Monday.

This was the consensus of opinion among observers at the cut-and-dried trial, and labor and progressive forces throughout Sonoma County.

One member of the jury, Caroline Kennedy, is the wife of a vigilante, George Kennedy, apple rancher of Sebastopol. Kennedy was active collecting bail for the vigilantes, and he is named in a suit for damages by Vernon D. Healy, vigilante victim and Communist candidate for Congress, 1st District.

Prosecutor Marion admitted that prosecuting was an "unpleasant duty." Originally 23 vigilantes were charged with participating in the terroristic mob which tarred and feathered two workers, and beat up others, a year ago last August.

Bragged of Vigilantism

However, the number of defendants dwindled until but six remained to be given acquittal in court here.

Not once did the defendants or their attorneys deny participating in the vigilante mob.

Defense attorney, Tauzer admitted he himself had been a vigilante on August 1, 1935, when vigilantes broke up a peace meeting under auspices of the American League Against War and Fascism, saying: "What would you have done? You'd do what they (the vigilantes) did. You'd do what I did."

Tauzer admitted that the issue at stake was the right of labor to organize, when he said: "I envy you your position in this jury box. It's up to you to forever put an end to what happened last year by showing the world that we in Sonoma County refuse to stand for interference with our crops."

Said Defense Attorney Geary: "We should feel proud of these defendants because it was they who prevented last year's apple strike from spreading to our prunes, hops and grapes."

At the American League Against War and Fascism meeting, referred to above, an apple striker had spoken. A vigilante took over the stage and shouted: "We're only going to pay you workers 25 cents an hour. We know what's good for you, and that's what you're going to get."

SAN FRANCISCO.—The delegation of the Spanish government to the American people, bearing the truth about the civil war, will appear here at a gigantic mass rally on Sunday, November 15th, 2 p.m., at Dreamland Auditorium, the American League Against War and Fascism announced last Friday.

PROPOSITION NO. 18 FOR TAX ON OLEO AIMED AT WORKERS; CALIF. PEOPLE TWICE DEFEATED IDEA

Class Legislation Benefitting the Big Dairy Corporations Should Be Voted Down

SAN FRANCISCO—Just as trickery was used by big oil interests in decking up Proposition 4 to look like a scheme to protect beaches when it is an outright steal of state lands with oil deposits, so large dairy interests are using trickery in an attempt to put over Proposition 18.

Number 18 is a referendum measure for a tax of 10 cents a pound on oleomargarine. Such a tax hits large sections of the working class hard. Tens of thousands of Californians cannot afford to buy butter, especially since the recent increase in price on butter fat in this state.

In 1926 Californians badly defeated an oleomargarine tax of 2 cents a pound in a referendum. In 1933 Governor Rolph was forced, because of popular indignation, to veto an 8 cents a pound tax. Yet the 1935 legislature voted such a tax, and the referendum on Proposition 18 is for the purpose of confirming this bill. Those who back the bill say the "farmers" are for it. In reality they mean the large dairy corporations. They appeal to patriotic sentiments by saying the tax would keep foreign fats and oils out of the country, when in fact the ingredients of oleomargarine are produced in this country.

Proposition 18 is definite class legislation, at its worst. Vote "no" on it.

CAL. AFL MEET SUN. ON SALINAS

SAN FRANCISCO.—The special session of the State Federation, executive committee, on Salinas, will meet Sunday. This was demanded by several Labor Councils.

SALINAS.—Picketing has not taken place here for two weeks, but the lettuce strikers' sentiment is for immediate resumption of picket duty.

The membership of the Fruit and Vegetable Workers' Union are also eager to cooperate with the Filipino field workers, and there is great resentment against the actions of Doss and Shevlin in sabotaging this.

A committee of 5 appointed by the reactionary officials for negotiations includes such anti-progressives as Whitey Burgess and Clayton Allsburg. Bill Redner of the Boxmakers, in prison about six weeks on fake dynamiting charges, was due for a hearing Friday. No legal defense was given him by Doss in all this time. Four strikers were convicted of "assault" charges.

NEW APPEAL ON 1-MAN CAR

Carmer's Union Joins In S.F. Move

SAN FRANCISCO.—Carrying the fight against the one-man car further, the Street Carriers Union joined the city in an application to Federal Judge Louderback to carry the case again to the U. S. Court of Appeals. The new appeal is concerned with Louderback's refusal to reopen the original case, already on appeal.

Attorneys for the city and for the union contend that Louderback erred in holding that he had no jurisdiction because of the pending original appeal and because he ruled the court terms had expired.

DRASTIC CUTS IN CAL. RELIEF

SACRAMENTO.—State relief has been cut to the bone, it was announced this week by officials. The state relief load had been reduced to an all-time low of 28,000 cases, state relief director Harold Pomeroy said.

The excuse given was that the reduction is "in anticipation of possible additional demands during the winter months." September expenses, including all relief payments, were \$1,383,000, far below the \$2,000,000 allotted. The Workers Alliance is filing relief cuts.

C.P. Nominee Wins United Support

GLENDALE.—William E. Sherwood, Communist candidate for Assembly, was endorsed here recently by the United Organizations for Independent Political Action, 43rd Assembly District Council.

Sherwood's name was included in an advertisement listing the Council's endorsements, to run in the Glendale Times daily until election day. The Council, an outgrowth of the May 1 Conference called by the End Poverty League of California.

The Communist nominee began work in the Arkansas coal mines at the age of 18, and was active in the United Mine Workers of America in Arkansas, Oklahoma and Texas, many times holding local and district offices in the union. He joined the Socialist Party in 1904, where he was active until two years ago, when he joined the Communist Party.

In 1933 Sherwood was Socialist candidate for Board of Education. Active in organizing the unemployed, Sherwood was kidnapped by the Fascist superintendent of Camp Poso, Kern County, last February for his persistent union activity in that camp.

Hearst Newsreel Is Forced Off Screen

LOS ANGELES.—A storm of protests against a Hearst Movietone news reel trying to glorify the Spanish Fascists, caused manager of the Fairfax Theatre to remove the objectionable film here last Tuesday.

The so-called "Constitutional Democrats" supporting Alf Landon's candidacy have put out a slogan: "Look at Spain, and Vote like Maine."

This brain-storm is a bats-in-the-belfry proposition from start to finish. First of all, if you look at Spain you will see that the murderous attack by the Spanish Fascists is against the great majority of the people and their legally constituted government.

Well, that money went to finance attacks on American constitutional guarantees. The G. O. P. is pulling the same kind of stuff the Spanish Fascists pulled, and is plotting to duplicate the Spanish Fascists still further with a Hitler-Mussolini dictatorship in the U.S.A., by force and violence if they think it necessary.

Williamson Welches... When Ray Williamson was elected to the State Assembly of California two years ago, he promised to represent the voters of his 26th District, who are chiefly workers.

While we can't name the individual "big shots" whom Williamson stood for, we can state positively that he didn't represent his constituents in the last Legislature.

If he represented his constituents, he wouldn't have voted against the bill reducing the sales tax, which hits the workers hardest; he wouldn't have been "out to lunch" when the vote came up to raise taxes on banks and corporations; he wouldn't have voted against exempting drugs and medicines from the sales tax; he wouldn't have voted against jacking-up old-age pensions to a minimum of \$50 a month.

But just remember, you voters in the 26th District, that on November 3rd you can vote for a candidate who will represent your interests—our Communist nominee, Peter J. Garrison.

Another Landon Man... On the subject of exposing reactionaries' records in the State Legislature, let's look at the record compiled by T. J. Cunningham, another Republican, who comes from the 56th Assembly District, Los Angeles.

Cunningham likewise voted against raising bank and corporation taxes, and voted for the loan shark bill. Public development of state oil lands ranks as a crime along with taxing banks and corporations, so Cunningham voted against such public development.

Davis announced he would keep all jobs workers outside the city limits, and meeting with police officials, drew up plans for what may mean concentration camps for the unemployed who seek jobs in California.

Like Nazis in Germany Davis said he would establish "work camps" at various Southern California points, and recommend that all transients be fingerprinted and sentenced to six months.

Expressing himself as anxious to fingerprint all persons convicted of misdemeanors, Davis laid special emphasis on those who have no money and no place to sleep.

Trade unionists and liberals are wondering how soon the Peanut Hitler will turn loose on trade unions and progressive groups, the private army of stool pigeons he has been sticking badges on for the professional purges of "fighting Communism."

Healy Wins Favor In San Rafael

He Adores Hitler "Mussolini is devoting his life to the service of his country—and he has done a hell of a good job."

"Hitler is the same way. He's doing a good job of it, too—there's no getting around that."

Asked if he considered Hitler's anti-Semitism program a "minor Nazi defeat" Macfadden replied that "from Hitler's point of view, it isn't a defeat at all."

He Wants Fascism In U. S. Then in true Silver Shirt vein, he went on: "You know a lot of people claim the Jews financed the Communist revolution in an attempt to seize world power."

"I'm for democracy, but if it gets to the point where we can't have democracy, I'm for Fascism as the best alternative," said Macfadden, as he went on to "show" that democracy is all but a lost cause in America, unless Landon is elected.

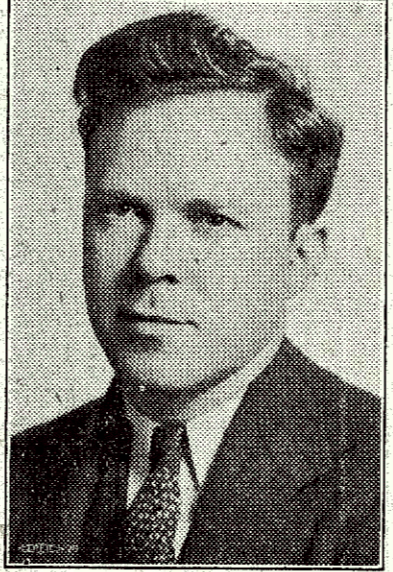

Protest Violation of U. S. Constitutional Rights By El Centro Vigilante Mob

Eye Witness Account Of Vigilantism In Imperial Valley

By GEORGE HATFIELD

EL CENTRO—After reading screaming headlines in the El Centro Morning Post of the radio talk to be given by Esco Richardson and Bessie Keckler on October 23rd, out of curiosity, I went to the offices of station KXO at 7th and Main streets about 20 minutes before the broadcast was scheduled to begin.

Richardson and Mrs. Keckler were inside the broadcasting office and everything was quiet outside, with a half a dozen men standing across the street.

Promptly at seven o'clock the street swarmed with about 250 men who appeared suddenly from adjacent stores and garages. They crowded around the station entrance.

I heard shouts, "Let's get him out" and "Let's cut the wires." A number went in and out of the station several times, but the door to the studio was locked and several efforts to break the door failed.

The lights in the studio went on and off several times and finally remained out. A medium sized sedan was parked directly in front of the station, with both doors open.

Who Was the Leader? Members of the crowd kept reporting back to the occupant of the car, who seemed to be the leader. The car license number was IV-8537.

About 7:30 Richardson appeared at the door of the radio station. Men all around were hitting him and Richardson had his arms over his face for protection. A heavy blow knocked him to the floor. The crowd shouted, "He's coming now!" and rushed into the studio hallway.

Imperial Valley Terror Protested By C.P. of Calif.

REDWOOD CITY ASSURES FREE SPEECH RIGHT

REDWOOD CITY.—"Scare" stories in the capitalist press that the Communist Party had been granted use of the Council chamber here for a campaign meeting on Thursday, October 29th, only under certain special and stringent regulations, were exposed as lies in a letter sent from C.L. Dimmitt, acting city manager, to the Communist Party.

"On behalf of the City Council," wrote Dimmitt, "I wish to assure you that the permission granted the representative of the Communist Party to use the Council chamber for the meeting of October 29th was restricted by no terms or conditions other than the general laws which govern any public meeting."

"I have also personally interviewed the Commander of the American Legion Post of Redwood City and he assures me that no such remark, as quoted from the San Francisco News in your letter (reporting a threat of vigilantisim against the meeting), emanated officially from the Post or even indirectly so far as he could ascertain."

Mayor Paul A. McCarthy wrote:

"I feel sure that Miss Whitney, your speaker, will present a dignified and forceful exposition of the principles of your party, and that neither any utterances of her or any other speaker in our public auditorium, nor any action of any organization or group of citizens will give any occasion for complaint that freedom of speech is denied to any citizen in Redwood City."

"I believe that I express the feelings of most Americans in respect to the principles of your party, and its right to make a public exposition of them when I quote the famous aphorism of Voltaire: 'I will oppose with all my might the principles advocated by you, but I would give my life that you might have the right to advocate them.'"

"The only limitation upon this sentiment is that no government can tolerate public advocacies of force or violence to work a change in its form or the manner of its fulfillment of its obligations. However, I am sure that there will be no occasion to invoke this exception on the occasion of your meeting in Redwood City."

Supports Votes For Filipino Women

MANILA, P.I.—Support for votes for women in the Philippine Islands, was promised here by President Manuel E. Quezon. Quezon said he will lend his influence to enfranchise women at the plebiscite next April.

CP, SP Nominees Speak Sunday

LOS ANGELES.—Harold J. Ashe, Communist candidate for Congress, 14th District, and Glen Trimble, Socialist candidate, will appear on the same platform next Sunday, November 1st, 8 p.m. at Millinery Workers' Union Hall, 116 1/2 West 9th St., to discuss the 1936 election issues.

The meeting, which is being held under the auspices of the Workers Alliance of California, displaces the usual Sunday night Forum of the Socialist Party held at the same address.

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Rush Aid To Embattled Spanish Workers!

PORTUGAL'S preposterous charges that the Soviet Union is responsible for the civil war in Spain is but the latest smoke screen put up by his puppet of British imperialism to hide her own guilt in supplying German and Italian arms, ammunition, planes and tanks to the murderous Fascist hordes of General Franco. That this stupid charge by Portugal was approved, if not inspired, by England is indicated by the haste with which England sprang to the defense of Portugal following the protest note sent by the Soviet Union to the non-intervention committee.

Although refusing to call a special meeting of the committee to consider the concrete proposal made by the Soviet Union to enforce the terms of the non-intervention agreement by a joint blockade of Portuguese ports, Lord Plymouth makes the gesture of calling a sub-committee to "explore" new measures of enforcement. Even this late gesture, meaningless though it is, is a tacit admission of the guilt of Italy, Germany and Portugal, as charged by the Soviet Union!

The denunciation of the sham non-intervention pact by the Soviet Union was the next logical step to the Soviet note, which declared that the Spanish government must be returned "the right and facilities to purchase arms outside Spain, which rights and facilities are enjoyed at present by the governments of the world."

This step by the Soviet Union must be supported by the workers and anti-Fascists throughout the world, through appropriate action, to break the Fascist blockade against Spain. Mass pressure by working class organizations, especially trade unions, can force the governments of France and England to sell Spain the arms she so sorely needs to defend herself against the attacks of Hitler and Mussolini being carried out by their tool, General Franco! American workers, too, should demand Spain be given its right to have arms shipped from here!

All American anti-Fascists, all lovers of democracy and foes of war, should speed the collection of funds, hospital and medical supplies and clothes to the Spanish defenders of democracy, the People's Front Government.

The Communist Party will receive financial contributions to be forwarded to the People's Front Government. Medical supplies, clothing, should be sent in to the International Labor Defense, at 1005 Market Street in San Francisco, and 127 So. Broadway in Los Angeles.

Sonoma County Defiles Americanism

AMID CHEERS and applause of a vigilante audience, the foreman of the jury which had heard evidence against the remaining vigilante leaders who had tarred and feathered Nitzberg and Green in Sonoma County more than a year ago declared the defendants "not guilty."

The case was an open and shut one. The defense did not even make a serious attempt to deny the participation of the defendants in the mob action. They rested their case upon an appeal to the "patriotism" of the jurors; one of the defense attorneys actually waved a small American flag. The tarring and feathering, they declared, was an upright, an honorable act; one in accord with the best traditions of "Americanism."

The husband of one of the jurors actually participated in the lynch mob. The jury was out 16 minutes. When they brought in an acquittal the vigilante defendants stepped up and shook their hands. The audience applauded. And the "prosecution?" In his final summation, one of the prosecuting attorneys declared that his task had been "an unpleasant duty." One can imagine with what ardor he pushed the prosecution. Certainly it is evident that the so-called prosecution were actually attorneys for the defense.

Thus ends the farce which was started when the Attorney General's office moved for indictments only a year after the actual attack against Nitzberg and Green. These indictments meant nothing. The jury was hand-picked. The prosecution went through its motions. And Sonoma County has once

more spat upon the Constitution and defiled the term Americanism.

Real Americans in Sonoma County are outraged by this farce. We urge all small farmers and workers, all friends of democracy to register their protest by voting for Vernon Healy, Communist candidate for Congress.

Imperial Valley Makes Its Bid

NOT to be outdone, Imperial Valley makes its bid, in competition with Terre Haute and Tampa, as the most reactionary spot in America, as the place where Landon's program finds most open and complete expression. Imperial Valley has a long and bloody record of vigilante violence against agricultural workers, and the attack made upon Communist candidates by a mob sporting sunflower buttons lives up to the worst traditions of the Valley.

The wrecking of the radio station (this could be punished under the Criminal Syndicalism Act, Mr. Attorney General!) and the brutal beating of the Communist candidate for Congress, Esco Richardson, finds Governor Merriam and his law enforcement agencies silent as the tomb, despite demands that action be taken to punish those responsible, which includes the sheriff of Imperial County and the Chief of Police of El Centro. Yet the Governor acts with alacrity when the highway patrol is needed to shoot tear gas at strikers!

Now Station KXO in El Centro, fearing another wrecking mob, is attempting to evade the law which requires that it must give time to all political candidates. Undaunted by vigilante mobs, the Communist Party is determined to bring the real issues of the 1936 campaign to the workers of Imperial Valley. The Communist Party has appealed to the Federal Communications Commission to enforce the law by instructing KXO it must go through with the broadcast.

The support of all working class organizations and liberal people must be thrown behind the Communist Party's attempt to enforce the Bill of Rights in Imperial Valley! Free speech must be defended. Wire protests to the Sheriff of Imperial County and to El Centro's Chief of Police, demanding protection for Richardson. Wire and write to Governor Merriam and Attorney General Webb in Sacramento, demanding the punishment of those responsible for the assault on October 23rd.

The Stogge Removes His Mask

WHEN at the opening of this election campaign the Communist Party declared that Lemke is a stooge for Landon, there were scoffers who pointed to the "attacks" made by Lemke against Landon. Recently the announcement by Dr. Townsend, urging all California Townsendites to support Landon, made the number of California scoffers dwindle. Finally, along comes A. W. Robinette, Lemke campaign manager for Southern California, urging all Lemke followers to vote for Landon and Knox, and all other Republican candidates.

Now where are the scoffers?

All persons who previously intended voting for Lemke because they are interested in real social justice should vote not for Landon, who is the candidate of the reactionaries, the champion of the open-shoppers, the spearhead of the Fascist drive—but for Browder, the candidate running on a platform of American democracy, of jobs with decent pay, of equal opportunity for all.

All who intended casting their votes for the Union Party because they were under the impression it was a real people's political movement in defense of the everyday needs of the masses, should vote Communist, for the building of a Farmer-Labor Party with a program against reaction and Fascism, for democracy and progress.

A vote for Landon is a vote for reaction, against social security, for a program which aims to achieve Fascism in America.

A vote for Roosevelt is a vote for vacillation, indecisiveness, capitulation to the reactionary forces when Roosevelt feels he has won the confidence of the people.

A vote for Browder and Ford is a vote for a Farmer-Labor Party, for democracy, for the raising of the living standards of the people!

Truth About the Waterfront

(Speech delivered by Jack Moore, Section Organizer, Harbor Section, San Pedro, over KMTR Thursday, October 22. Clauses in parentheses were cut out by the station censor.)
Friends:

A two-year campaign against the Maritime Unions in the newspapers and over the radio came to a climax a few weeks ago with a story in a Hearst paper that "Communism is not coming to the waterfront; it is already here." Timed to break just before the shipowners planned to lock out the Maritime Unions on October first, this story was supposed to furnish the justification for any measure the shipowners and their agents might use against Organized Labor on the waterfront.

Capitalists' Aims

By labeling the maritime unions as Red, Organized Capital hoped to frighten the shoreside unions from defending them in case of attacks and to alienate the general public from the unions. This would give the employers the opportunity to use vigilantes and police to suppress the unions with force, without opposition from the public. Therefore, it is necessary for the Harbor Section of the Communist Party to cut through this tissue of falsehood surrounding the maritime industry and lay bare the real issues so that they may be seen and clearly understood by the very people whom the shipowners are trying to dupe.

The real issue on the waterfront is not Communist Dictatorship, as the shipowners charge. This is a straw man which the shipowners create to destroy with the bayonets of the National Guard and the riot clubs of the police. But the bayonets and the riot clubs enter the living flesh and crush the skulls of living workers, organized for open and legitimate purposes, fighting for everything that is held to be decent by Americans. And the straw man created by the shipowners is to blind your eyes as to what is actually taking place.

Shipowners' Profits

Nor is the real issue the continued existence of the shipowners in business. Their stories about being ruined by union wages are ridiculous in the face of the facts. Take, for example, the Matson company. In 1920, its net income was \$1,245,000; and it paid to the Second Assistant Engineer on its ships, \$200 per month.

In 1934 its income had risen to the highest in its history, \$2,962,000; but the wages of the Second Assistant Engineers had shrunk to \$130 per month. Between 1920 and 1934, the net worth of the Matson Company had increased 234 per cent. It has paid \$14,593,000, in cash dividends; \$27,711,000 in stock dividends! Other shipowners have made similar gains. From 1923 to 1932 inclusive, four officials of the Dollar Line: R. Stanley Dollar, J. Harold Dollar, Herbert Fleishhaecker and H. M. Lorber, piled up a grand total in salaries, bonuses and profits of \$14,890,000! The principal reason for the tremendous profits of the shipowners is the huge Federal subsidies given them—in the form of mail contracts, sale of ships, and low interest on construction loans—amounting to \$708,618,000!

What, then, is the real issue on the waterfront? It is whether or not the shipowners shall have the power of unlimited exploitation over the 37,000 men employed in the maritime industry on the Pacific Coast. The shipowners, a small minority group, are willing to halt every ship on the Pacific Coast in order to gain their own ends. They would deprive every one of the 37,000 maritime workers and their 100,000 dependents of their means of livelihood.

Are the shipowners driven to such brutal measures by the unreasonableness of Organized Labor, by its undisciplined and arrogant behavior?

Conditions on Ships

You may judge for yourselves by hearing the conditions of the men who work the ships and move the cargo on this coast. The longshoremen, whose job is most dangerous and whose accident rate is highest of the marine crafts, work for 95c and four straight time and \$1.40 an hour overtime. They work a six-hour day and 120 hours a month. This is the only way, in normal times, that all of them can get enough work to live on.

The unlicensed sea-going men do not fare so well. Working only seven or eight months out of the year, sailors on deck receive \$40 per month as Ordinary and \$62.50 as Able Seamen.

They are supposed to work 56 hours a week at sea, but may be worked overtime, with no extra pay, for emergencies. Short-handed ships have many emergencies. Marine firemen work 56 hours a week in heat ranging as high as 150 degrees. They get at most \$70 per month. Their messrooms and sleeping quarters average 90 degrees temperature. Marine cooks and stewards get from \$45 to \$125 per month, working 10 hours a day over a spread of 15 hours, averaging 70 hours per week. All these men sleep in small quarters, with 8 to 10 men per room. Consequently, tuberculosis is prevalent among seamen.

Can any decent person say that these men, constantly exposed to the hazards of sea-faring, are not entitled to maintain their organizations and to improve their living standards by the few cents per hour they are demanding?

If the employers openly came out against provision for the health, safety, dignity, and American standard of living of their employees, they would call down the wrath of every decent person upon their heads. Therefore, they camouflage their desires with such vague phrases as individual initiative, the "American system," and so on.

"Look Into the Mirror Yourself"

Confronted with a union committee representing the fundamental desires of 37,000 workers, the shipowners yell about autocracy. They might well look into the mirror, because they represent only themselves, acting in their own selfish interests.

In order further to confuse the public and to give the impression that maritime workers are against a peaceful settlement, the shipowners recently sent out chain letters to shippers, asking them to write to local union officials and demand that they submit to arbitration, and keep

on the waterfront. However, they did not include in the letter the issues which they wanted arbitrated.

First of all, the shipowners wanted blanket arbitration, without any definition of issues.

When the unions logically replied that they preferred first to negotiate directly with the shipowners, to see where they might disagree, the shipowners shifted their ground. They put outrageous proposals, knowing full well the unions could not meet them, and demanded that they be arbitrated. The purpose of this maneuver was to center the dispute on the false issue of arbitration, instead of on the real issues—the unreasonable demands of the shipowners.

These demands included: the return of the twelve-hour day, lower wage standards in the face of rising prices, abolition of the unions as organizations by abolishing hiring halls, instituting piece-work in the handling of cargo, and giving the shipowners the right to blacklist any man they please from the industry! Unions' Very Existence Involved

It should be obvious to any thinking person that the unions cannot arbitrate their existence as organizations. Therefore, they have decided to take a strike vote on those basic issues which involve union principles and existence of the unions—union hiring halls, the six-hour day for longshoremen, and cash overtime for seamen. If the shipowners will not agree to these basic demands by October 28, the unions are voting to strike. If the shipowners will agree, then the unions will be ready to discuss with their arbitration of other issues—such as, job conditions and wage scales.

I have said that Communism is not the issue on the waterfront today. But this does not mean that we Communists attempt to conceal our role or our purposes. Unlike the shipowners, who can achieve their ends only by obscuring the real issues and befuddling the public, we Communists can accomplish our purposes only by informing the majority of people of them, for our interests, as a working-class political party, are identical with those of the majority.

We Communists are not "outsiders" or "alien agitators" as is so often charged against us. Our Party is composed entirely of working men and women, Americans, members of trade unions. For this reason, the Communist Party, of all parties, supports the maritime unions 100 per cent in their economic demands, (although, as a political party, our full program of revolutionary social change goes far beyond the program of the trade unions. We recognize that the majority of our brother unionists are not yet ready for our full program. Therefore, we advocate that the trade unions take the road of independent political action, together with the middle class of town and country, by forming a Farmer-Labor Party for their immediate economic and political needs.

The most common justification for the suppression of us Communists is that we advocate force and violence. We repudiate this charge as a downright lie. We are opposed to violence. It is just as false to accuse us Communists of advocating force and

Norman Thomas and Hearst

SOME SOCIALISTS don't like it when we say that the line followed by the Socialist Party leadership is playing into the hands of and aiding the Republican Party election campaign; they think we are "exaggerating." But according to the latest reports, Norman Thomas was quoted as charging that the Communists are supporting Roosevelt, that we only favor a Farmer-Labor party because we want to "dominate" it, and that we are taking "orders from Moscow." As Earl Browder says, it sounds like a Hearst editorial.

Norman Thomas has been engaged in a bitter struggle with the right-wing "Old Guard" leaders who have split away from the Socialist Party, because of its leftward trend. But how much difference is there between Thomas' statements and the reactionary ex-Socialists like Cahane who justify the arrest of Browder and instead protest against "Soviet persecution"? How much difference is there between Thomas' statements and the Trotskyites who defend and condone the murderers who plotted against the lives of Soviet leaders?

Thomas proclaims that the issue of 1936 is "Socialism or Capitalism" in America; with these ultra-revolutionary phrases, he reproaches the Communists with being opportunists and reformists (because we say the issue is democracy versus reaction), but he lends his pen and his oratory to the anti-Soviet crusade against the only country where there is Socialism. And now he repeats the Hearst slanders against the Communist election policy which says: "Hearst's Landon-Knox ticket must be defeated at all costs." Thomas has gotten himself into strange company, for a Socialist leader. The Socialist Party will pay the cost dearly, when the returns are counted on election day.

Catholics In Spain

NEWS FROM SPAIN proves that not all Catholics are Fascists. On the contrary, not only are the big majority of the Spanish people, who are mainly Catholic, supporting the People's Front government, but that even many of the Catholic clergy are on the side of the government against the Fascists.

This was brought out by the arrival in America of a Catholic priest as part of a delegation representing the Spanish Peoples Front, which is touring the country under the auspices of the North American Committee to Aid Democracy in Spain. This priest sharply condemned the Catholic press and clergy in America for their siding with the Fascists, and swallowing whole the "atrocity" stories that Hearst is circulating about Spain. If any of the Catholic clergy suffered in Spain, it was because they actively took part in the bloody civil war being waged by the Fascists against the democratic republic. The Catholic people recognize who really fight in their interests, and are united with Communists, Socialists, in the Peoples Front to save democracy. Similarly, the ravings of Father Coughlin does not prove that all Catholics in America are Fascist-minded. On the contrary, we believe that the great majority of American Catholics, who are mainly workers and farmers and middle-class people, oppose Fascism, which is the enemy of all the people. We believe they will fight for the defense of democracy, and will be a part of the American Peoples Front, in the form of a Farmer-Labor Party, when it takes shape in the struggle against Fascist reaction in this country.

violence as it would be to accuse the weather man of advocating the violence of the hurricane he predicts. (We predict the use of violence by the rulers of present society to maintain their privileges.)

(And the history of the working-class is replete with instances where the rulers have used violence—the police, the national guard, the courts and jails—to disorganize and defeat the workers. We point out that today the Fascist-minded capitalists are preparing violence.) The shipowners (have collected arsenals, as exposed in Seattle), are organizing (armed vigilante bands, are mobilizing heavily armed police forces), to crush the struggle of the maritime workers for a decent life.

To combat this menace to democracy, to preserve our democratic rights, all trade unionists, unorganized workers, unemployed, farmers, and business and professional people must rally to support the marine unions.

Furthermore, the shipowners are using boss-created race prejudices in their attempts to beat the maritime workers. They are playing "Negro against white, Filipino against Mexican, and vice versa. For example, shipowners' agents are attempting to recruit Negro workers in the South Side of Los Angeles to be used as scabs in the event of a lockout. The Negro workers are not fooled by the sweet poison promises of the shipowners. The Negro workers have proved in past struggles to be good fighters in their own interests, the interests of Organized Labor.

It is a vital necessity for the maritime unions in San Pedro to effect the unity between Ne-unions in San Francisco and on the Gulf, have achieved—a unity that has resulted in improving the conditions of all maritime workers—white, Negro, Filipino, and Mexican.

In unity lies the strength of those who labor. No boss-created race prejudice or playing of race against race, craft against craft, worker against businessman or farmer, should take place in this impending struggle. We call upon all decent people to support the just demands of the maritime unions. The Communist Party will do all in its power to effect this unity, John Leech, the Communist candidate for the 17th Congressional District, comprising the harbor area, is committed to the policy outlined in this speech. We ask you to vote for him in the coming election. We ask all honest workers to join the Communist Party.

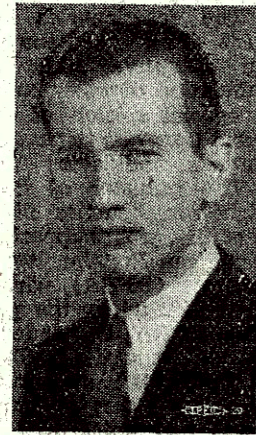

ALL OVER CALIFORNIA, in the public schools the children of our men on the waterfront, factory, and field are taking stuff like this. The classroom starts it and the school yard takes it up.

Let it never be said of you that when your child comes home and tells you something like this, you reply: "Aw, don't pay any attention to it." You're to pay plenty of attention to it and report it immediately, while it is fresh in your mind. Report it to this column, or to your organization and have a committee proceed at once to the school and protest against this infringement on our rights.

Don't underestimate the school child's ability to spread propaganda.

Remember that the public school system instills in the child's mind, because it intends and plans to, the idea that the teacher is always right!

In our city, among some of the foreign born who value education very highly, what the child brings home from school is gospel. The teacher is a being set apart on a high moral plane.

We, who have weathered a storm or two, know different from all this, and it is distinctly our job to watch our schools. If this isn't women's work to see that we get what we pay for, whose work is it? We pay for education, we can get all the propaganda we want for nothing, particularly now so close to election.

If we want our children taught along sectarian lines, we can put them in special schools for that purpose.

We have chosen to send our children to the public schools! How about proceeding at once to demand that a copy of the Bill of Rights be framed and hung in every class room, and that after reading the Bill of Rights each morning the children salute the flag on the basis of the Bill of Rights.

Could Aid Liberty

Statue Anniversary Will F.R. Do It?

When President Roosevelt speaks Wednesday, Oct. 28th, at the fiftieth anniversary celebration of the Statue of Liberty in New York Harbor, he could declare:

"The masses of the American people are opposed to the present widespread alien-baiting and persecution of the foreign-born."

He could say it truthfully but will he?

He is urged to make such a declaration by prominent members of the advisory board of the American Committee for Protection of Foreign Born. These members include Professor Emeritus John Dewey of Columbia University; Professor Robert Morss Lovett of the University of Chicago; Roger Baldwin, director of the American Civil Liberties Union; Vito Marcantonio, U.S. Congressman from New York; Carol King, of the International Juridical Association; Professor Bernard J. Stern, of Columbia University, and Rabbi Edward L. Israel.

"The Statue of Liberty," their letter says, "has been a symbol of special significance to the millions of immigrants who came to this country seeking freedom from oppression and equality of opportunity. Fifty years ago, at the dedication of the statue, this country was spoken of as an asylum of the oppressed, a haven for political refugees who had been driven from their homelands."

EDITOR: In reading Dr. Bissell's very interesting series on health and illnesses of factory workers, I as a longshoreman am inclined to ask, "How about the marine industry?"

Besides being one of the most hazardous occupations by the nature of the work, it is made doubly so by inattention and gross neglect of the employers who by hook or crook violate every safety and sanitation law ever thought of.

The S. F. longshoremen suffer from many diseases because they have to drink from unsanitary water cans. And you should see the dock toilets. It is no wonder that many longshoremen complain of pains in the back, legs and chest, using the open toilets with the bay breezes blowing in on the sweaty backsides. There are numerous violations of the safety laws, carried over from the Blue Book days, and God knows we stopped a lot of them since the I.L.A. came to the docks.

You should see the conditions which the seamen have on board ship. Inhuman, no word for it. Ten or 12 men sleeping in one small room, maybe down two or three decks with no fresh air.

Perhaps Dr. Bissell and Dr. Klein can get together and write, not a series of articles, but a book on the health and illnesses of the maritime workers.

During the Blue Book days men died on street cars on their way home from work, due to the extreme exertion.

Knickerbocker, Hearst's atrocity artist, has been retained as technical editor and adviser, the New Film Alliance reports. The film, if carried into production, will picture as barbarians the republican fighters for their country's freedom, while making heroes of the military clique who drove workers' women and children into the fortress to shield themselves.

A sufficient flood of protests can halt the production, says the alliance, urging that they be sent to the producer, Darryl Zanuck of Twentieth-Century-Fox, at Hollywood.

In Los Angeles two performances of the play were scheduled by the Yiddish Unit of the project, Oct. 27 and 28 at the Figueroa Playhouse.

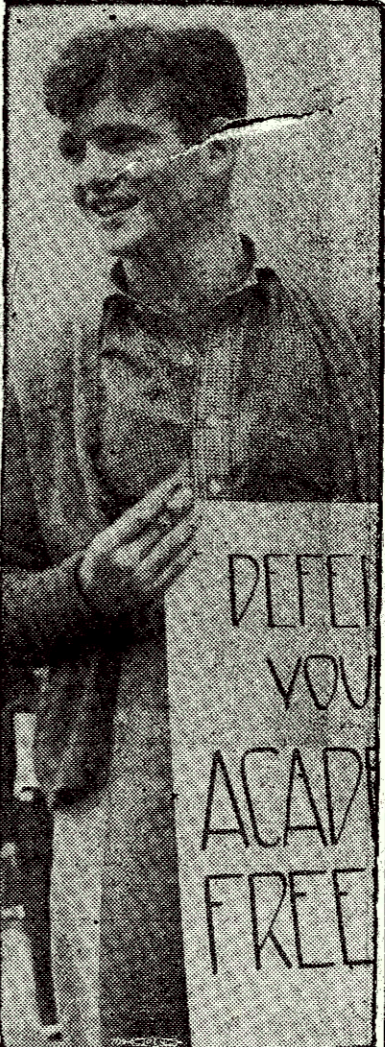

SEEING RED

THIS GRAFT INVESTIGATION of the San Francisco Police is getting more complicated than the ordinary mind can understand. Let's examine it one, two, three, four, in a systematic manner and see if we can make any logic out of it.

In the first place, before the investigation ever started, ninety per cent of the city's population knew perfectly well that San Francisco was a "wide open town." The houses of prostitution are more numerous than fire hydrants and as easily identifiable as fire stations.

If you ask any well informed citizen, he will explain that any "Hotel" which has a narrow doorway entrance and a little electric button with a sign over it saying "Ring Bell," is a "house."

Just for the devilment of it, I counted forty of them within a ten-block radius of the Hall of Justice (where the Police Station is located).

Across the street from the Hall of Justice is a gaudy little theatre where nearly naked women perform erotic "strip and tease" dances before the blood-shot eyes of pathetic sex-starved derelicts.

Almost everybody knew this situation existed and also that the city's enormous vice industry could not operate without paying "police protection."

So much for that. About a year ago, along came a federal tax collector who decided to shake down the "Sporting Houses" for a share of their revenue. He didn't care particularly about whether the businesses were legal or illegal. All he was interested in was collecting income tax.

The "Madames" and "Proprietors" naturally wanted a generous deduction for what they had to pay out for "police protection." That seemed perfectly fair to the federal collector. He knocked it off their bill and then promptly went to the policemen themselves to collect it from the proper source.

All very good so far. And it may not have gone any farther. But the federal collector got a big kick out of the whole thing and told about it for the amusement of a luncheon party.

Now what happened after that, I'm not just sure. Maybe the various "fingers in the pie" had been fibbing to each other about how much they were getting and how much they ought to share with their accomplices. In any event, the federal collector's anecdote kicked over the apple cart. Everybody in the civic government began accusing everybody else, and the "Police graft investigation" was "off to the races."

The Strange Wealth of the San Francisco Police

WHAT HAPPENED after that is history. San Francisco cops turned out to be amazingly "well to do" and the stories they related to explain away their fabulous bank accounts outdid the Arabian Nights Entertainment. At one time, somebody declared that vice was rampant in the city and produced a list of addresses of alleged "houses." The police went on a vice hunting crusade and couldn't succeed in locating anything.

Okey. So far, so good. The thing has strung out over many months and has provided the citizenry with a spectacle of civic corruption that would be comic if it weren't so disgusting and serious.

Now we have a new development. The police have unexpectedly burst out with an epidemic of vigilance. They have "knocked over" a few of the city's best known "joints." And what is the result?

Chief Investigator Edwin N. Atherton is indignant. He declares that this act on the part of the police department is merely a counter-demonstration to discredit the investigation by placing on it "the onus of a closed town."

"I have often said, and again repeat," Atherton declares, "this investigation is not directed at bringing about a closed town."

In plain words, he proclaims that the authorities have no intention of interfering with the extensive and profitable vice industry. As proof that the police are only "demonstrating," Atherton points out that the places raided were well known resorts which have existed over a long period of time.

Now we have the situation in a nut-house. I haven't enough space to draw a map for you, but read the facts, as summarized above, and figure it out for yourself.

They have no intention of enforcing the law. They can't do away with graft unless they do away with prostitution. They can't eliminate prostitution because that is a social problem and can't be solved with a policeman's club. Furthermore, as far as they are concerned it is a whale of a good graft and one of the city's largest industries.

Meanwhile, pity that poor product of poverty, hunger and bitterness, the San Francisco prostitute. The city's bewildered, sex-starved men have access to her bed and the police have access to her purse, and life is a gin-soaked nightmare that ends on a slab in the public morgue.

It's an ugly society you picked to be proud of, San Francisco—that is, those of you who are blind enough to be proud.

One Place Where They Did Away With It

DID YOU EVER READ about how they did away with prostitution in the Soviet Union? There are some mighty good books about it in the International Book Store and Library at 170 Golden Gate Avenue in San Francisco and other addresses throughout the state. Maybe they'll give you an idea of how to make San Francisco fit to be proud of.

Endowment Insurance: A Legalized Racket

PUT your money in endowment policies, say the insurance companies. And thousands of working men are doing it, and getting robbed.

Not the kind of robbery where someone hits you with a black-jack and runs with your purse, but a nice robbery. You may squawk all you want, but you have paid your money and they have got it.

What is an endowment policy? Most workers have heard about them, because insurance salesmen are going from house to house, successfully and selling them. Some of these workers have joined the International Workers' Order, which provides its members with sickness, death and accident insurance at the lowest rates available. They want to know why the I.W.O. does not have endowment policies. And we want them to know.

Here is John Stevedore. He holds a \$1000 endowment policy, for which he pays \$51.91 annually. He has a friend named Fred Carpenter, who holds a \$1000 policy with the I. W. O. for which he pays 9.84 a year.

Now they both bought insurance because they know there is always a good chance of sickness, injury or death. They have families. Even if injury comes on the job, the compensation is inadequate. And the workers have not yet won what should be theirs—socially provided insurance for every toiler for sickness, injury or death.

Now supposing both Fred and John should be killed in one, five or ten years. Not a pleasant thought, but it is the selling point most used by insurance salesmen, who know all too well how to capitalize on the well-grounded fears of the workers.

The families of each would get \$1000. No more, no less. What is the advantage here of paying \$51.91 a year instead of \$9.84? None!

What went with the extra money John paid?

A small part of his \$51.91 a year went into the cost of the insurance. The rest was a savings fund. These savings all went to the insurance company. Gravy, some call it.

But an endowment policy is

supposed to have other virtues. The salesman told John that whenever he was short of funds he could come to the good old company, which would be glad to give him a loan on his policy.

Now supposing you had \$350 in the bank. You go to the teller and ask to draw some of it out. He says you will have to pay six per cent on the money you take out. Your money! The outrageous crook! You will leave no stone unturned to expose the swindler!

But this is exactly what happens when you borrow money on an endowment policy. Only it is nice and legal.

But anyway, you borrow \$300 on the \$350 that has accumulated to your savings on an endow-

ment policy. Now instead of being insured for \$1000 you are only protected to the extent of \$700.

Well that's bad, but doesn't the amount of the premium drop also?

It does not! Ask the man who owns one. You now pay \$69.91 yearly, because 6% interest on \$3000 has been added, and you are insured for \$700 instead of \$1000.

But the salesman who talked John into buying the endowment policy had the argument that finally made the sale. Supposing nothing is borrowed and all the payments are made for the 20-year period of the policy. Doesn't John have \$1000 coming to him, while Fred who paid only \$9.84 yearly has nothing?

Yes, John has \$1000 coming, but if he takes it he has no more insurance, and if he leaves it he has no savings. John has been insuring himself for 20 years, and paying the company for the privilege. But it is much more likely that before 20 years are up, John has been thrown out of work, and he has lost his insurance

anyway, \$51.91 is a lot of money when you're unemployed.

It would have been much wiser to do what Fred is doing: paying for the low-cost insurance of the I.W.O. and putting the difference in a savings bank or in the sock. At the end of 20 years, barring same accidents, he will have his savings and his insurance too. And if he has to use some of the savings in the meanwhile he won't have to pay 6 per cent for the privilege, nor have the amount of his insurance cut down.

When Mort and E. A. Gilbert wrote a book called "Life Insurance, the Legalized Racket" (from which material for this article was taken) they presented facts which fell like a bombshell among beguiled public of insurance buyers. I suggest that you get a copy of this book or of the authors' latest pamphlet, "Industrial Insurance, a Share for Workers." SPANISH PRIEST SAYS U. S. CATHOLIC PRESS COMMITS CRIME AGAINST HUMANITY

Franciscan Flays Support Of Fascists In Spain; Says Issue Is Not Religion, That Catholics Support Govt.

NEW YORK—"Catholic newspapers in the United States are committing a crime against humanity and against democracy," charged Rev. Father Sarasola, Spanish Franciscan, in statement telephoned to the local press from Montreal.

The priest was replying to an editorial in the Brooklyn Tablet, Catholic newspaper, which stated it was "reliably informed" that Father Sarasola is an "apostate Franciscan" and not in good standing with his religious order.

Brands As Lie

Father Sarasola categorically denied this statement.

The Tablet did not attempt to deny Father Sarasola's priestly office but referred to him as a "collection basket for Communists."

"That is a lie," said Father Sarasola, "and the Catholic Church holds that no lie is lawful or innocent. The editor of the Tablet should know that."

The priest is touring the U. S. and Canada on behalf of the Spanish government under auspices of the North American Committee for Spanish Democracy. With him are Marcelino Domingo, leader of the Left Republican Party.

"Religion is not the issue in Spain," said Father Sarasola, "and the church is freer under the Republic than she ever was under the monarchy, and very much more free than under a Franco Fascist regime where she would be subordinated to the state as in Germany and Italy."

"The Catholic press is trying to give this struggle in Spain a religious significance and this is entirely false."

"The war in Spain is an attempt to place the Spanish people in a position of slavery under Fascism as in Italy and Germany. The clearest proof that this war is not religious is the fact that Franco has to depend on infidel Moors from Morocco. Since when has the crescent become the champion of the cross?"

"The Catholic people of Spain are overwhelmingly on the side of the government," the priest concluded, "but particularly in my own Basque province where not even the bishops are united on the rebel side as the newspapers say."

Right-Wing Gives Fascist Salute

BIARRITZ, France.—For the first time in the history of the Radical Socialist Party, Fascist salutes by the extreme right wing of the party were seen at the 33rd annual Party Congress.

Many members raised their fists in "Red Front" salutes as a counter-move. An uproar was created when some members sang the Internationale and others the Marseillaise.

President Edouard Daladier opened the congress with a ringing plea for continuance of the People's Front and the present Blum government, warning that "the day has ended when politics can be decided in Chamber corridors."

Edouard Herriot, president of the Chamber; Camille Chautemps, Minister of State; Pierre Cot, Aviation Minister; and Jean Zay, Minister of National Education, were expected to support Daladier's speech.

French Fascists Get Sub-Machine Guns From America

PARIS.—The French "Social Party," or the Fascist Croix de Feu League in disguise, has received a recent shipment of sub-machine guns from the United States to add to its secret armament.

The Socialist Party organ, "Le Populaire," exposed the shipment, which the Fascists, under Francois de la Rocque, hope to use in a "putsch" against the legal government of France.

"Le Populaire" said the weapons arrived from America and from Holland, and are being planted in caches in Normandy and elsewhere in the north of France.

Fascist Portugal In Break With Spain

LISBON.—The Portuguese government went another step in its support of the Fascist rebels in Spain, last week when it severed all diplomatic relations with the legal government of Spain in Madrid.

Portugal is itself under a Fascist dictatorship of Premier Antonio de Oliveira Salazar.

SOVIET PEOPLE SEND AID TO SPAIN PEOPLE

Give Solidarity With Anti-Fascists Who Defend Republic

MOSCOW—"Crush the Fascists and Save Revolutionary Spain," rings out daily now in a million-voiced cry from the Soviet people to the embattled Spanish people.

Wherever the Soviet people work and come together, ring out the cry: "Remember, the entire Soviet people is wholeheartedly with you."

One of the most fiery and typical letters is that of the "Heroic Fifth Regiment Shock Brigade," from a factory in Dnepropetrovsk, to its namesake on the Madrid front, "the glorious fighters of the Fifth Regiment." It reads:

Greeting to 5th Regiment
"Dear Friends and Class Brothers: Having studied at a meeting the news of the situation at the fronts, our brigade has declared itself a 'shock brigade' taking the name of your glorious Fifth Regiment."

"Our factory is on the Dnieper River, in the center of the Soviet Ukraine. Before the Revolution it belonged to a Belgian capitalist and a German employer."

"It was a miserable, dingy factory making engineering products. Dozens of workers were injured and met death in its filth and murk."

Send Aid to Spain
"After the great Socialist October Revolution, we workers became the masters of the factory, which was rebuilt with new technical equipment, forging to the van as one of the Soviet Union's great metal factories."

"Our great conquests were not won with ease. Our workers have collected a fund to aid your families, amounting to some 15,000 rubles. This will help you until you complete your victory over the Fascists."

"Take courage, brothers, and defend Madrid!"

Cossacks Support
In the North Caucasus, collective-farm Cossacks, formerly the cruellest police-hounds of Czarist oppression but today loyal builders of Socialism, adopted a resolution of support for the Soviet government's action in regard to non-intervention."

"Our Cossack collective-farmers support all acts of our government to oblige the Fascist countries to respect international law."

Filipinos Ask For Representative To Hawaiians
HILO, Hawaii.—Attending a mass meeting at Mooheau Park here, 2000 Filipinos asked appointment of an official representative of the Philippine Commonwealth to the Territory of Hawaii, in order to guard their welfare in the islands.

Dr. Hilario C. Moncado, of the Filipino Federation of America, was endorsed as a possible candidate for the position.

Latest population estimates show 39,072 Filipinos listed as aliens in the territory, approximately the same number as shown for Japanese in the islands—39,127.

Would-Be Hitler Of Belgium Is Arrested
BRUSSELS.—The would-be Hitler of Belgium, Leon Degrelle, was arrested by police last week after a demonstration by some of his Rexist followers during a parade of war veterans.

Marching past King Leopold and reaching the tomb of the Unknown Soldier, the marchers took offense at shouting by the Rexist Fascists. When Degrelle tried to make a speech, police arrested him and also Count Xavier Degrunne, Rexist Senator.

Latest news from the battlefronts and authentic reports on political developments of the Spanish situation will be broadcast in English at 8:45 p.m. and 5:45 a.m. daily.

These talks will come from Radio Station UGT, Madrid, on a short wave length of 40 meters.

Priests Paved Way For Mussolini's Robber War

ADDIS ABABA.—The Catholic Church played a leading role in Mussolini's robber war against Ethiopia.

This was baldly admitted by Monsignor Luigi Santa here, who told of the infiltration of priests into Ethiopia since 1914, smuggling themselves across the Ethiopian border, disguising themselves as journalists, lumber workers, to undermine the rule of Haile Selassie.

The priests made deals with local chieftains to turn them against Selassie, and the result was that the Ethiopian government was weakened and when Mussolini sent his murderous troops into Ethiopia last year, he did not have to fight a united nation.

Paved Way For Fascists
Just before Mussolini sent his troops into Ethiopia, the Pope decided it was time to pull in the priests, who had laid the groundwork for the robber conquest, and ordered them to leave Ethiopia. The priests went to Eritrea and Somaliland, Italian colonies, until Addis Ababa was captured.

Monsignor Luigi Santa concludes with a prayer of thanks for Mussolini's conquest and "civilizing" of Ethiopia.
"Today He (God) is using this reborn empire to carry, the blessed civilization and the genuine faith to the land of Ethiopia. Our missionary fathers, no longer disguised but free and well protected (by Fascist arms), can now openly preach the gospel of Christ, protected by their powerful country."

And now the Pope gives his blessing to Fascist and Nazi intervention on the side of the Spanish Fascists.

SPAIN PROVES INTERVENTION

Nazis, Portugal Aid Spanish Fascists

MADRID.—New proof of foreign intervention by Fascist Portugal and Fascist Germany on the side of the Spanish Fascist rebels, was sent last week by the Spanish government to the non-intervention committee meeting in London.

The Portuguese motorship Ciudad de Macao sank the Spanish vessel Fernando Poo, with the captain and crew of 40 aboard, off the West African coast and fired on the residency of the lieutenant governor at Bata, Spanish Guinea, on October 14.

Nazis Intervene
Fifteen German submarines passed through the Straits of Gibraltar on October 19th under cover of darkness to deliver war materials to the rebels.

On October 8th, 160 young Nazi specialists equipped with 12 anti-aircraft guns arrived at Seville aboard a German ship, leaving immediately to join the Fascist forces at the front.

The Nazi battleship Deutschland carried orders destined for the crew of a German seaplane in the Spanish Fascist service.

GERMAN WOMEN WANT FOOD—NOT PARADES

PRAGUE.—"We want food instead of parades!" German women are crying in demonstrations on the streets at Butten, Hindenburg, Gletwitz and other places in Upper Silesia, Germany, according to word received here.

Difficulty of getting meat, flour or potatoes is causing open manifestations of discontent. The Gestapo, or Nazi secret police, first threatens the women, then tries to soothe them with promises, but neither method has much success.

Preparations for the Defense of Madrid

By GEORGES SORIA
MADRID.—The atmosphere in Madrid is one of resolute organization of resistance. The tragic lesson of Toledo has borne fruit. The taking of this town, which could have been defended, but had to be abandoned in consequence of certain errors, reacted immediately on the workers' organizations, especially the Communist Party. The problem of close cooperation of forces must be solved.

Discipline Needed
Although the government troops cannot be held responsible for much that happened in Toledo, especially as they possessed no means of defense against air attack, nevertheless it is a fact that at a certain point errors were committed by the troops as yet undisciplined.

The courage of the militia is beyond all doubt, but the frequent lack of coordination of their movements accelerated the evacuation of their positions. The coordination of operations

is the problem being faced today by all political circles, and the leaders are aware that the next victories and the fate of the Republic depends on this.

Communists Active
The C.P. is exerting its utmost efforts to organize the forces fighting for the Republic. It emphasizes that the sole way to victory is the conversion of the militia and volunteer troops into a regular army by which the cohesion which is lacking would be established at once.

Discipline is one of the principles of a regular army, and at the present juncture is of decisive importance. The C.P., following the examples of the political commissars of the French and Russian revolutions, is now forming leading forces to work at the front.

The political commissar will make clear to the soldiers the necessity of iron discipline in the offensive and in retreat, and in certain emergencies he will share full responsibility with the mil-

FULL TEXT OF THE SOVIET UNION NOTE ON SPAIN NON-INTERVENTION PACT GIVEN

U.S.S.R. Demands Right Of Spain To Buy Arms Abroad, And Right Of Other Nations To Sell Arms To Spain

MOSCOW.—Full text of the Soviet Union's note to the International Non-Intervention Committee on the Spanish civil war, declaring that the non-intervention pact had failed, was released here.

The Soviet Union's note follows:

Having accepted the agreement on noninterference, the government of the Soviet Union expected this agreement would be fulfilled by all participants, and that in consequence the length of the civil war in Spain, as well as the number of victims, would be reduced.

It has been shown, however, that this agreement is being systematically violated by several participants. The insurgents are being supplied with arms with impunity.

Fascists' Base In Portugal
One of the participants in the agreement, Portugal, has been converted into a main base of supply for the rebels, while the legal government of Spain has been boycotted and deprived of the chance to purchase arms outside of Spain for the defense of the population.

Thus, in consequence of violations, the rebels enjoy a privileged position. As the result of this abnormal situation, the civil war in Spain has been prolonged and the number of its victims has increased.

An attempt by the U.S.S.R. to end the violations was not supported in the non-intervention committee.

Give Spain Its Rights
The last suggestion of the U.S.S.R. made was for control of Portuguese ports, the chief base of supplies for the rebels, but that was not even included in the agenda of today's session.

Not desiring to continue in the position of people involuntarily stimulating this unfair situation, the U.S.S.R. sees only one issue: To return to the government of Spain its right and chances to purchase arms outside of Spain, which right and chances are enjoyed by all the governments of the world, and that parties to the agreement be granted the right to sell and offer arms to Spain as they choose.

The Soviet government does not desire any longer to hold itself responsible for the present position which is obviously unfair to the legal Spanish government and population, and hereby is compelled to declare that in connection with its declaration of October 7, it cannot consider itself tied to the nonintervention agreement or to any oath of the participants.

Lloyds Quits Odds On European War

LONDON.—Fearing that war may be less than 12 months away in Europe, Lloyds underwriters have stopped insuring British land owners against risk of damage by a foreign enemy of England.

Recently, due to the rising state of alarm over the trend of European affairs, insurance agents found greatly increased demands for war insurance. For many years land owners could insure against war risks for the low premium of 12 cents per \$489.

Lloyds pointed out that the ruling does not apply to insurance against damage by strikes or civil strife. This type of insurance has been increasingly demanded lately by British capitalists, it was reported.

Figures Prove Fascism Means Starvation

BERLIN.—Cold figures and statistics prove what Fascism has meant to the German people under Hitler.

The German worker, according to the Nazi Labor Front, earns an average of \$11 weekly, in American money equivalent. In restaurants, the German worker has to pay \$1.60 for the following luncheon: oxtail soup, pigs knuckles with sauerkraut, potatoes, one unbuttered roll, one pint of beer, and coffee.

Butter, eggs, and good cuts of meat have skyrocketed in price, and are very hard to obtain.

And Wages Are \$11 Weekly
A German housewife has to pay the following prices for food:

Butter, 64 cents a pound; eggs, five cents each; coffee, \$1 per pound; sugar, 16 cents per pound; white bread, .36 cents per loaf; leg of lamb, 72 cents per pound; pork, 54 to 56 cents per pound; potatoes, .15 cents for 10 pounds; cabbage, three cents per pound; flour, 60 cents for five pounds; cauliflower, 20 cents per head; oranges, eight cents each; lemons, four cents each; veal, 70 cents per pound.

Cream, as cream is known in America, can't be obtained at any price. Milk and butter are of poor quality. Eggs are just about as scarce as hen's teeth.

Right-Wingers In Anti-Unity Move

BIARRITZ, France.—Right-wing leaders of the Radical Socialist Party faced isolation and possible ousting here as a result of their violent attacks on the Popular Front at the Party Congress here.

Emile Roche, president of the Radical Socialist Federation for North France, bitterly attacked the Popular Front, of which the Socialist Party and the Communist Party are the two other main participants.

"Sentiment of the rank-and-file of the Radical Socialist Party is strongly behind the Popular Front as the only weapon which has saved and can continue to save France from a Fascist dictatorship."

Czechoslovakia To Uphold Pacts, Says Minister

PRAGUE.—"Czechoslovakia cannot and will not follow Belgium's example" in weakening the alliance with France," declared Foreign Minister Ramille Krofta to the Czechoslovakian parliament.

"Without alliances we would be defenseless in the face of any attack," he said. "Hence we are determined to maintain and intensify alliances."

Madrid Calm
Meanwhile Madrid remains calm. The fantastic rumors published constantly by the foreign press on the bombardment of the capital have penetrated even here.

Every preparation has been made for air attacks, but up to now the aircraft defense guns of the government have succeeded in driving off the enemy airplanes appearing over the city.

They have received reinforcements since their offensive there. Fighting is still going on in Toledo, and meanwhile the government troops are preparing to defend the village of Bargas. If the Fascists have received reinforcements they will not hesitate to undertake an offensive in order to cut off Madrid from its connection with Valencia. Trenches have therefore been dug and fortifications erected at all strategic points and heights, and machine gun nests set up. Fresh troops are arriving.

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Peru Reactionaries Suspend Vote With Socialist Leading

LIMA, Peru.—Faced with the election to the presidency of Luis Antonio Eguiguren, Social Democrat reportedly supported by the American Popular Revolutionary Alliance, the reactionary and Fascist forces in Peru cancelled democracy here by suspending tabulation of voting.

Before the voting tabulation was halted, Eguiguren was leading his closest rival, Luis A. Flores, Fascist candidate, by nearly 400 votes.

The reactionaries had President Oscar R. Benavides issue an executive order suspending tabulation of votes, and also call a special session of the constituent Congress to pass upon Eguiguren's candidacy.

The minister of interior and right-wing parties filed charges that he was supported by the American Popular Revolutionary Alliance (APRA), which was declared illegal by the government. The APRA is headed by Raul Victor Haya de la Torre.

The APRA support made all Social Democrats' candidacies illegal and votes cast for them void, the reactionaries are claiming as their excuse for voiding democracy.

The government has arrested many supporters of Eguiguren.

Firestone Rubber Co. Carries On Brutal War

MONROVIA, Liberia.—In what is described as one of the most cruel and brutal wars ever fought in Africa, the Liberian Republic troops have defeated the rebel leader, King Nimley, of the Kroo tribe, it was reported here.

Liberia is completely owned and controlled by the Firestone Rubber Company of the United States.

In 1932, King Nimley with a dozen other tribal leaders established an autonomous territory 100 miles square along the lower Liberian coast, claiming the Liberian government was unjust to them.

Half of the army now is believed dead or wounded, and 20,000 other natives have been slain in the four-year war.

Mussolini Brags Of War Machine, But Claims 'Peaceful'

BOLOGNA, Italy.—Claiming peaceful intentions, Premier Mussolini spoke here of "an olive branch growing out of an immense forest of 8,000,000 bayonets."

But foreign observers were unable to see the olive branch for the forest.

This olive branch, said Mussolini, "grows from an immense forest of 8,000,000 bayonets, well sharpened and gripped by young men with intrepid hearts."

But the anti-Mussolini movements in Italy is growing.

We don't know if this sabotage was intended on the part of the boss or whether it was ignorance or just plain petty jealousy. Most likely it was a combination of all three.

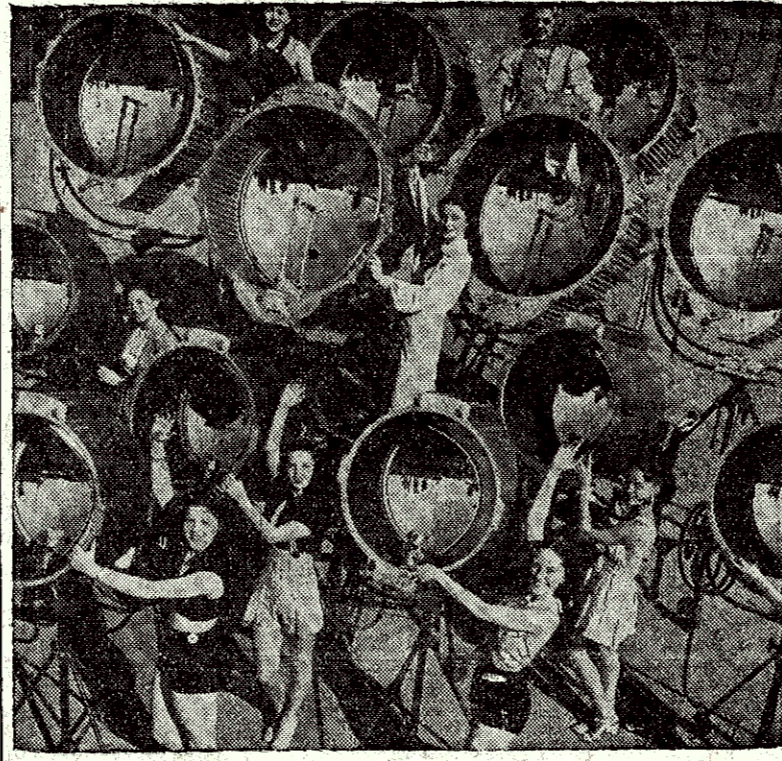
The two first foremen broke out into arguments a few times. They could not seem to agree about anything, trying to outdo each other and win favor in the eyes of the superintendent.

Labor Blasts Plan To Bring Whipping Post Back In Washn.

SEATTLE—The whipping post won't come back up here if organized labor can stop it. A proposal by a Bar Association committee to bring the whipping post back to Washington aroused immediate and emphatic opposition on the part of labor.

"We're With You" Is Message From All Coasts To Pacific

CURRAN SAYS 'YOU CAN COUNT ON EAST COAST'

Support From 15,000 East and Gulf Seamen Sure

(Maritime News Service)
 SAN FRANCISCO — Support from more than 15,000 Eastern and Gulf Coast seamen was pledged to the Pacific Coast maritime unions here by Joseph Curran, progressive chairman of the Atlantic Coast Seamen's Defense Committee, visiting here late in October.

The pledge was made as Pacific Coast unions were taking a strike vote to reinforce their drive for decent wages, hours and working conditions.

"The purpose of my visit is to assure the maritime unions here that East and Gulf Coast seamen are ready to support them in any and all actions they may take," Curran stated.

"Put me down as an unofficial observer out here at the request of the men I represent. I was not sent for," Curran said.

He decried the differential in wages paid seamen on the East Coast compared with those of the west.

"I believe seamen are in a position today to force an equalization of wage scales on all American coasts. The time was never better to bring about equalization, undoubtedly this will come through a National Maritime Federation."

Crew members from five East Coast vessels in port here met and reiterated their leaders' stand.

Utah Smeltersmen Close 'Em Tight

SALT LAKE CITY. — Gold, silver, lead, zinc and copper mining are at a virtual standstill in Utah as a result of the strike called by Locals 2, 55, 71 and 151 of the Int'l. Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers. The miners demand compliance with the state's 8-hour law and a 50c-a-day wage increase.

The locals on strike comprise smeltersmen and miners in the Bingham, Park City, Lark and Intic districts. In addition, workers at the Midvale Smelter were reported lining up in good fashion.

Mines Closed Too

Activity in heavy industries and the war scare boom have sent prices, production and profits soaring, but the operators despite huge earnings, have so far declined to share their blessings. Mines and smelters are reported closed down, including Int'l. Smelter, American Flag and American Smelting properties, with operators still unwilling to negotiate.

Operators have violated the state 8-hour law by refusing to accept the attorney-general's ruling that the law means eight hours from collar to collar or portal to portal. They have been forcing employees to work eight hours in addition to time spent in traveling to and from the portal. A victory for the miners is expected to mean a closed shop, checkoff and a strongly entrenched union in the state's huge mining industry.

All Set For Closed Shop In Movies

LOS ANGELES. — Hollywood is buzzing with well-founded reports that a definite drive to achieve a closed shop in the film industry was under way, when George Brown, international president of the International Alliance of Theatrical Stage Employees was reported to have left to attend in Washington the meeting of the executive committee of the American Federation of Labor after a secretive three-day conference with film union heads.

While I.A.T.S.E. headquarters here denied knowledge of official moves, it is generally recognized that, with Brown vice president of the A.F.L. and Kenneth Thompson, Screen Actors' Guild secretary, as vice president of the State Federation of Labor, for some time leaders in the motion picture unions have been intending to use their advantageous position to press their closed shop drive this winter.

Brown is expected to get the movement under way as soon as he returns from the A.F.L. convention which is to be held in Tampa, Fla., November 16.

Teachers' Union Boosts No. 11

LOS ANGELES.—At a recent regular meeting of Local 430, American Federation of Teachers, it was unanimously voted to endorse the stand of the National Convention of the A.F.L. in support of the C.I.O.

Local 430 is now waging an active campaign in support of Proposition No. 11 known as Instructor's Tenure Initiative, to provide job security for teachers and protect the classroom teacher from intimidation and coercion from reactionary pressure.

Members of Local 430 have been speaking to Los Angeles A.F.L. locals in support of Proposition No. 11, and have received a good response.

Proposition No. 11 has been endorsed by the California State Federation of Labor Convention, the Los Angeles Central Labor Council and the L.A. District Council of Carpenters as well as many other progressive organizations throughout the state.

LA Open Shoppers Stoop Very Low

LOS ANGELES. — When H. Gambrel, owner of the Parisian laundry here, decided willingly to permit union organization in his plant and to raise wages as a first friendly gesture, he was somewhat surprised to find he had drawn the enmity of the Laundry Owners' Association, the Merchants' and Manufacturers' Association and other reactionary forces that usually operate against labor.

The Laundry Workers' Union asks that Organized Labor and sympathizers demonstrate their distaste for these coercive and racketeering methods by refusing to patronize any laundry under the domination of the Laundry Owners' Association.

Engineers TO STAND BY ALL OTHER UNIONS

 SEATTLE, Wash.—Marine Engineers Beneficial Association in a radio broadcast here on the eve of threatened trouble served notice on shipowners they would stand with other maritime unions and longshoremen in protecting the gains made for their members.

The warning was broadcast after they revealed efforts to negotiate with shipowners met the same fate as other unions seeking an amicable solution of the present threatening issue.

A coast-wide ballot to determine whether they will give the negotiating committee power to call a strike in event agreements have not been reached by October 26, was taken.

"It is the firm belief of our committee and our members that in view of the great benefits which will be realized by shipowners through subsidies and mail contracts, that the shipowners should be willing to meet our compromise proposals, and we further believe that the government, which is dishing out these juicy plums, should exert some influence on the shipowners to negotiate a fair and equitable agreement," the speaker said.

Wives Help Men Win a Strike

LOS ANGELES.—Standing by their striking husbands in a fight to better their standard of living, the Ladies Auxiliary of the Upholsterers' Union, local 15, have during the long strike organized relief kitchens, raised funds and served on the picket line.

Recently, when workers from 11 shops were locked out and three more were on strike, hot lunches were served to over 500 pickets.

One of the kitchens is still functioning in Inglewood, where the union is striking the Krohler shop.

The Ladies Auxiliary have arranged a Halloween Masquerade Ball to raise funds for the strikers. It will be held October 31 at Angeles Hall, 1954 E. First St., with admission at 25 cents. The ladies say they will have the best orchestra in the city.

Pittsburg, Cal. Chemical Workers Union 20280 made a substantial donation, and elected Charles Buzacott and W. E. Jones as delegates to the defense committee.

Richmond Retail Clerks levied a special assessment for the defense and elected two delegates.

Two thousand Everett, Wash. citizens who met in Labor Temple wired District Attorney Warren and Attorney Gen. Webb, demanding a fair trial. Rodeo, Cal. Oil Workers have formed a King defense committee.

ASK ACTION ON SALINAS Labor Bodies For Special AFL Session

SAN FRANCISCO.—So serious has the situation of the Salinas lettuce strikers become that organized labor throughout California is jumping in to demand action by the State Federation.

The calling of a special meeting of the State Federation's Executive Board to consider the conduct of officials like Doss and Shevlin, and a way to save the Salinas Fruit and Vegetable Workers Union is demanded.

The following resolution was passed by the San Francisco, Alameda and Contra Costa Central Labor Councils, and by the Machinists, Laborers, Warehousemen and Marine Firemen of San Francisco:

WHEREAS: The Salinas lettuce strikers are still facing the brutal attacks of the police and armed vigilantes; and

WHEREAS: These attacks will intimidate the workers into accepting, from the Salinas Growers-Shippers Association, a settlement based on "local preference of employment," rather than Union preference; and

WHEREAS: Such an agreement will permit mass discrimination against active Union members and result in the setting up of a Company Union; and

WHEREAS: The destruction of the Salinas Fruit & Vegetable Workers Union, will be a danger to the general trade union movement, which will be felt in every district of the California State Federation of Labor; therefore be it,

RESOLVED: That this organization requests the President of the California State Federation of Labor, to call an emergency meeting of the Executive Board of that organization, for the purpose of working out a program which will lead to the satisfactory settlement of the Salinas strike; and be it further,

RESOLVED: That the delegates from this organization to the San Francisco Central Labor Council, be instructed to introduce this resolution for the concurrence of that body; and be it further,

RESOLVED: That copies of this resolution be sent to each member of the Executive Board of the State Federation of Labor.

U.T.W. Gets Busy In San Francisco

CAPTURING THE COMPANY UNION CIO Tells When To Use Them, When Not USING THEM AGAINST CREATOR

(By Union News Service, Published by Committee for Industrial Organization.)

Using the company union against its own creator, the boss, is an effective tactic labor organizations have developed in recent years.

Witness the steel industry where employe representatives in many plants are taking the lead in pushing union demands and in explaining the need for genuine organization.

A whole crop of works councils, employe representation plans and welfare associations sprang up following the N.I.R.A. The employers hoped that these would be nice, harmless playthings. But unions have found out how to deal with them and how to change their tactics to meet the particular situation involved. Now, looking back on recent experience, two types of situations and union tactics stand out.

Where the Union Arrives First

In Plant A, for example, the union was on the scene first. Many members were enrolled before the company woke up and launched a works council. The union decided it was strong enough to kill this plan at the start. It told its members to boycott the election for representatives, and not to take any part in the scheme.

The company spread the usual line about no dues and the A. F. of L. group being a racket, but the organizer was ready with answers. The union appealed to the labor board, and in an election ordered by the board won a large majority of the votes. The company union was clearly a failure, and the employer decided to deal with the organization its workers favored.

Where Employes Are Fooled

In Plant B, however, the company union has been going for some years. The employes have had little or no genuine union experience. They have seen many minor grievances adjusted by the company union. Wage increases have been given by the management for fear of unionism and in line with raises elsewhere. There is widespread welfare work, including athletics, clubs, a credit union, a benefit society.

The personnel manager is a good fellow and knows how to kid the men and women along. The employe representatives have been guaranteed against discrimination, and they meet separately from the management to decide on policy. The company makes every effort to seem fair, and in fact conditions are better than in the other similar plants in that town.

1500 STRIKERS, IN CONTEMPT OF JUDGE!

WORCESTER, Mass.—Fifteen hundred striking employes of the Hayward-Schuster woolen mills in E. Douglas, Millbury and Franklin, members of the United Textile Workers of America, have been cited for contempt of court for alleged violation of an injunction restraining them from congregating about the mills or interfering with the firm's business.

Pres. Harold Daoust of the Massachusetts Textile Council was named specifically in an employer's petition which claimed he is guilty of contempt for calling a meeting of representatives of 28 U.T. W.A. councils to discuss a possible 3-day textile workers' holiday in central and eastern Massachusetts.

plant has fulfilled the purpose for which it was started. Most of the employes believe in it. They have been prejudiced against the genuine labor organization.

But some of the workers see through the set-up. They contact an organizer and start building a genuine union. They decide to use the company union for their own purposes. These union men have now more freedom than before to talk with the men and women in their departments, and they are safer from discrimination. The union representatives are active in settling individual grievances and in pushing their general program for wage increases and other improvements. The company has to grant some of these demands.

More and more workers become interested in the union. They know it is really on their side. The union tells them what goes on in the meetings with the management, even when the minutes don't. Union representatives start holding mass meetings in some of the departments. Group feeling and confidence are developed. The union men acquaint the others with import-

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SHIPOWNERS GOT ANSWER THEY DESERVE

Bridges Tells Of Rotten Conditions On Shipboard

This was the answer by Harry Bridges, Pacific Coast I.L.A. President, to the shipowners Coast Committee, which tried to use a little underhanded stuff against the unions:

The summary of the Coast Committee for the Shipowners as contained in their communication of Oct. 22 to Rear Admiral H. G. Hamlet, may state the position of the shipowners correctly, but definitely and incorrectly states the position of the I.L.A.

No ultimatum was given through the Maritime Federation. The various maritime unions at the request of Admiral Hamlet, and to simplify the basic proposals of all unions in order that Admiral Hamlet would have a clear and concrete understanding of the whole situation quickly before him, presented the written fundamental demands in one document, signed by the representatives of each union concerned, and not by any official of the Federation.

Nothing to Seamen

The Coast Committee for the Shipowners merely succeeded in taking advantage of Admiral Hamlet's short opportunity to get acquainted with the whole situation and his desire to reach a peaceful settlement in the quickest possible time, when they offered to renew the present agreements for the seafaring unions, agreements that give the men nothing, and the shipowners millions.

The shipowners offer to the I.L.A. is farcical. To offer the largest maritime union a chance to renew its present agreement when all shipping may be tied up after Oct. 28 through the shipowners' refusal to correct the present low wages and intolerable conditions of the seafaring men means nothing but another attempt of the shipowners to evade the waterfront unions.

The shipowners' final word that "they cannot and will not submit to the program of the unions" speaks for itself. This means that the shipowners, although assuring Admiral Hamlet they wish to cooperate with him, and the I.L.A. has no hesitation in saying that they believe such "assurances of co-operation" are motivated by the fact that the Admiral is representing a Commission that has one hundred million dollars that the ship operators are hungry for.

\$2 a Day

The hundred million dollar subsidy is to be used to offset the differential in operating costs between American and foreign vessels. The liberal offer of the shipowners to continue the agreements of the seafaring unions for another year means they are perfectly willing to continue the wages of seafaring men at \$2.00 per day, unsanitary and pig pen quarters, hours from ten to sixteen a day without payment for extra work performed during this time, and a system of hiring that would permit the shipowners to blacklist any who protested to the conditions. Because the unions do not permit the latter at present, the shipowners are constantly crying "violation of agreements."

"SEAT OUR DELEGATES"

WASHINGTON.—After considering correspondence between the American Federation of Labor executive council and Pres. Max Zaritsky of the United Hatters, Cap & Millinery Workers in relation to the peace proposal of that union, Chairman John L. Lewis of the Committee for Industrial Organization announced that further action would be withheld pending clarification by the council of its stand on the first point of the proposal.

The council appointed a subcommittee, consisting of George M. Harrison, Felix Knight and Matthew Woll, as suggested in the Hatters' proposal, but made no reference to the first point involving lifting of the suspension of the C.I.O. unions.

C.I.O. Position

Lewis announced the C.I.O. position after consultation with Zaritsky, Charles P. Howard, secretary, and John Brophy, director of the C.I.O., and Philip Murray, chairman of the Steel Workers' Organizing Committee.

He declared that the C.I.O. is in harmony with the Hatters' proposal, as in line with its policy.

"An analysis of the correspondence revealed that the executive council failed to advise of their action on point one of Pres. Zaritsky's proposal," Lewis said. "That first section deals with attendance of the suspended unions at the Federation convention, which implies lifting the suspension order."

"We do not know the attitude of the executive council on this point. It is vital and essential that we do."

"The C.I.O. will withhold any further action on the proposition pending a clarification of this point by the executive council."
