# KRIEGER TRIAL BEGINS

Persecuted Oil Worker, Held 22 Months in Jail, is Brought to Trial in Tulsa

(By Eugene Lowry) Tulsa, Okla., Oct. 9.—Twenty-two months in jail without trial, under a system of jurisprudence which gives no rights to the defendant, until a jury found him guilty in the record made by Charles Krieger, with the full cooperation of the Standard Oil magnates. Charged on the 29th Day of December, 1917, without warrant, imprisoned without a hearing for 10 months; re-detained on revised charges, immediately upon the dismissal of original allegations; held without a trial since such is the story of the treatment accorded to Krieger, a freedom-loving citizen, by the Tulsa County Jail.

He comes for trial Monday in the District Court, Tulsa County, with Judge Cole presiding, the oil interests prosecuting, and Fred Davis, attorney in charge of the defense. The prosecution will not present. Actually, the case will proceed by fiat. Some a prominent attorney in this state who will testify on the employ of the Standard Oil Company, the indictment is based upon a confession drawn "voluntarily and expressly" from the oil company, which is a confession of criminal record to lend him credit in the industry. Mr. P. W. Fox, who was damaged by the explosion which served to cloak fraud and reported presence of the I. W. W. in Tulsa and its vicinity, appointed against Krieger in the preliminary hearings and is scheduled to testify again at the trial which begins on Monday.

These preliminary hearings, when the defense was in Tulsa, Oklahoma, Krieger himself cross-examined his accusers. In reply to a question put by Krieger, he testified that he thought "some of them" were I. W. W. propagandists, and that he was not a propagandist.

THE "STATE" BACKS DOWN. The great English railroad strike has brought to a temporary cessation by means of what the press dispatches call a "compromise" between the Government and the Union...

Two Governments exist in England today, corresponding to the two that existed in Russia during the brief regime of Kerensky. The two Governments exist but there is only room for one. For what is a Government? It is an executive committee, the dominant class, primarily, whose main function is to suppress another class...

In Russia the Soviets—which constituted the Workers' Government disputed the authority of the one set up by the bosses. The boss was fought out and the Soviets prevailed. Their first efforts was to ruthlessly suppress the Kerensky regime, the Constituent Assembly and all other bodies claiming to exercise authority. They were the government, you see, and they had only one objective.

The revolution which took place in Russia and resulted in the victory of the Soviets is going on in England today, though its course is less spectacular.
