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## "THE SWEET SUMMER BREEZE" FOR THE WORKER'S CHILD

**D**URING this month the public schools all over the country come to a close for the summer months. The rich children can all be very happy, because they can go to the country and enjoy the cool air and good food. But the poor children whose fathers are workers and are robbed by the boss all year 'round can rarely go. They must stay in the hot stifling city and instead of enjoying their vacations they really have a very rotten time.

Even some children who can afford to go swimming occasionally generally go in crowded trains and cars and lose as much as they gain by this recreation. Besides they get food which is often spoiled by heat because their parents cannot afford more expensive food.

Often, even long before vacation time is over, they are glad to go back to school, no matter how bad it is there, just because they are tired of the bad conditions under which they rested. The large cities never have sufficient playgrounds and the result is that all of them are crowded and most of the children play on the streets, where many accidents occur.

But the boss always gets plenty of worse off. They never get any vacations. They have to work in shops which are badly ventilated. Often they are dark and hurt the eyes. Look at your father or brother or sister or anyone else who works in your family the next time they come home and see how tired they are! They need a good long rest, but can never get it because they never get enough wages, and if they stopped working the whole family would not have enough money to live on.

But the boss always gets plenty of vacations. While your father is working all day and getting so little wages his boss is having a good time at some summer resort, and yet always gets lots of money.

This situation will be changed only when the workers all get together and organize to fight against it. Ask your father what he is doing. Ask yourself, are you doing your share? You are only if you are an active member of the Young Pioneers.

### CHILD LABOR EVIL MUST BE FOUGHT BY CHILDREN

**I**n every city, town and village and farm in this country there is child labor. In most states there is a law that children under the age of sixteen cannot work. Yet in every city children anywhere from eight to sixteen, stay out in the streets until one or two o'clock in the morning selling papers because their parents don't get enough wages to support their families. There are thousands of children in the factories and many thousands more working at home, stringing beads and making flowers.

On farms little children do hard work, take care of cows and flocks of sheep and so on. They do not go to school and so cannot get an education.

In the south little Negro children work in the cotton fields picking cotton. They also get no education.

We must all together fight to stop child labor and that is what the Young Pioneers are trying to do. Join the Young Pioneers.

The convention was adjourned with the singing of the "International."

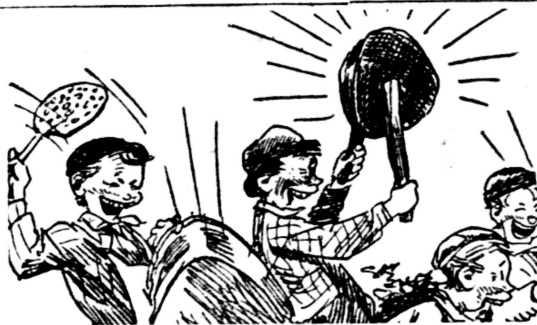

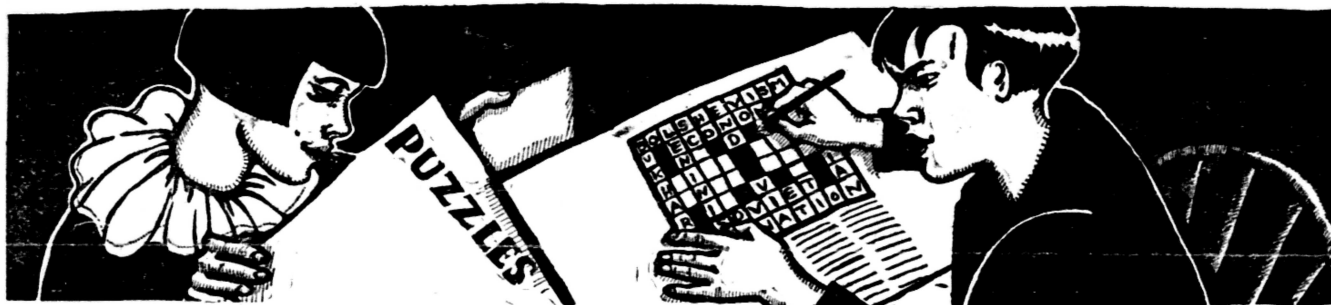

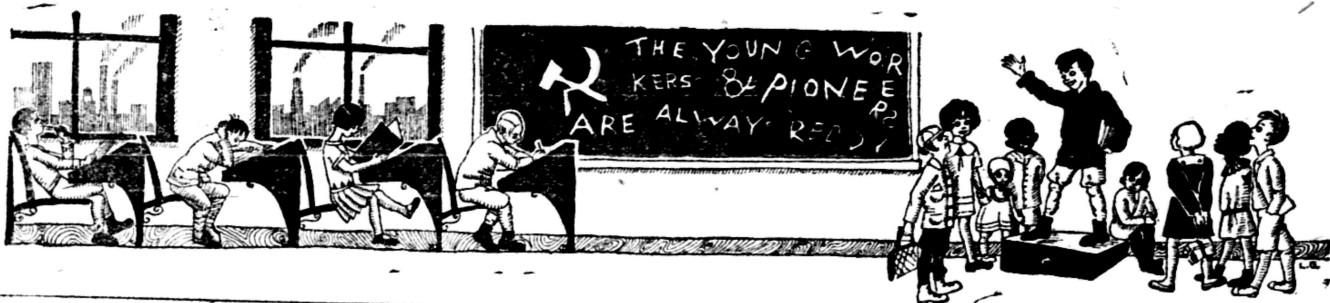

## TELLING IT TO THE "WORLD"

**NEW YORK CITY.**—The Morning World is publishing a series of articles on Religion trying to convince the workers of the importance of putting religious training into the minds of the children in the public schools, as a preventative of crime, social unrest and radicalism.

The World begins its articles with the infamous school system of Gary, Indiana, which is a small steel manufacturing town. In this town religion is thought in the school as a major subject. The capitalists want us to take as our example Gary and teach religion in the schools as Gary does.

It states that since so many children are living in the great city of New York, where there are many crowded tenement houses and there are not such good conditions, they must have something to help them bear their conditions. We fail to see where knowing the bible improves the conditions of the working class. It would be better to organize unions and therefore the workers could get a living wage.

The constitution of the United States sets religion apart from state affairs. Having religion in the schools connects it up with the government and thus is contrary to the constitution. But that is nothing new, because the constitution is always contradicted by those 100 per cent Americans when it is for the welfare of the boss.

W. E. Knox, president of the Bowery Saving Bank, donated thousands of dollars for the cause of establishing religion in the schools. Capitalists donate money only when it is for their interests. This shows that religion is for the interest of the capitalists.

Religion tells you to be contented with your lot. This means, never try to better your conditions. This insures the continuation of capitalism. The capitalists want to place religion on a larger scale. Religion is like an opium to keep the masses contented.

Religion has caused strife since the world began. Religion was founded on superstition and superstition is founded on ignorance.

In the factories race prejudice and religion are used to separate the workers and prevent them from organizing.
